ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Twenty-Two Thousand (\$22,000.00) Dollars or some other sum to purchase a Fire Truck for the Fire Department to be purchased under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell or otherwise dispose of the Fire Truck by good and sufficient Quitclaim deed; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purchase of a Waste Collection Truck to be used by the Highway Department and to be purchased under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell by good and sufficient Bill of Sale, the Waste Collection Truck presently being used by the Highway Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a certain sum of money, namely Ten Thousand Five Hundred (\$10,500.00) Dollars from the Road Machinery Fund to purchase a street Sweeper for the Highway Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Three Thousand (\$23,000.00) Dollars or some other sum, to purchase a Grader for the Highway Department under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept a certain parcel of land devised to the Town under the will of the late Edith Perham; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee of three members to be named by Selectmen, to study and report back to the voters at a subsequent annual town meeting, the advisability of revising the printed Annual Town Report; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and transfer from the sale of lots and graves account, the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of beautifying the entrance to Heart Pond Cemetery in South Chelmsford; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of Nine Hundred (\$900.00) Dollars for the purchase of a Roto-tiller for the purpose of regrading sections where needed; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of purchasing three 1957 DeLuxe Tudor Police Cruisers to be used by the Police Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 34. In the event of an affirmative vote under Article 33, to see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell the three 1956 Tudor Chevrolet Police Cruisers which are now being used by the Police Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of mosquito control through aerial spraying; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to petition the General Court for the enactment of an act establishing a Selectmen-Town Manager form of government for the Town of Chelmsford; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept Sections 47C, 47D, and 47E of Chapter 31 of the General Laws which applies to the Welfare Compensation Plan; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tree Warden to work as a Laborer in the Tree Warden's Department and Poison Ivy Control Department at the rate of \$1.65 per hour; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to change the name of Park Road, which runs from Acton Road to Byam Road, to Barton Hill Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand (\$4,000.00) Dollars to be used for legal expenses in the defense of eminent domain proceedings arising out of land seizures for high school purposes; or act in relation thereto.

8. One gate may be used for ingress and egress by the owner or the licensee, or their agent.
9. The specifications of the fence shall compare with the Cyclone Invincible fence of the American Steel & Wire Co.
10. Around the entire licensed premises, a strip not less than ten (10) feet wide shall be free of all vegetation, and shall be covered with gravel.
11. This by-law shall be enforced by the Chief of the Fire Department.

ADJOURNED TOWN MEETING

March 18, 1957

The meeting was called to order at 7:40 P.M. by Moderator Edward J. DeSaulnier, Jr.

Mr. DeSaulnier called for a count. The tellers reported 201 members present, which constituted a quorum.

Mr. Schliebus moved that Article 44 be taken up out of order. It was so voted.

UNDER ARTICLE 44.

It was voted to instruct the Board of Assessors to use the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) from the free cash in the Treasury for the reduction of the 1957 tax rate.

UNDER ARTICLE 5.

On a motion by Robert F. McAndrew it was voted to authorize the Selectmen to act as its agent in any suit or suits which may arise during the current year, with authority to settle and adjust claims or demands for or against the Town; and to employ counsel whenever in their judgment it is necessary.

UNDER ARTICLE 6.

On a motion made by Charlotte P. DeWolf, it was voted to authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the Revenue of the current financial year beginning January 1, 1957 and to issue a note or notes therefor payable within one year and to renew any note or notes given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44 of the General Laws.

UNDER ARTICLE 7.

On a motion by Lewis I. Hilton it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Four and Forty-Five Cents (\$104.45) with which to meet bills for the previous years.

This vote was unanimous.

UNDER ARTICLE 8.

On a motion by Charlotte D. DeWolf it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Two Hundred Ninety-Five and 06/100 (\$12,295.06) Dollars to pay to the Treasurer of the Middlesex County Retirement System, the said amount being the Town's share of the pension, expense and Military service funds.

UNDER ARTICLE 9.

On a motion by Hans H. Schliebus it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars to be used as a Reserve Fund at the discretion of the Finance Committee as provided in General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 6.

On a motion by Charlotte P. DeWolf, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Six Hundred Forty-Four and 49/100 (\$9,644.49) Dollars to defray its share of the cost of the maintenance of the Middlesex County Sanatorium by the County of Middlesex.

UNDER ARTICLE 11.

