WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

MARCH 7, 1938 and MARCH 14, 1938

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

MIDDLESEX, ss.

To: John J. Buchanan, Constable, or any other suitable person of the Town of Chelmsford.

GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth aforesaid, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the legal voters of said Chelmsford to meet in their several polling places, viz:

- Precinct 1—Town Hall, Chelmsford Centre.
- Precinct 2—Town Hall, North Chelmsford.
- Precinct 3—Fire House, West Chelmsford.
- Precinct 4—School House, East Chelmsford.
- Precinct 5—Liberty Hall, So. Chelmsford.
- Precinct 6—Golden Cove School House, Westlands.

On Monday, the seventh day of March, 1938, being the first Monday in said month, at 12 o'clock noon, for the following purposes:

To bring in their votes for the following officers:

- Moderator for one year.
- One Selectman for three years.
- One member of the Board of Public Welfare for three years.
- Treasurer and Tax Collector for one year.
- One Assessor for three years.
- One Assessor for two years to fill an unexpired term.
- Tree Warden for one year.
- One member of the Board of Health for three years.
- One School Committee member for three years.
- One Cemetery Commissioner for three years.
- One Park Commissioner for three years.
- Two Trustees of Adams Library for three years.
- One Sinking Fund Commissioner for three years.
- One Constable for one year.

and to vote on the following question:

Shall an act passed by the General Court in the year 1938 entitled "An act placing the Office of Chief of Police of the Town of Chelmsford under Civil Service Laws," be accepted?

All on one ballot.

The polls will be open from 12 noon to 8 P. M., and to meet in the Town Hall at Chelmsford on the following Monday, the fourteenth day of March, 1938, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, viz:

ARTICLE 1, To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 2, To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be required to defray Town charges for the current year; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 3, To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to act as its agent in any suit or suits which may arise during the current year, with authority to settle and adjust claims or demands for or against the Town; and to employ counsel whenever in their judgment it is necessary; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 4, To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 5, To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Overlay Reserve Account a sum not exceeding Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be used as a Reserve Fund at the discretion of the Finance Committee, as provided in General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 6, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 6, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum with which to meet unpaid bills of previous years; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 7, To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Sections 81 B, 81 C, 81 D, and 81 E, of Chapter 41, of the General Laws; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 8, To see if the Town will vote to elect two members to the Planning Board, one for a term of five years, and one for a term of one year; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 9, To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Sections 3 to 12 inclusive of Chapter 143 of the General Laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 10, To see if the Town will vote to adopt a code of Zoning By-Laws as recommended by the Planning Board; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 11, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) or some other sum, to be used for the Board of Appeals for stationery, postage, printing and other miscellaneous expenses; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 12, To see if the Town will vote to adopt a code of Building By-Laws as recommended by a special committee appointed by Board of Selectmen in accordance with Article 49 that was passed at the Annual Town meeting on March 8, 1937 or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 13, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250) or some other sum, for the purpose of defraying the expense of the compensation or the salary of an Inspector of Buildings; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 14, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) or some other sum for the purpose of defraying the cost of printing, postage, and miscellaneous expenses to be used by the Inspector of Buildings; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 15, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-eight Hundred Fifty-five 11-00 Dollars (\$2855.11) as its proportion of the net cost of making alterations and constructing additions in and to the Middlesex County Tuberculosis Hospital, pursuant to Chapter 417 of the Acts of 1935; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 16, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Hundred Seventy-one and 36-100 Dollars (\$1871.36) to pay the County of Middlesex, as required by law, the Town's share of the net cost of the care, maintenance and repair of the Middlesex County Tuberculosis Hospital, as assessed in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 111 of the General Laws or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 17, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Hundred Dollars (\$3500) for the reconstruction of the North Road, contingent upon the State and the County

contributing a similar amount for said purpose, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 18, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) for the reconstruction of the Lowell Road, contingent upon the State and County contributing a similar amount for said purpose; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 19, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$350) or some other sum, for the purpose of purchasing an automobile for the Police Department, said purchase to be made under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 20, In the event of an affirmative vote under Article 19 to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer title to the Chevrolet Automobile now used by the Police Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 21, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) or some other sum for the purpose of reconstructing C Street; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 22, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200) to be used by the Moth Department for the purpose of exterminating and controlling the elm leaf beetle; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 23, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) or some other sum for the purpose of widening Carlisle Street between the Water Tower and Brick Kiln Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 24, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700) for the purpose of defraying the expense of foreclosing tax titles; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 25, To see if the Town will vote to request the Department of Corporations and Taxation, Division of Accounts, to make an audit of the Town of Chelmsford Accounts, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 26, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding Seven Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$750) for the purpose of equipping the new vaults in the Centre Town Hall, and other office equipment or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 27, To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the fund called "Sales of Cemetery Lots and Graves" a certain sum of money for the purpose of the care, improvement and embellishment of some or all of the cemeteries in the Town; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 28, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$920) or some other sum to defray monies paid to claimants for personal injuries and consequential damages therefrom by reason of being injured on the highways; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 29, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of purchasing an automobile to be used by the agent of the Board of Health, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 30, To see if the Town will vote to allow home owners and property owners the right to work out their Assessed taxation on the Board of Public Works Department, providing they are not able to pay them; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 31, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Seven 80-100 Dollars (\$507.80) for the purpose of settling the claims of the City of Worcester for aid rendered to persons having a settlement in Chelmsford, under Chapter 117 of the General Laws, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 32, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand, Two Hundred Seventy-nine and 65-100 Dollars (\$10,279.65) or some other sum for the purpose of covering overdrafts in the accounts entitled "Old Age Assistance" "Outside Relief" and "Aid to Dependent Children," or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 33, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Fifty-nine and 58-100 Dollars (\$659.58) or some other sum, for the purpose of covering an overdraft in the account entitled "Soldiers Relief," or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 34, To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the account entitled "Road Machinery Fund Account" the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900) or some other sum, to the account entitled "Road Machinery Account" or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 35, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Fourteen and 50-100 Dollars (\$214.50) or some other sum, for the purpose of purchasing a power mower to be used by the Park Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 36, To see if the Town will vote to accept Westland Avenue Extension as laid out by the Selectmen as shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 37, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate

the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200) or some other sum, for the purpose of reconstructing Westland Avenue; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 38, To see if the Town will vote to accept Aspen Street as laid out by the Selectmen as shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 39, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700) or some other sum for the purpose of reconstructing Aspen Street; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 40, To see if the Town will vote to accept Francis Street as laid out by the Selectmen as shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 41, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50) or some other sum for the purpose of reconstructing Francis Street; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 42, To see if the Town will vote to accept Warren Avenue Extension as laid out by the Selectmen as shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 43, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200) or some other sum for the purpose of reconstructing Warren Avenue, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 44, To see if the Town will vote to accept Hildreth Street as laid out by the Selectmen as shown by their report and plan filed in the Office of Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 45, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200) or some other sum for the purpose of reconstructing Hildreth Street; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 46, To see if the Town will vote to accept Clinton Avenue as laid out by the Selectmen as shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 47, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) or some other sum, for the purpose of reconstructing Clinton Avenue; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 48, To see if the Town will vote to accept Lillian Avenue as laid out by the Selectmen as shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 49, To see if the Town will vote to accept Grant Street as laid out by the Selectmen, as shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 50, To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a committee to inquire into the advisability of purchasing a triangular piece of land located at the intersection of Stedman and Chelmsford Streets for Park Purposes; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 51, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) or some other sum for the purpose of purchasing a radio for the Police Department automobile; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 52, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-five Hundred Dollars (\$6500) or some other sum for the purpose of carrying on Federal or State Projects, the costs of Administration and the costs of materials and supplies for same, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 53, To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Assessors to use a sum of money in the amount, such as the Tax Commissioner may approve as free cash, said sum of money to be applied in computing the tax rate for the year 1938, or act in relation thereto.

AND YOU ARE DIRECTED to serve this warrant by posting attested copies thereof at the Post Offices in the Centre of the Town, South Chelmsford, North Chelmsford and West Chelmsford, and at the School House in East Chelmsford, and the Golden Cove School House, Westlands, seven days at least before the time appointed for holding the first meeting aforesaid.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

SEPTEMBER 27, 1938

A special Town Meeting was held in the uper Town Hall at Chelmsford Centre, on September 27, 1938 at 8 p. m. This meeting was adjourned from September 23, 1938.

Under Article 1, a report of High School Building Committee was made by Fred F. Wiggin. The report was as follows:

"The committee consisting of four members appointed by the Moderator, Fred F. Wiggin, V. E. Osborne, George L. Waite, and John J. Dunigan, with the School Committee, Wendell P. Harvey, James P. Cassidy, and John A. McAdams, met immediately after the town meeting of July 29, 1938, and organized by electing Mr. Wiggin, chairman, and Mr. Dunnigan, clerk.

The growth of the High School was studied, as shown by the enrollment for each five year period beginning in 1917, when the school

was opened in the present building with 161 students. In 1922 there were 184; in 1927, 224; in 1932, 376; in 1937, 445; and the expected enrollment for September was over 470. Actually there are over 480 in the school this year.

Plans proposed to a committee in 1931 by several different architects, and in 1935 by the firm of Ashton and Huntress were discussed. It was decided to call in Ashton and Huntress in order to discuss alterations in the 1935 plan so as to provide an addition containing either four or six classrooms, an assembly Hall and toilets.

The architects presented two sketches, one providing four classrooms, and the other six. It was decided that in view of the present growth of the Town, the one with six classrooms was the better plan. Two of these rooms would take the place of rooms now used in the McFarlin school. The proposed addition provided:

On a floor one story below the present basement, an assembly hall seating 685.

On the level of the basement two classrooms, 22 ft. by 32 ft., toilets for girl students and for boys, and for women teachers, and for men.

On the level of the first floor two classrooms 22 ft. by 32 ft. directly over the classrooms on the basement level, two classrooms 22 ft. by 26 ft. built in the space over the stage of the assembly hall. This floor will have toilets for girls and for boys, and a room for a clinic.

No change is made in the second floor of the present building.

The addition, as seen from the rear, will be one story lower than the present building, and the roof one story lower. If more rooms are needed at some future time, the walls can be built up to the height of the old building, providing space for four more rooms, or rooms can be added by building up from the ground level on one side of the assembly hall or on both.

The urgent need of enlarging the High School is conceded by everyone who has investigated conditions as they now exist. The Committee are unanimously of the opinion that the school should have all the facilities proposed in this plan. The cost to the Town is less now than it probably would be at any later date. We recommend the adoption of this plan, and the appropriation of the money necessary for construction."

That for the purpose of financing the construction and equipment of an addition to the Chelmsford High School building, and to enable the Town to secure the benefits of funds granted by the Federal Government, under the Public Works Administration Appropriation Act of 1938, there be raised and appropriated the sum of One Hundred Five Thousand, Four Hundred Fifty-four Dollars (\$105,454.00), and the Treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow the sum of fifty-eight Thousand Dollars, and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor, under authority of, and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 50, of the acts of 1938, said bonds or notes to be payable in not more than fifteen years at such term and maximum rate of interest as may be fixed by the Emergency Finance Board.

The selectmen, or the High School Building Committee, are hereby authorized and directed to accept on behalf of the town, for use in carrying out such project, a Federal grant of money, pursuant to the Public Works Administration Appropriation act of 1938; and the High School Building Committee are authorized to proceed with the construction of said project, and to enter into all necessary and proper contracts and agreements in respect thereto, all subject to applicable Federal regulations; and the Selectmen, and the High School Building Committee, are authorized to do all other acts and things necessary or convenient for obtaining said grant, making said loan, and constructing said project. 130 voted in the affirmative. No one voted in the negative.

On a motion made by Mr. Harvey, it was voted :

That a building Committee be appointed by the Moderator.

The Moderator appointed :

Fred F. Wiggin, George L. Waite, Viranus E. Osborne, John J. Dunigan, the School Committee, and the Board of Selectmen to act as a building committee.

Under Article 2, on a motion made by Carl A. E. Petterson it was voted :

To raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty (\$150.00) Dollars for defraying the expense of the Assessors department.

REPORT OF THE CHELMSFORD W. P. A. 1938

TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SEELCTMEN ,
TOWN OF CHELMSFORD, MASS.

Honorable Sirs:

As W. P. A. Sponsor's Agent for the Town of Chelmsford, I wish to submit the following report on the W. P. A. activities in the Town of Chelmsford for the year 1938.

At the beginning of the year 1938 we had approximately 40 manual workers working on our local proojects.

Beginning with the month of April our quota was increased each month so that in the middle of November 1938 we had approximately 170 men on the W. P. A. payrolls.

Since that time the number on manual projects has been reduced down to 130; the reduction being due to the fact that some have gone into private industry, and 11 were cancelled from the W. P. A. payrolls by the "Social Service Investigators" from W. P. A. headquarters in Boston.

We have at present besides manual workers 6 men on our "Town Survey Project", 3 on the "National Youth Administration Project", and 7 women on our "Sewing Project".

The projects started in 1938 were as follows some were completed and some are still under the process of construction.

Beginning with Jan. 1, 1938, we were operating our "Town Hall Project" which was started in Oct. 1937 and closed in June 1938. That project as you all know was a general remodelling of the entire building including a new heating system.

There was considerable outside work done about the building such as cement, drips, grading and seeding the lawn, etc.

In February 1938 our "Local Farm to Market Project" was put into operation it consisted of widening, gravelling and eliminating bad curves on a group of four roads. That project was temporarily suspended in order that the men could be transferred to the water project. Work under this project will be resumed this year.