On a motion by Edgar P. George it was voted to accept Orchard Lane as laid out by the Board of Selectmen and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk.

UNDER ARTICLE 12.

On a motion by Edgar P. George it was voted to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds \$800.00 for the purpose of reconstructing Orchard Lane.

UNDER ARTICLE 13.

On a motion by Daniel J. Hart it was voted to accept Bowl Road as laid out by the Board of Selectmen and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk.

UNDER ARTICLE 14.

On a motion by Daniel J. Hart it was voted to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds \$600.00 for the purpose of reconstructing Bowl Road.

UNDER ARTICLE 15.

On a motion by Robert F. McAndrew it was voted to accept Rutledge Avenue as laid out by the Board of Selectmen and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk.

UNDER ARTICLE 16.

On a motion by Robert F. McAndrew it was voted to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds \$500.00 for the purpose of reconstructing Rutledge Avenue.

UNDER ARTICLE 17.

On a motion by Edgar P. George it was voted to accept Aberdeen Road as laid out by the Board of Selectmen and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk.

UNDER ARTICLE 18.

On a motion by Edgar P. George it was voted to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds \$700.00 for the purpose of reconstructing Aberdeen Road.

UNDER ARTICLE 19.

On a motion by Daniel J. Hart it was voted to discontinue the public way, a street near the land of Robert Richardson and running from Westford Street to Old Westford Road and thus bounded:

Beginning at a stake and stones on the northerly side of the road leading from Chelmsford to Westford near the house of Robert Richardson and running northerly to an elm tree by the wall, thence to run on the old cart path as it now runs, and between the walls as they now stand till it intersects the road leading from Isaiah Spaldings to Lowell, said way passing over land of Robert Richardson and Isaiah Spalding.

UNDER ARTICLE 20.

On a motion by Carl A. E. Peterson it was voted to accept a certain sum of money from the Chelmsford Tercentenary Committee, Inc., said sum to be all the remaining funds belonging to the corporation after all expenses are paid, and said sum to be applied to the Town of Chelmsford excess and deficiency account.

UNDER ARTICLE 21.

On motion made by Edgar P. George to appropriate the sum of Thirty-Four Thousand Five Hundred Seventy-Three and 08/100 (\$34,573.08) Dollars for the permanent construction of Stedman St., and to meet said appropriation the sum of \$34,573.08 be transferred from the proceeds received from the State under the provisions of Chapter 718 of the Acts of 1956.

A hand vote was taken.

94 voted in the affirmative.

101 voted in the negative.

The motion failed.

UNDER ARTICLE 22.

On motion of Roger W. Boyd regarding borrowing the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars for the purpose of constructing a new highway garage on land purchased in 1955 on Richardson Road. Twenty-five Hundred Dollars of this amount may be used for plans, engineering fees and miscellaneous expense, necessary for the construction of this proposed building. This money to be repaid over a five year period and a committee of 5 be appointed to carry out this construction.

A hand vote was taken.

82 voted in affirmative

91 voted in the negative.

This motion failed.

UNDER ARTICLE 23.

On motion of Robert F. McAndrew to raise and appropriate Twenty-Two Thousand (\$22,000.00) Dollars to purchase a Fire Truck for the Fire Department to be purchased under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen. It was so voted.

UNDER ARTICLE 24.

On motion of Robert F. McAndrew it was voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell or otherwise dispose of the Fire Truck now being used by the Fire Department.

UNDER ARTICLE 25.

On motion of Daniel J. Hart it was voted to raise and appropriate \$14,000.00 Dollars for the purchase of a Waste Collection Truck to be used by the Highway Department and to be purchased under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen.

UNDER ARTICLE 26.

In regard to sale of Waste Collection Truck, this Article was dismissed.

UNDER ARTICLE 27.

On motion of Daniel J. Hart it was voted that the Town transfer the sum of Ten Thousand Five Hundred (\$10,500.00) Dollars from the Road Machinery Fund to purchase a Street Sweeper for the Highway Department.

UNDER ARTICLE 28.

On motion of Edgar P. George it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-One Thousand Five Hundred (\$21,500.00) Dollars to purchase a Grader for the Highway Department under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen.

UNDER ARTICLE 29.

In regard to accepting a certain parcel of land devised to the Town under the will of the late Edith Perham, this Article was dismissed.

UNDER ARTICLE 30.