In the month of June 1938, our "Chelmsford Water Dist. Extension Project" was started. It consisted of laying 4225 lin. ft. of 8-inch mains on the North Road, 1100 lin. ft. of 6-inch mains on the Davis Road, 1050 ft. of 6-inch mains on the Locke Road, 250 ft. of 6-inch mains on Grand View Road, 258 ft. of 6-inch mains on Clinton Ave.; 3000 ft. of 6-inch mains on Stedman St., and 450 ft. of 6-inch mains on Smith St. Ten hydrants, 32 meters, 8 gate valves, and 35 service mains were also installed. This extension has afforded several people with the best of drinking water, and more adequate fire protection.

The "South Chelmsford Water Dist" also extended their mains under a W. P. A. Project. It consisted of laying 750 lin. ft. of 6-inch mains on the Acton Road. One hydrant, 1 gate valve, 1 meter and 1 service main were also installed.

Our "Twiss Road Project" was also put into operation and completed. It consisted of widening approximately $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles of road from 10 ft. to 18 ft. and approximately 2000 cu. yds. of gravel were spread rolled and oiled.

Work on our "East Chelmsford Playground Project" was started in April, and closed November 2, 1938.

It consisted in excavating 4800 cu. yds. of earth and rock. A great deal of blasting was made necessary because of encountering so many large boulders. A regulation base ball field with a back stop was constructed. Also a regulation volley ball court and back stop were constructed. Along Carlisle St. a 480 ft. cable wire fence with cement posts was built. A 260 ft. wire fence was also set up on steel posts to keep the children from falling down the steep embankment. The embankment on the southerly side of the field was sodded to prevent washing. The entire field comprising about $2\frac{1}{2}$ acres was loamed, fertilized, seeded and rolled so that the playground is one of the best in town.

Our project for improving the East Chelmsford Water Dist. property was also completed. It consisted of grubbing, levelling, filling, loaming, seeding and rolling so as to make that property a beauty spot.

In the month of September the Town of Chelmsford like all other cities and towns in New England suffered very heavily from the damage left by a devastating hurricane. We were very fortunate in that we did not meet with very heavy damage to buildings nor human lives,

but very great damage was done to the many wood lots in the town. Immediately after the hurricane, all the W. P. A. workers were summoned into the service, and undertook the huge task of opening the roads in the town. After that was completed, the task of going into the wood lots to clear away the existing fire hazards.

The work that is being done in the wood lots and along the highways is being done under the direction of the U. S. Forestry Service Div. The work is being done as per schedule of priority and project number. The first areas to be considered were the blowdowns in the residential areas. Then the cleaning and burning of the slash 50 ft. back along the highways. The opening of wood roads and fire lanes in the wood lots, and then the cutting of trees and logs and burning of slash. The greatest hazards are being given first consideration.

We are at the present time operating a cemetery project cutting and removing trees, wood and stumps. The wood from the cemeteries and along the public highways is being moved to the Town Infirmary where it will be cut and distributed to the welfare cases. The cemetery suffering the greatest damage was the Pine Ridge on the Riverneck Road where approximately 200 pine trees and some oaks were blown down. The logs from public owned property are being hauled to the Town Infirmary to be sawed into lumber.

It is estimated by the U. S. Division of Forestry that between two and three million board feet of lumber is down in the Town of Chelmsford.

We are at the present operating a project for the destruction of gypsy, brown tail moths and caterpillars. There are at present 18 men employed on this project.

We also have a group of roads project in operation. At the present time 19 men are employed on this project and several thousand feet of drainage is being laid on the Dalton Road and Stedman St. which is preliminary work to widening, gravelling, rolling and oiling to be done during the summer months. This particular group of roads also include Fairview Road in North Chelmsford and the Graniteville Road.

We have several worth while projects already approved in Washington that can be put into operation during 1939, and others in the making.

During the year 1938 the Town of Chelmsford expended for W. P. A. activities, \$12,800.00.

The total amount of wages received by the W. P. A. workers was approximately \$75,000.00.

I wish at this time to thank the Board of Selectmen and all other Town Official for their splendid co-operation and assistance in conducting the W. P. A. activities in the Town of Chelmsford.

The welfare load was very heavy and the situation was acute for the first three months of 1938 when more than one-half the appropriation was spent during this period. Our textile factories and quarries were closed down, the social security payments had not started, and

WPA assignments were few and far between, but about the first of July conditions started to improve and were much better for the last half of the year.

At the present time the WPA is not assigning any persons excepting those who formerly worked on WPA but left the project to work in private industry, and when later the private employment shut down. There has also been a recent ruling by the Federal Government that all persons over sixty-five years of age and widows with dependent children who are employed on the various forms of work relief must apply for Old Age Assistance and Aid to Dependent Children respectively. If this happens we must expect more than a normal increase on those two divisions of assistance.

During the past year thirteen boys were placed in the CCC camps, from which their needy parents or relatives received from \$22-\$25 monthly from the Federal Government. I also wish to stress the fact that needy parents who have a son who is unemployed over the age of eighteen and under twenty-five years should take advantage of the opportunity to place the boy on the rolls of the National Youth Administration. These projects are in operation locally. The young men are allowed to work fifty-five hours in a month for which they are paid fifty cents per hour or twenty-two dollars and fifty cents per month.

Old Age Assistance continues to increase and all signs indicate another amendment to our statutes providing a further reduction in the age limit with possible increase in amount given. This division of relief is now the most important of all with upwards of one hundred eighty cases to start off in 1939. It is certainly a tremendous responsibility in itself to supervise this division of relief.

There is now an appointed Bureau of Old Age Assistance in the town of Chelmsford consisting of the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, Chairman of Board of Public Welfare and an outstanding citizen of the town, who meet monthly to act on all applications. The town is indeed fortunate to have such a distinguished Board to govern all action on Old Age Assistance cases.

Aid to Dependent Children remained fixed at nine cases during the entire year of 1938. At the present time there are three cases eligible and in all probability this will increase somewhat throughout the coming year. The net cost to the town is about one-half on ADC cases as the Federal Government and State reimburse at least one-half the total amount expended.

I take this opportunity to thank the members of the Board of Public Welfare, the members of the Bureau of Old Age Assistance, other town officials and citizens who gave me splendid cooperation during the entire year.

The Trustees and the librarian have tried to be of greater service to the schools, and to that end have purchased an up-to-date 30-volume encyclopedia, The Americana; also a set of the Yale Chronicles, 50 volumes, recommended by one of the High School instructors. The library has replaced the 1898 edition of Grove's Dictionary of Music and Musicians by the recent 1937 edition, and to meet the need of art students, has begun to add recent as well as standard works to the meager collection in the stacks. An effort is also being made to put in important books of a scientific nature. In the children's department, an excellent collection of the newest books for children of different ages and grades has been purchased.

Owing to the illness of Mr. Fiske, Miss Frances Clark has been serving as Treasurer pro tem.

REPORT OF FOREST WARDEN

Board of Selectmen,
Chelmsford, Mass.

Gentlemen :

The annual report of the Forest Warden is respectfully submitted herewith.

In addition to the District Chiefs of the Fire Department, the following were appointed Deputy Forest Wardens :

During the past year we were called to extinguish one hundred and thirty-one (131) forest and grass fires.

About two hundred (200) acres of land were burned over; most of this being scrub and grass land of no merchantable value. Approximately two thousand (2000) permits were granted by the department during 1938.