On motion of Robert F. McAndrew it was voted that the Town appoint a committee of three members to be named by Selectmen, to study and report back to the voters at a subsequent Annual Town Meeting, the advisability of revising the printed Annual Town Report.

UNDER ARTICLE 31.

On motion of Arthur J. Colmer it was voted to appropriate and transfer from the sale of lots and graves account, the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of beautifying the entrance to Heart Pond Cemetery in South Chelmsford.

UNDER ARTICLE 32.

On motion of Arthur J. Colmer it was voted to raise and appropriate from available funds the sum of Six Hundred Fifty (\$650.00) Dollars for the purchase of a Roto-tiller for the purpose of regrading sections where needed.

UNDER ARTICLE 33.

On motion of Daniel J. Hart it was voted to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing three 1957 DeLuxe Tudor Police Cruisers to be used by the Police Department.

Krasnecki regarding authorizing the Selectmen and the Selectmen-Town Manager Committee to petition the General Court for the enactment of an act establishing a Selectmen-Town Manager form of government for the Town of Chelmsford as prepared by the Selectmen-Town Manager Committee; after much discussion a hand vote was taken.

UNDER ARTICLE 37.

On motion of Arthur Cooke regarding the acceptance of Section 47E of Chapter 31 of the General Laws; this motion failed.

UNDER ARTICLE 38.

On motion of Myles J. Hogan it was voted to authorize the Tree Warden to work as a Laborer in the Tree Warden's Department and Poison Ivy Control Department at the rate of \$1.65 per hour.

UNDER ARTICLE 39.

On motion of W. B. Batchelder it was voted to change the name of that section of Park Road between Acton Road and Byam Road to Barton Hill Road.

UNDER ARTICLE 40.

On motion of Hans H. Schliebus it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand (\$4,000.00) Dollars to be used for legal expenses in the handling of eminent domain proceedings arising out of land seizures for high school purposes and that said amount be used either for defense against Court action or settlement negotiations.

UNDER ARTICLE 41.

On motion of Charlotte P. DeWolf and Warren Wright it was voted to appoint a committee to make a study of available business machines suitable to use in transaction of Town business and make recommendations of same at the next Special or Annual Town Meeting.

UNDER ARTICLE 42.

On motion made by Thomas W. Sugden regarding the adoption of a By-Law regulating license fee for storing explosives; a hand vote was taken.

61 voted in the affirmative.

92 voted in the negative.

Motion for dismissal fails.

On motion of Joseph Lukas and Edward Baron to see if the Town will adopt the following by-laws:

1. The fee for any license granted to keep, store and sell over five (5) tons of explosives in permanent magazine or magazines, shall be five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00).

2. The fee for registrations of the above license shall be one-half the amount of the fee for such license; after much discussion a hand vote was taken.

68 voted in the affirmative.

80 voted in the negative.

The motion failed.

UNDER ARTICLE 43.

On motion by Thomas W. Sugden regarding the licensed premises for the storage of explosives; a hand vote was taken.

74 voted in the affirmative

62 voted in the negative. The motion for dismissal failed.

On motion of Edgar P. George the meeting adjourned at 10:55 P.M.

REPORT OF THE CEMETERY COMMISSION

Gentlemen:

The cemetery commissioners are pleased to submit the following report for the year 1957.

The purchase of a new garden tractor this year enabled us to re-grade and seed large areas never before possible. In the Hart Pond Cemetery a large area requiring 300 yards of loam was rototilled and seeded. In the West Cemetery a single section was regraded. Smaller areas were done in Fore Fathers and Fairview Cemetery. In the Pine Ridge Cemetery a very large area of one, four and eight grave lots was regraded and seeded with excellent results. A large area, now seeded to winter rye is being made ready for the near future, and a large section of woodland is being cleared for further expansion.

During the year, roads were oiled in the Hart Pond, Pine Ridge and Fore Fathers Cemeteries.

The new entrance was installed at Hart Pond Cemetery with many favorable comments from the lot owners.

During the past year we had 66 interments which is an all-time high. We sold 28 lots (an all-time high). Our income was \$5,064.00 and we collected \$7,598.34 for our Perpetual Care Fund, raising it to \$73,170.39. The sale of lots amounted to \$1,180.00, making this fund total \$2,881.50.

We would like to state here that as the town grows, so also must the cemetery department; and it is our estimate that within five years we will be having 100 interments per year.

We would like to thank the Board of Selectmen, the Superintendent of the Highway Department and all other town officials for their co-operation during the past year.

REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENSE COMMISSION

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen
Town of Chelmsford, Massachusetts

We of the Civil Defense Commission want to thank the Board of Selectmen, the Chief of the Fire Department, the Chief of Police as well as all the members of the organized groups of Civil Defense for their splendid co-operation we have received during the year 1957.

This past year has been one of satisfaction and progress for your committee, and one which has developed into reality many interested groups in the many phases of Civil Defense.

Our communication set-up reflects what can be accomplished when a young group of people get together with a common purpose in mind; that of a hobby that can be utilized for the common good of all people in the town. They meet at regular intervals, and put to use the radio equipment in the control center in the town hall. These radio hams have drills and code classes and have trained many young people in the field of radio communications. The State organization in Tewksbury as well as the Massachusetts State Headquarters in Natick have complimented this group for their loyalty in the test drills that were held many times during the year.

Our Auxiliary Police have met regularly and have become well trained in Police law and first aid. They have been called to duty on several occasions and have proved that this unit is one of which our people can be proud. They conducted a drive for the purpose of buying uniforms and were encouraged by the fine response from the people of our town.

Our regular Police Department now have their own base radio transmitting and receiving station. This operation has proved its worth in the efficiency and speed in handling calls. It gives direct car to base communication twenty-four hours a day without the necessity of clearing all calls through the Lowell Police Department.

We have activated classes in disaster first aid and each week this class meets for instruction by our school nurse. These classes have, we are sure, proved interesting and instructive to all those attending.

We were successful in obtaining matching funds from the State for equipment requested by the Police and Fire Departments. We have, as a result, returned to the Town Treasury the amount of \$2683.25. This means a savings to the taxpayers of this amount when we take advantage of matching funds.

We hope to improve our Civil Defense organization during the coming year, and we are sure that we have the willingness of everyone in

this respect to support our programs. We sincerely hope that many more of our citizens will respond in becoming more active in one of our many activities. We know that the satisfaction you will get, will in every way reflect the fact that your time has been well spent.

REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Board of Selectmen
Town Hall
Chelmsford, Massachusetts

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my report of the activities of the Fire Department for the year ending December 31, 1957.

Upon comparing the records of the department over the past four years, they reveal a steady increase of service calls requested of, and furnished by the Fire Department. In some types of services the number of requests have more than doubled. The only decrease is in the number of dump fires, which has dropped sharply, and that reflects a credit to Mr. Isadore Needham the caretaker of the Town Dump, for the manner in which he has carried out his duties.

The addition of a new pumper was made to the department in November as authorized by the voters at the Annual Town Meeting in March.

Additional apparatus is needed as has been proven in the past, and will be requested for the voters' consideration at our next Annual Town Meeting.

There have been other developments of vital interest that directly affect proper fire protection in Chelmsford, one in particular that I feel should be brought to the taxpayers attention, is manpower.

Over the years Chelmsford has depended upon call firefighters for manpower in fighting fires. A call firefighter is a person who gives of his time, over and above his regular pursuit of livelihood, for the good of his community and neighbor, for which he receives a token compensation.

The call firefighter spends much of his leisure time training and becoming proficient with the apparatus and equipment he is called upon to use. Firefighting methods, as everything else, are constantly changing and being improved upon, making it possible for the department and its personnel to do a better job.

Whenever possible the Chief of the Fire Department must appoint as call firefighters, men who shall be available to the department at all times, or at least have a balanced roster whereby fifty percent of his manpower will be on call at all times. This can be possible only if industry allows its personnel to leave their regular job to answer an alarm of fire. With the changing times, that situation has changed also.

In one fire company alone in Chelmsford last year, at least fifty percent of the company worked in an industry that issued an order forbid-

ding their personnel leaving to respond to an alarm of fire. Similar conditions exist throughout the Town, seriously impairing our man-power problem.

At one particular fire in 1957 at least twenty men were needed because of the nature of the fire. In three fire companies of our total of five, with a roster of ten men to each company, only three men were available to fight fire.

This leads to but one conclusion, the urgent need for more permanent firefighters, not only to have while on their regular tour of duty, but to be available for emergencies while on their off duty time.

At present the department has eleven (11) permanent firefighters. A survey conducted in 1954 by the New England Fire Insurance Rating Association, at the request of the Board of Selectmen, reports that a minimum of forty-two (42) permanent firefighters shall be provided to insure a working force.