Many fires were of incendiary arigin while others were caused by abandoned camp fires and carelessly discarded cigarettes and other smoking material.

Several persons were warned against burning without a permit but no court action was taken as there were no second offenders.

One person was required to pay the cost of extinguishing a fire as he had been warned about burning without a permit on previous occasions.

Most citizens have cooperated with this department in observing the permit law and other laws pertaining to forest fire prevention.

The hurricane of September 21st left this Town with the most serious fire hazard that it has experienced in history.

About two million (2,000,000) feet of pine timber were swept to the ground in this Town. This timber blocked all fire roads and lanes, cutting off any possible approach to extinguish a fire. Acres of ground were completely covered by pine timber and brush. The most serious fire hazard in the Town being on the shores of Heart Pond among the summer camps.

Through the cooperation of the United States Forest Service, W. P. A. and other government agencies much of this fire hazard has been removed but many roads are still blocked and many acres of slash remain.

We have cooperated with the United States Forest Service in locating fire roads and lanes where apparatus may find passage to combat any fire which may occur. I have personally supervised the removal and burning of slash for the W. P. A. where the hazard was greatest in order that the work could be carried on without delay.

This department is badly in need of a portable pump to meet the remaining fire hazard as it will be impossible to remove all slash and timber before the fire season begins. Hand equipment is useless in fighting forest fires where there is any amount of slash or pine tops. A portable pump would greatly reduce the labor costs to the Town, as fewer men would be required to extinguish fires.

The State Division of Forestry recommended that all towns be equipped with a portable fire pump.

All equipment, both in the care of deputies and at our headquarters, was carefully tested and necessary repairs were made.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation to State District Fire Warden Frederick R. Stone and State Observer Mrs. Claude Welch and to the Police Department, Fire Department and to my Deputies for the fine cooperation they have extended me during the past year.

REPORT OF MIDDLESEX COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE

The following report is given of the work of the Middlesex County Extension Service for 1938 in the town of Chelmsford.

Gilbert Perham, Westford Street, and Theodore Emerson, have been doing some work in pasture improvement, including the growing of Ladino clover. Other farmers have been given assistance in pasture improvement, including soil tests, recommendations on seed mixtures and selection of fields. Dairy replacements have been discussed and suggestions made on raising and purchasing. There was considerable interest in Chelmsford among poultrymen in the Extension Service during the year and thirty-seven farm visits were made. A meeting was held in North Chelmsford concerning the Egg Sizing Bill with an attendance of thirty-four. Motion pictures entitled "Give the Fresh Egg a Break" were shown to the Church Group in North Chelmsford, with an attendance of fifty-three. Following the hurricane, assistance was given fruit growers in the marketing of their windfall apples, the re-setting of their trees and in mouse control. The spray service, of interest to fruit growers, has been continued. Twenty-two farm visits were made upon request.

After the hurricane, with so many farmers having down timber, a great deal of time was spent on getting the Government program under way for salvaging timber and reducing the fire hazard. Also, some farmers were helped in obtaining loans to take care of the hurricane losses.

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Boys' and Girls' 4-H Club Work was carried on during the year under the following leadership: Mrs. Percy Beardsley, town chairman; Mrs. Edward A. Fox, Mrs. Edward Riney, Ralph Howard, Harry Hilyard, committee members; Mrs. Joshua Machon, Miss Isabelle Hamilton, Mrs. L. O. Rodin, Mrs. Warren Dean, Miss Sophie Kisley, Miss Helen Krasnecki, Miss Frances Fox, Mrs. Percy Beardsley, Alfred Murphy, Allen Bennett, Gilbert Riley, Albert Tinter, Joseph Gill. Sixty-seven girls and fifty-two boys were enrolled during the year. Virginia Fox, Avis Marshall, Robert Erickson and Earl Boutilier were awarded the Two Day Trip to Massachusetts State College for outstanding work in their clubs. Blue ribbons in the sectional dress contest were awarded to Eva Kelly, Marie Elliott, Pearl Koulas and Ruth Russon. Eva Kelly was chosen County Delegate to the State Contest. An excellent exhibit with entertainment by local clubs was held in May at the Town Hall under the direction of the Chairman, Mrs. Percy Beardsley. Mrs.

Beardsley attended the local leaders' camp at the Massachusetts State College. Several club members attended county and state 4-H camps. A Family Certificate was awarded to the Beardsley family for their participation in 4-H Club Work .

Garden club members participated in the children's garden exhibit and program in Horticultural Hall, Boston. Dolores Stanton won a medal in the junior vegetable judging contest. Arthur Swanson won first prize in the Middlesex North Garden Contest. Dolores Stanton, Ernest Kirby and Stuart Bickford were awarded prizes of \$2.00 each in the Middlesex North Garden Contest, also Peter McHugh, Edward Parker, Fred Nystrom, Edward Boutilier and Joseph Gill received \$1.00 each. Edward Parker and Dolores Stanton were also awarded one half expenses to Camp Middlesex for excellent gardens. At the County-wide Boys' Day Contest in Handicraft, Eliot Carey won first prize and Ralph Peterson second.

REPORT OF INSPECTOR OF ANIMALS

Board of Selectmen

Gentlemen :

The following is my twenty-fourth annual report of the work done by this department during the year 1938, under the direction of the Division of Live-Stock Disease Control, State Dept of Agriculture.

The annual inspection of Cattle, Sheep and Swine is now completed and a detailed report has been sent to the above mentioned Department.

Several stables were reported where tuberculin testing was not conducted under State Supervision because the owners had no cattle a year ago, when inspection took place.

There are 195 Stables in which 736 Dairy Cows are kept. Also 182 Young Cattle and 22 Bulls making a total of 940 Heads, which is 17 less than last year. There is a decrease of 35 Dairy Cows and 2 Bulls, and an increase of 20 Young Cattle.

There are 713 Swine, 27 Sheep and 40 Goats, an increase in all three, but the greatest in the number of goats.

During the regular Tuberculin tests, Cows reacted as tuberculous, in three different stables; they were slaughtered and the stables thoroughly cleaned and disinfected.

17 Cows and 3 Young Cattle were shipped into Town from outside the State, upon permits issued by the State Authorities, all were identified and released upon proof that they came from accredited herds free from tuberculosis and Bangs disease.

25 Dogs were quarantined, after having bitten persons. All were later released and no case of Rabies developed. 5 other dogs were inspected on reports of suspected Rabies. 1 Cat bit was investigated.

25 Hogs were quarantined, on suspicion of Hog Cholera, some were slaughtered and several died of influenza, the few remaining were released after sixty days.

Owners of Cattle desiring assistance from the State in the prevention of Bangs Abortion Disease may apply to the Director of Livestock

Control for the vaccination of any or all Calves in their possession, not less than 4 or more than 8 months old. The application shall be made on a Prescribed Form and shall be accompanied by the Prescribed Fee. (50 cents for each Animal.)

Effective July 4th 1938, a law and order states that all cattle to be used for Dairy purposes (including cattle returning to the State from pasture) must when moved in any way) into this State, be accompanied by a certificate of health indicating that each animal six months of age or over, was negative to blood test for Bangs abortion disease, applied within 30 days prior to date of said transfer or shipment. This certificate also bears on its face, the stamped and written approval and signature of the Livestock Official of the State from which the shipment originated.

All animals shipped in contrary to the above order are quarantined at the owners expense and may then be returned to the state in which shipment originated or immediately slaughtered or submitted to a blood test which should prove negative before being released.

No more Federal funds will be used to help pay for animals that react to Bangs abortion Disease after April 1st 1939, unless the State appropriates money for the same purpose.

Equine Encephalomyelitis, a disease new to this section, appeared in this State during August, September and October, causing the death of several persons and 268 horses.

This is a disease of horses and mules, the carriers are blood sucking flies and mosquitoes. The first symptoms of this disease are twitching of the lips and general drowsiness, and if the disease is not arrested, paralysis of the throat and hind quarters follows, ending in death.

Precautions to be taken include screening and frequent spraying against mosquitoes and flies.

Vaccination of all horses is advised especially those in pasture. If symptoms occur, contact your Veterinarian at once. Do not keep horses in pasture at night.

Horses dying of this disease should be buried at once, deep and in quicklime, or burned unless delivered to a rendering establishment.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

To The Citizens Of The Town Of Chelmsford:

The Board feels honored in making its report for the year 1938. A year that has seen changes in the functioning of the department, and for the most part we believe, in the very best interests of the town.

In the spring of the year when extensive alterations were being made in the hall, the Board worked diligently to have an office of its own, in which its business could be transacted, its records and files, communications, properties, etc., could be kept in proper condition, for, as we believe, no other department is any more important, or the service rendered by its members, than the Board of Health of any community.

As a result of our efforts, we have an office and in it a complete record of all business carried on, important communications, our dealings with the State Department of Public Health, and the general conduct of the office excellently taken care of, and we extend at this time an invitation to any citizen of the town to sit in at our meetings, inspect our books or to offer any suggestion that might enable us to better our work as members of the Board of Health.

The Board organized for the year with Raymond H. Greenwood as Chairman, Edmund J. Welch as Secretary, and George H. McNulty as third member.

What should be of vital importance to the citizens of this town are the many appointments that come under the jurisdiction of the Board, namely: Milk Inspector, Meat Inspector, Plumbing Inspector, Physicians, Dentist and Agent, for, the duties of these appointees are most important, in safeguarding the health of this community, consequently it is necessary that they possess the knowledge which is required for their respective positions. Before electing these various officials the Board weighed very carefully their qualifications, past performances, etc.

Two changes in the personnel of the department were made during the year, namely the Agent of the Board and School Dentist. The Board feels that they have made excellent choices in the persons of Dr. Charles Farrington as Dentist, and Isabelle H. McDonough as Agent. Both are performing their work satisfactorily and their appointments have met with general approval throughout the town.

Melvin Masters, as inspector of Milk, Charles Midwood as inspector of Plumbing, Winton Gale as inspector of Meats, and the Health Physicians Drs. Scoboria and Carriel have performed their duties splendidly, and are a credit to the department.

Another item that should receive the individual attention of the taxpayers is the functioning of our board financially.

Our budget for the year 1938 in the amount of \$5075.00 was approved and passed at the annual meeting. The largest item in the budget is labelled "Board of Health, Aid," and the sum of \$2000.00 was appropriated in March. We found it necessary to ask for an additional \$600.00 at the special meeting to carry us through the year on our Aid account. The amount appropriated at the annual meeting is insufficient, due to the fact that new cases are added during the year, a situation over which we have no control. Aid is the term applied to those whose condition requires hospitalization resulting from communicable diseases. Any patient that is admitted to the various State Sanatoriums with the approval of the Board, the Board is billed for the amount of care and treatment once a month. The families of the respective patients are bound by law to reimburse the town in full or in part according to their circumstances. It is an important duty of the Board to see that such re-imburements are being made to the town. We feel that we have taken care of this duty extremely well during the past year. The number of cases have been reduced from seven in the beginning of the year to two which is the present number.

We had a balance in our budget at the end of the year in the following amounts: Agent's salary \$17.78; Aid \$47.99; Maintenance \$.05; Care of Dumps \$35.00.

Another phase of the Health situation in town is the disposing of waste materials. We have two so-called town dumps in existence. One

in the Westland's and the other in the North Section. The latter one is in a deplorable condition, due to the fact from the time this tract of land was purchased for this purpose, the road leading into the dump was never put in proper condition for use, never plowed in the winter time, and as a result of this, a public dump has been created everywhere in the vicinity, but the place designated for such. But on the other hand the disposal of dumping materials has become a real problem.

We feel that the time has come when this town should have collections of rubbish, etc., not once a year, but once or probably twice a month. It is a condition that affects every householder, and we are deluged with complaints from people about their properties being used for public dumping grounds. At a very small cost to the taxpayers, this problem could be solved, thereby removing a grave menace to public health.

This report is rather detailed, but essential, we believe. The health of our community comes first and the members of the Board are untiring in their efforts to see that this is accomplished.

We wish to thank sincerely the various officials of other departments for their co-operation extended to us during the year.

Dear Sir:

As Board of Health Agent from September 1 to Dec. 31, 1938, I wish to submit the following report:

For the past 4 months I have done my utmost to carry on the work of Public Health Service in the town for the control of all types of communicable diseases among the townspeople, both school and pre-school children as well as adults. Too, I have given my time freely in

investigation in cases of illness and advice was given both in nursing care and sanitation.

During my short term there were no severe epidemics of common diseases among children and yet, we feel that of those cases reported, the number could have been some what decreased if parents would only realize a little more carefully the rules of the Board of Health and their importance. Keeping children out of school and away from other children when he shows the first suspecion of illness, and then an early diagnosis by a doctor will be two great factors in cutting down our contagious diseases.

We are proud to report that, during the past year, no cases of diphtheria were reported as against three the preceding year. This perfect record should help parents realize the benefit derived from immunization against this dreaded disease which so often proves fatal or has the possibility of leaving the child with some handicap for the rest of his life.

Diphtheria toxoid is given to children, by the school doctors, from 6 months to twelve years; older children receive toxin anti-toxin. Free clinics are held usually in the spring and fall with transportation provided. Time and place of clinics are always announced in the schools and in all local newspapers.

Diphtheria is preventable and all parents owe it to their children to give them this protection. In turn, this will help our aim—to wipe diphtheria off our records entirely.

This gives children an excellent opportunity for having their teeth put in perfect condition, an important factor for the continuance of good health. Also we wish to keep Chelmsford in its fine rating as among the top list of Massachusetts town with children having perfect teeth.

Gentlemen :

I have the honor to present the report of the Milk Inspection Division for the year ending December 31, 1938.