1957 was a particularly hazardous year for forest fires and during the period of May 1 - 12, a state of emergency was declared. During this period, the State of Massachusetts will reimburse the cities and towns for any expense incurred in fighting forest fires. I have submitted a bill to the State in the amount of \$655.30 which will help to offset the labor expense paid out in fighting brush fires which occurred during the time the emergency was declared.

School Cafeterias and lunch rooms have been found in excellent condition and conducted in a sanitary manner. Chest X-Rays are required for all Food Handlers.

Sewage Disposal

Subdivisions, or multiple house lot plans, must be approved by the Board of Health. Subsurface drainage and sewage disposal and the requirements are accomplished by a field survey and percolation tests averaging one (1) test per every half acre before authorization for a Subdivision. All sewage disposal systems must be approved by the Board of Health before the Building Permits are issued by the Building Inspector.

Tests for private well water may be obtained without charge to Town Residents. The result of tests on the milk supply for Chelmsford is consistently good. Phosphatase test for proper pasteurization, coliform and bacteria counts are made at least six times during the year.

Bathing Beaches were heavily used and water samples were within the allowable contamination count.

Garbage Collections

The Garbage Collection Contract was awarded in 1956 through 1959 to the McKennedy Brothers. The Board of Health is certain that the superior work done by the McKennedy Brothers will be continued.

Mosquito Control Program

The Mosquito Control Program is set up under the Moth Department Budget. The effectiveness of this program has been proven by the almost elimination of the mosquito nuisance, and Encephalitis.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

The following is a report of the work accomplished by the Highway Department for the year 1957.

A total of 107,593 gallons of asphalt were used on various town roads with an additional 12,580 gallons on Chapter 90 roads. A total of 7,268 yards of gravel were used.

REPORT OF THE CHELMSFORD INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION

During 1957, the Chelmsford Industrial Development Commission completed the preparation of an attractive brochure which provides all the information regarding the Town which would be of interest to any industrial company or business firm seeking a location for a new plant. This pamphlet has been distributed to about 300 manufacturers of electronic equipment with the hope that it may induce one or more of them to consider establishing at least part of their operations in our town. Additional copies are available for real estate brokers and others who may receive requests for information regarding possible industrial sites.

In addition to acting as a clearing house for various inquiries from business men seeking new plant locations, the Commission has been instrumental, largely through the efforts of its former chairman, Mr. Thaddeus Zabierek, in finding a site for a small industrial firm which has now built a machine shop with 4000 square feet of floor space in the South section of Town. Members of the Commission also helped the owner of this business to resolve various problems which arose during the course of construction of the new plant. Currently the Commission is planning a comprehensive survey of the areas in Town which have been zoned for industrial use so that all details regarding this land, such as acreage, present ownership, approximate value, and similar information will be readily available.

Unfortunately, Mr. Thaddeus Zabierek, who has been one of the most active and effective members of the Commission since its establishment, found it necessary, because of the pressure of other business, to resign from the Commission toward the end of 1957. The Commission will miss Mr. Zabierek's valuable assistance and extends to him, on behalf of all the citizens of the Town, sincere thanks and appreciation for his conscientious efforts to bring new industry to Chelmsford.

REPORT OF THE PERSONNEL BOARD

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen
Town of Chelmsford

Gentlemen:

During the year 1957, the Personnel Board of the Personnel Wage and Salary Administration have heard the various department heads regarding their requests for salary increases and considered same.

We have presented our recommendations for the year 1958 before December 21, 1957 according to the By-Law.

1. Board member Charles P. Wright, due to ill health, resigned; effective date to be on the election of his successor. He was replaced by Board Member Charles E. Cooke, Jr. who was elected by the town employees on October 18, 1957.
2. The Board is required under the aforesaid By-Law to consider the following: Whenever the Personnel Board reviews the wage and salary provisions of this Plan it shall take into account and give such weight as it may deem desirable to the following:
 - a. Rates of pay for like positions in other Massachusetts towns considered by the Personnel Board to be comparable to Chelmsford.
 - b. Rates of pay for like jobs (if any) in commercial and business establishments in area of Chelmsford and vicinity.
 - c. The current level of the following cost-of-living indexes:
 1. Retail Price Index—published by the Department of Labor and Industries, Commonwealth of Massachusetts.
 2. Consumers Price Index—published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, U. S. Department of Labor.