811 samples of milk, seized from milk Dealers, were examined for Total Solids and Fats; 547 for bacterial content; 519 for Sediment; 229 for Temperature. The yearly average was 12.77% Total Solids; 3.92% Fat; 8000 merian bacterial count; 473 sediments were satisfactory, 46 were unsatisfactory. 38 samples of cream were up to legal requirements with a medium bacterial count of 9000 per cubic centimeter.

Approximately 2210 quarts of milk; 193 quarts of cream; 42 quarts of skimmed milk, were consumed daily. 22.72% of the milk was sold at wholesale; 78.28% at retail; 88.28% was pasteurized; 11.92% was raw.

Milk Dealers listed 563 producers as their source of supply; 360 of these were inspected and scored; 5 producers were not approved. 446 samples from producers were examined prior to pasteurization.

32 Stores were licensed to sell milk; 28 Dealers were licensed to sell milk; 7 stores were registered to sell Oleomargarine; 4 Milk Plants were licensed to pasteurize. \$76.50 received from license fees were paid to the Town Treasurer.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

January 28, 1939

To the Citizens of the Town of Chelmsford:

We, herewith, submit our report for the year 1938.

At the Annual Town Meeting the voters adopted a set of zoning by-laws as drawn up by the Planning Board.

During the spring the Board of Selectmen held hearings in the different precincts of the town, at which the Planning Board answered any questions regarding the new laws.

Later, at a Special Town Meeting, the action of the voters concerning zoning at the Annual Town Meeting was sustained.

Your committee believes that, while zoning offers many possible advantages to all classes in the town, the small home owner, the one who cannot afford to lose, will benefit the most. As the fire department and insurance protects him from loss through fire, and the police department protects his property from thieves, so the zoning by-laws protect his property from depreciation due to predatory interests.

The Board holds monthly meetings at the Town Hall. At the last few meetings, the question of the application of zoning has been studied particularly attention being given to temporary structures. At the meetings any citizen with questions on town planning will be welcomed.

I submit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Chelmsford for the period from June 26, 1936 to August 23, 1938, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. This is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. Herman B. Dine, Assistant Director of Accounts.

Sir :

In accordance with your instructions I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Chelmsford for the period from June 26, 1936, the date of the previous audit, to August 23, 1938, and submit the following report thereon :

The financial transactions, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing

bills for collection, were examined, checked, and verified by a comparison with the books of the town accountant and the treasurer.

The books and accounts of the town accountant were examined and checked. The recorded receipts were analyzed and compared with the departments collecting money for the town.

The appropriations as entered in the ledger were checked with the town clerk's record of appropriations voted by the town.

The ledger accounts were analyzed, the necessary adjusting entries were made, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town as of August 23, 1938.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The recorded receipts were analyzed and compared with the records in the departments collecting money for the town and with the other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the payments were checked with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the disbursement of town funds.

The cash book balance on August 23, 1938, was verified by a reconciliation of the bank balances with statements furnished by the banks of deposit and by actual count of the cash in the office.

The payments on account of debt and interest were proved with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities on file.

The savings bank books representing the investment of the several trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer, the treasurer of the library trustees, and the treasurer of the insurance fund commissioners, were examined and listed. The income was proved and the disbursements were verified.

It is recommended that the income from the Aaron George Cemetery Fund, which is payable to the treasurer of the library trustees, and the expenditure thereof, be entered on his books.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked. The poll, property, and motor vehicle excise taxes outstanding at the time of the previous examination were audited, and all subsequent commitments were reconciled with the assessor's warrants. The payments to the treasurer were checked to the treasurer's cash book, the recorded abatements were compared with the assessors' records of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the respective ledger accounts.

The accounts of the tax collector, as collector for the East Chelmsford Water District, the North Chelmsford Fire District, and the South Chelmsford Water District were examined and checked, and the payments to the treasurer were compared with the amounts entered on the treasurer's cash book.

Verification of the outstanding accounts was made by sending notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The records of tax titles held by the town were examined and checked with the deeds on file. The amounts added to the tax title account were compared with the collector's records, the recorded redemptions were checked with the receipts as shown on the treasurer's cash books, and the tax titles were listed, proved, the checked with the records in the Registry of Deeds.

The town clerk's records of sporting and dog licenses were examined, the payments to the State being verified by a comparison with the receipts on file and the payments to the town treasurer being compared with the treasurer's cash book.

The accounts of the public welfare, school, and all other departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined, checked, and reconciled with the treasurer's and the accountant's books. It was noticed that various accounts of several departments have been outstanding for many years, and it is therefore recommended that they be abated in the event that they are found to be uncollectible.

The accounts of the sealer of weights and measures were not examined owing to the absence from the town of that official.

It was found that a large part of the library fines collected had been spent for library expenses that should have been met from the appropriation granted by the town or from the income derived from library trust funds. This matter has been mentioned in previous reports and once more it is recommended that such receipts be turned over to the town treasurer in compliance with the provisions of Section 53, Chapter 44, General Laws.

The surety bonds of the town treasurer, tax collector, town clerk, and treasurer of the library trustees for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

In addition to the balance sheet referred to, there are appended to this report tables showing a reconciliation of the cash of the town treasurer and of the treasurer of the library trustees, together with sum-

maries of the tax, assessment, tax title, and departmental accounts, as well as tables showing the trust fund transactions.

For the co-operation extended by the various town officials during the progress of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

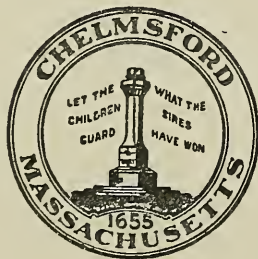

REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of the Town of Chelmsford:

We submit herewith the report of the School Committee for the year ending December 31, 1938.

ADDITION TO HIGH SCHOOL

In the report of every committee since 1928, there has been mention made of the overcrowded condition in the High School. We are happy to state that with construction already started on the addition to the High School it will not be necessary this year.

Early in the summer of 1938, we invited the Board of Selectmen, the Board of Assessors, the Board of Health, and the Finance Committee to meet with us for the purpose of discussing the necessity of an addition to the High School. Encouraged by such meeting, we asked Ashton & Huntress, the architects who had prepared the previous plans, to submit plans for a less elaborate addition.

With three new sets of plans, we met with the Taxpayers Association and received the unanimous support of the plans subsequently adopted. We met with Finance Committee and received its support. We also held meetings in each part of the town at which every voter was invited to attend.

As a result of such meetings, we asked the voters to approve an article in the Town Warrant authorizing the construction of an addition to the High School by way of a PWA grant. The town voting in favor of this article and authorizing the construction of an addition, not to exceed \$105,454, we made application for and received a grant from the PWA in the amount of 45 per cent of the cost of the addition, not to exceed \$47,454. The balance of \$58,000 has been raised by a ten-year bond issue.

On December 27, 1938, we entered into a contract with Louis Marion & Son, the lowest bidder for the construction of the addition, and work was started immediately.

FINANCES

The expenditures of the School Department in detail appear in the

Town Report under the heading "Report of Town Accountant."

Following the tradition of preceding committees, we have made every effort to keep the expenditures as low as possible. In cost per pupil of the eighty-three towns in the Commonwealth having a population of five thousand or over, Chelmsford is the eighty-first on the list.

SCHOOLS

Our grade schools are all in good condition and with the exception of the Westlands School are not overcrowded. When the addition to the High School is completed, we will have available two extra rooms in the McFarlin School. The Quessy School in West Chelmsford is only partially filled. If necessary, we will be able to accommodate all grade pupils by re-districting and making use of the extra space in these two schools. Our High School has always been given a grade A rating by the State Board of Education. Due to the large increase of high school pupils, now over four hundred and eighty, the State Board has notified us that unless two new teachers are added immediately our grade A rating will be removed. According to the ruling of the State Board of Education, we should have a teacher for every thirty pupils to retain our grade A rating. We now have thirty-six and six-tenths pupils for each teacher and we recommend the appointment of two new teachers, when the high school addition is ready for use.

TRANSPORTATION

Each year sees an increase in the number of pupils entitled to and receiving transportation to and from the various schools.

Our contract with George W. Marinel expired in June, 1938. We entered into a new contract for the term of three years with George W. Marinel. Due to the increase in the number of pupils transported and the increased mileage, one extra bus was added to the contract, and this meant an increase from \$9000 per year to \$10,500 per year.

Since this contract was entered into, two of the old buses have been replaced by two new buses and a third bus has been ordered.

We would like to state that the service given by Mr. Marinel has always been highly satisfactory, and that he has at all times cheerfully co-operated with the Committee.

MISCELLANEOUS

We would like to thank the teachers and principals of the grade schools and the High School for their loyalty and effort in the teaching

and training of the pupils entrusted to their care, as well as for their extra work which we know to be considerable.

We also thank Mr. Wright, our Superintendent of Schools, for his loyalty and efforts not only in his regular school duties, but for all the extra work he has done for the Committee.

We also thank the Parent-Teacher Associations of Chelmsford for their aid to the schools and school children.

We also thank the members of the High School Building Committee for their time and efforts which we realize are a heavy burden.

We recommend that the citizens of Chelmsford read carefully the report of the Superintendent of Schools, in which will be found information of value.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Committee :

My eleventh annual report is hereby submitted through you to the citizens of Chelmsford. The earliest school report in the files of the school department is for the year 1874-1875, the year in which two high schools were established. The reports for a number of years since are missing. School registers dating from the school year 1888-1889 are on file either in the office of the superintendent or in the town hall. These registers often provide the only official record of the ages of adults who attended our schools years ago, and for that reason are invaluable. May I suggest that if citizens have old school records of any kind, town reports, lists of graduates, graduation programs, etc., all this material is of historic value and should be preserved. We would be glad to have such records turned over to us for preservation.

TEACHERS

The usual table is given showing the teachers at the beginning of the year and the date when they began work in Chelmsford. Only two changes have occurred during the year, both in the High School. Warren C. Dean resigned in June in order to take a position in Northeastern University, and Beth R. Hoffman in order to take up work at Boston University. Helen R. Poland, a former teacher in the High School, was engaged for one position, and Emile Gauthier, a graduate of our own schools and of Harvard, for the other. No changes were made in the elementary schools.

Although salaries in Chelmsford are below the average for towns of this class, teachers have been willing to remain for long periods of service. This has been very much to the advantage of the town. The attitude of parents and townspeople has made Chelmsford a pleasant town in which to work. In general the best of good feeling exists between parents and teachers, a condition essential to the proper training of children. Any occurrence which tends to break down the desired relation of confidence and mutual support between home and school is to be deplored for the possible effect it may have on the children. The teachers appreciate the cordial support which is so generally given.

Without exception the teachers are earnest and hard-working. They are progressive in their attitude, eager to keep abreast of the developments in their profession. A considerable number each year have attended summer schools or have taken extension courses for credit toward degrees. The following have received degrees during their term of service with us: in the High School, Miss McCarthy and Miss MacBrayne; in the elementary schools, Mr. Forrest, Miss Thayer, Mr. Hilyard, Miss Perry, and Mr. Rikkola. The table of teachers gives the degrees and the institutions from which they were received.

ENROLLMENT

A table at the end of the report shows the enrollment by grades and by buildings on October 1, 1938, and also the comparative total enrollment or the last ten years. Note the steady increase in the High School. This growth has offset almost exactly the lessened attendance in the elementary schools. The table below shows the building enrollment for the last five years.

This table shows the trend of school enrollment in the various sections of the town. The High School is increasing, and in all probability will enroll over 500 students next September. The McFarlin School has grown steadily. There are now about ten pupils in that school who would be attending the Westlands School if there were seats for them in that building. New families are coming into the Westlands as a result of the building there. In all probability it will be necessary to shift more pupils from that section to the McFarlin School next September. On the other hand the Quessy School has been losing in enrollment. As suggested in my report last year, by changing slightly the transportation routes, twenty to twenty-five pupils could be transferred from the McFarlin School to Quessy. I advise that this matter be given early consideration, in order that, if the change seems advisable, the promotion cards issued in June may make note of the change.

TRANSPORTATION

The table below shows the increase in the number of pupils being transported in the last five years.

A three-year contract with Mr. George Marinel terminated last June. During the period of this contract there had been numerous complaints of the busses being over-loaded, and a few complaints that children were being required to walk too far to reach a bus stop. A careful study showed that the situation could be remedied only by adding one more bus to the service and by changing the routes slightly. The new contract calls for the use of five busses instead of four. The busses are not now over-loaded, as they were previously. Some children at the High and McFarlin schools do have to wait a considerable time after school, owing to the fact that each bus makes two or three trips from these schools. The only remedy for this condition would be to add more busses, at an increased cost. The change in routes has worked out satisfactorily.

EXCEPTIONAL CHILDREN

For many years the State has recommended, or required, special educational facilities for children who cannot be adequately educated in regular classes. This would include children who are physically handicapped, lame, deaf, blind, etc.; and also a larger group of those who are mentally handicapped, those children who cannot progress as rapidly as most children do, or who cannot profit by the usual school program. The school law requires that each town shall ascertain annually the number of children three years or more retarded in mental development. This is not done by the local teachers, but by specialists from the various state hospitals who are assigned to groups of towns. If ten or more such children are found, the law further provides that a special class, or classes, shall be established for their instruction. This law is mandatory, the wording is **shall provide**, not **may**. Any town with a school enrollment of one thousand has more than ten such children. The ratio of the mentally handicapped children to the whole number is a fairly constant one. Chelmsford has had, probably, more than ten children three years or more retarded ever since the state has provided for special class instruction. When the High School gives up the use of the two rooms in the McFarlin School, on the completion of the addition, one of these rooms should be used for such a class. Several advantages would result. In the first place, a more suitable program would be offered to those

children who through no fault of their own cannot profit from the regular program. The work in the class, which must be a small one, would be adjusted to the needs of each individual pupil. A second gain is found in the fact that these children now require more than a proportional amount of the teacher's time in the regular classes. Also, the town would be complying with a clearly stated mandatory law.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

Chelmsford has lagged behind most towns of its class in the matter of providing vocational education. In part this need has been supplied by Lowell Vocational School. It may reasonably be expected that with the completion of the new school in Lowell more of our boys will be attracted to that school and will apply for admission. Whether Lowell will have room for more boys from Chelmsford and other suburban towns the future will tell. But even with Lowell supplying the means for real vocational education, there is a place for courses in practical arts in the upper grades and the High School. Our courses are too closely confined to the study of books; laboratories and shops for hand-work of various types are needed for both boys and girls. This problem ranks second to the one of supplying seats and desks for an increasing enrollment. The table below shows the enrollment of Chelmsford pupils in Lowell Vocational School on Oct. 1st for the last five years.

The tuition charge is \$150 a year, and there is a reimbursement from the State of one-half the amount paid. Agreement to pay tuition is withdrawn if the school reports that a student is irregular in attendance or is making no effort. A mid-year report is made to the Superintendent on attendance, effort, and standing.

THE HIGH SCHOOL

The Department of Education annually classifies all high schools as A or B schools. A high school in class A has certain certification privileges which are not extended to class B schools. Needless to say it has greater prestige. The Chelmsford High School has been rated as in class A since it was established in 1917. The rating is based on a written inquiry dealing with the organization of the school, number of pupils, number of teachers, length of recitation periods, number in each class, courses offered, points required for graduation, etc. It is a comprehensive and searching inquiry. This is followed by a personal visit by the

Supervisor of Secondary Education, after which the rating for the year is given.

On Nov. 30, 1938, Mr. A. Russell Mack made his official visit. In a letter following this visit, he calls attention to Rule 2 of the Regulations for Approval of High Schools, which reads as follows:

“Exclusive of the principal, the number of teachers in the school should be such that in general the ratio of pupils in the membership of the school to teachers does not exceed thirty to one.”

Mr. Mack further states that the ratio was formerly 25 to 1, and was expanded to 30 to 1 after the depression forced a cut in school budgets. He finds the ratio in Chelmsford High School to be 36.6, one of the worst in the state. He writes: “It is very obvious that the rating of Chelmsford High School as class A should be placed in jeopardy.” He recommends the engaging of three additional teachers, one or more of them at once.

Students from Lowell Teachers College have worked in some rooms as cadet teachers; our own High School students in the commercial department have aided in clerical work; Mr. Marinel has furnished busses beyond the strict letter of his contract; the Police Department has rendered efficient service both at games and at other times; leaders of scout troops and of 4-H clubs have supplemented classroom instruction; the parent-teacher organizations have given loyal support. To these and to all others who have been of assistance, and to you, members of the School Committee, in behalf of teachers and pupils I express our deep appreciation.

REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

January, 13, 1939

My dear Mr. Wright:

I am pleased to submit herewith my ninth annual report as principal of Chelmsford High School. In it I shall attempt to call to the attention of the parents and taxpayers interesting facts concerning the school.

There were 236 boys and 233 girls enrolled September 7, 1938. On January 3, 1939, there were 234 boys and 242 girls. The total enrollment for the present school year up to January 3, 1939, is 495. That is an increased enrollment of 41 over January 1, 1938.

The pupils of Chelmsford High School deserve and should have the necessities required to receive, not only the maximum educational advantages, but the best possible equipment to develop and maintain their health and safety. It is with these facts constantly in mind that we are willing to point out any lack of these necessities in our school, and when we ask for improvements we do it for the welfare of the pupils.

Every pupil who is admitted to Chelmsford High School has a right to achieve a certain amount of success if he applies himself to that purpose. When a pupil fails to keep up for any reason not his own fault, we are very glad to give him what extra help he will use in order to catch up. Each teacher is at school at least two afternoons every week to work with these pupils. May I ask for the cooperation of parents of any pupils who are failing in any work to see to it that their boys and girls take advantage of this special help.

Pupils who are ill should remain at home for their own health and the health of others. The large majority of pupils attend school very regularly, but there are a few who are absent too often. If parents of these children would keep them in school, there would be fewer failures at the end of the school year.

Coaches and athletes are doing a splendid job, with the inadequate equipment and facilities at hand. At the present time there are no showers for the girls who play basketball, and the addition to the building now in progress does not provide for showers or dressing rooms for either boys or girls. These should be installed just as soon as possible. There could well be a question as to the advisability of trying to train athletes and have athletic contests without showers and dressing rooms for all athletic teams.

Assemblies are being held nearly every Wednesday in the McFarlin basement. The student body is divided into two groups for assembly purposes, because we did not consider it safe to crowd the entire group into that room at one time. On two occasions when we had out of town lecturers, we went to the Center Town Hall where the whole group met together. Besides the assemblies where we have had outside talent, we have had many where the teachers and pupils have furnished the program. These programs have been very well done and much credit is due the pupils and teachers in charge.

We are ready at all times to have parents and friends visit school and give us their constructive criticisms. If your children are not bringing satisfactory reports home to you, please come and confer with the teachers. I am sure you will find that this will work for the good of the boys and girls.

The pre-school clinic in May was better attended than ever before, and it shows the increasing trend toward the desire to correct defects before the child enters school in the fall.

The Red Cross, again very generous, made it possible for twenty worthy pupils in our schools to have their tonsils and adenoids removed; thirty-four were performed at different hospitals in Lowell during the summer vacation; your nurse transported many of the children without charge.

Let me again this year urge parents to watch closely the health of their children and guard against unnecessary illness and absence from school because of "common colds." At any sign of further infection the parent should instinctively call in a physician to diagnose the disease, for a nurse is not allowed to do so. During this year a number of children were excluded as suspicious cases of Whooping Cough and Chicken Pox, and the Board of Health notified. When such a situation occurs, the school doctors and school nurse examine all the pupils in the room or school. When contagion occur, examinations are are repeated every few days until the disease is checked. Children who have been absent from school five days or more must have a certificate from their doctor or the Board of Health before returning.

A check-up of all schools in November, 1938 showed that all pupils from Grade Two to Grade Eight have been immunized except twenty-eight, some of whom have moved into town since the last regular immunization clinic in September, 1937. The majority of first grade pupils were immunized before entering school and those who were not are to be done at the next clinic. After many visits to the school fifty-four consents were obtained by the school nurse and turned over to the Board of Health.

Dr. Archibald, Health Officer; Dr. Carrol, his assistant; and Miss Martin, State consultant, have visited your nurse many times during the year and have been very helpful.

I wish to thank the Lions Club, Rod and Gun Club, Girl Scouts (both in the Center and in the Westlands), Boy Scouts, Girls' Club, Lowell Lodge of Elks, Christian Endeavor of First Presbyterian Church, Lowell, and all others who made possible a more happy Christmas for many people, and who kept alive the true Spirit of unstinted giving.

The Parent-Teacher Organizations go on doing their fine work, without advertisement or great acclaim; but those whom they benefit will always remember with appreciation their efforts to do good. I also wish to thank the School Committee, School Physicians, Parents, Teachers, and you Mr. Wright, for such excellent co-operation in every way during the year 1938.