Information on like positions in other towns has been furnished the Board by Department heads and is assumed to be accurate. The statistics on the retail price index have been studied by the Board. The combined price index, published by the Commonwealth shows between a four and five percent rise this year.

3. In view of tremendous population growth of Chelmsford, the Board feels that the Police Department should be expanded to some extent. The Department has strongly urged that the hours of work be shortened to bring them in line with most comparable towns and industry as a whole. The recommendations as to wages for the Police Department should be read together with the recommendations for proposed changes in Section 19 of the Personnel, Wage and Salary Administration By-Law which concerns hours.

4. Before writing this report, this Board met with all Department Heads and with the Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee in order to obtain the benefit of free discussion with them.

With these introductory remarks, we submit the following as the recommendation for Wages and Salaries for the year 1958.

Certain positions not deemed a substantial part of an employee's livelihood were not given a cost-of-living increase.

Samples from all dealers were collected several times during the year and were analyzed at the Howard Laboratories at Amherst, Mass., and all were above the legal standard. Several samples of water were also collected and analyzed.

Milk and pasteurization plants were inspected several times during the year and found satisfactory.

Police answered 2,523 calls in 1957. Summons served for out-of-town Police Departments 225. Stolen cars recovered 22. Business places found unlocked 161. Number of Arrests 95.

Cruiser mileage for three cruisers 196,224 miles, which is 5,922 more miles than patrolled in 1956.

The year 1957 was another busy year for your Police Department. The town is growing and with this growth the demand for more and more Police Service grows along with it. The crime of Breaking and Entering in the Night time took a big surge upward this year and we find that as many juveniles were involved as adults in this serious crime. The crime of malicious damage to property also climbed upward with the accent again on juveniles. At the present time we do not have a serious juvenile delinquency problem, but as the population grows the juvenile problem grows along with it and it may be necessary sometime in the future to send an officer to school for special training in this phase of Police Work.

This year I am asking for five additional Permanent Patrolmen, bringing our department up to fifteen men as of July 1, 1958 and I am asking that one patrolman be promoted to Sergeant, which will build our department up to a Chief, three Sergeants and eleven Patrolmen. This will give us four permanent men on each of three shifts and three permanent spare men who will fill in on days off.

Again this year your Police Department assisted at the various Halloween parties which were very successful and vandalism was kept at a minimum.

The Auxiliary Police Band under the able direction of Sergeant Larkin conducted many outdoor concerts during the past year and was greatly enjoyed by young and old alike, and it is planned to continue these fine concerts in 1958 for your enjoyment.

At the present time we have twenty-four Auxiliary Police Officers who were uniformed at no expense to the Town by donations from the people of the town.

Sergeant Basil Larkin is in charge of this fine group and conducts classes every two weeks on various phases of Police work. The Auxiliary Police were used at several outdoor events during the summer and handled their assignments efficiently.

At this time I wish to express my thanks to the Board of Selectmen and all other town officials and employees and to the general public for the excellent co-operation given to the Police Department during the past year.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 19, paragraph III subtitled, "Hours of Work Shall Be As Follows:", by striking out the language in paragraph III and inserting "For those occupying positions designated "Public Safety Occupations" and within the Fire Department, forty-eight (48) hours per week; Police Department, an average of forty-four (44) hours per week, scheduled in such a manner as the head of such department may deem advisable."

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 19, paragraph IV subtitled, "Hours of Work shall be as follows:" to read as follows: Overtime work for those beyond these hours may be compensated for by time off, except 'Mechanical and Construction Operations' hourly rates which shall be paid at the standard rate of pay for the job times one and one-half, and except the full time employees of the Fire Department who may be summoned and kept on duty because of a serious fire, and except for the Police Department who shall be paid the regular hourly rate for overtime.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town By-Laws by inserting the following section: All fees received by the Town Tax Collector by virtue of his office shall be paid in the Town Treasury; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 6. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be required to defray town charges for the current year; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to act as its agent in any suit or suits which may arise during the current year, with authority to settle and adjust claims or demands for or against the Town; and to employ counsel whenever in their judgment it is necessary; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of Revenue of the current financial year; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to borrow money in the year 1959 in anticipation of revenue of the year 1959; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money with which to meet bills for previous years; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money to pay to the Treasurer of the Middlesex County Retirement System, the said amount being the Town's share of the pension, expense and military service funds; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000), or some other sum, to be used as a Reserve Fund at the discretion of the Finance Committee as provided in General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 6; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Six Hundred Seventy-one and 42/100 Dollars, (\$10,671.42), to defray its share of the cost of the maintenance of the Middlesex County Sanatorium by the County of Middlesex.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following by-law:

The assessors, in addition to such other duties as are required by law, shall annually, beginning in 1959, cause to be printed and made available to the taxpayers, a complete list of real property subject to assessment, together with the names of the owners thereof and the amount for which such property is assessed.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to amend the by-law adopted March 9, 1953 under Article 55, as follows:

Strike out the words "at any or all Town meetings" and insert therefor, the words "at any Annual Town meeting and not less than 300 registered voters at any Special Town Meeting", so that the by-law will read: "A quorum of not less than two hundred (200) registered voters must be present at any Annual Town Meeting, and not less than three hundred (300) registered voters at any Special Town Meeting to legally transact and consummate the business of the Town"; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following by-law:

All Town Officers, when seeking a legal opinion from the Town Counsel, shall do so in writing. The Town Counsel shall render his opinion in writing. Copies of the request and reply shall be forwarded to the Board of Selectmen, who shall keep them in a permanent file open to the public during business hours; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to petition the General Court for the enactment of an act to change the time of holding the annual Town Meeting and Town Election, and providing for the submission of certain votes for referendum, as follows:

Section 1. The annual Town Meeting of the Town of Chelmsford shall be held on the first Monday in March, and all matters to be considered at the annual Town Meeting shall be considered at such meeting, except that the annual Town Election for the purpose of electing, by official ballot, town officers and voting on any question required by law to be placed upon the official ballot, shall take place at an adjournment of such meeting to be held on the third Monday in March.

Section 2. Any vote passed at any town meeting of said Town shall not become operative until after the expiration of a period of five days, terminating at five o'clock P. M. on the fifth day, exclusive of Sundays and holidays, from the day of the dissolution of such meeting. If, within the period of the said five days, a petition is addressed to and filed with the Selectmen, and is signed by not less than fifty voters of the Town, containing their names and addresses as they appear on the list of registered voters, asking that the question or questions involved in such vote be submitted to the voters of the Town, the Selectmen shall then frame and present the question or questions involved in such vote at the next annual election of officers at which time the question or questions involved shall be voted upon by ballot, using the check list, and such question or questions shall be determined by a majority vote of the registered voters of the Town voting thereon. If such a petition is not filed within said period of five days, the vote in the Town meeting shall become operative and effective upon expiration of said period.

Section 3. This act shall take effect upon its acceptance by a majority of the voters of said Town at a Town Meeting held not later than the annual Town Meeting in the year nineteen hundred and fifty-nine.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following by-law:

The fee for any license granted to keep, store and sell over five (5) tons of explosives in permanent magazine or magazines, shall be two thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars. The fee for registration of the above license shall be one-half the amount of the fee for such license.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will amend the Building Code, Article 1, as adopted at the Town meeting April 10, 1950, as follows:

Strike out the words "or other experience satisfactory to the Selectmen"; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to amend the by-law adopted by unanimous vote at the 1954 annual Town meeting (Article 105) as follows:

1. The entire premises shall mean entire licensed premises.
2. Sufficient fence capable of keeping unauthorized persons from said premises and sufficiently fire-proof in construction to prevent grass or brush fires entering such premises shall mean, a chain link fence with three (3) strands of barbed wire.
3. Said chain link fence shall be seven (7) feet high including the three (3) strands of barbed wire.
4. Top and bottom selvages to have a twisted and barbed finish.
5. Fence to follow ground line at all times.
6. Not less than two (2) drive gates shall be installed. These gates are to kept locked at all times, except when in use. The licensee or owner shall furnish keys to the Chiefs of the Fire and Police Departments.
7. The Chief of the Fire Department shall specify the size and location of all drive gates.
8. One gate may be used for ingress and egress by the owner or the licensee, or their agent.
9. The specifications of the fence shall compare with the Cyclone Invincible fence of the American Steel and Wire Co.
10. Around the entire licensed premises, a strip not less than ten (10) feet wide shall be free of all vegetation, and shall be covered with gravel.
11. This by-law shall be enforced by the Chief of the Fire Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following by-law:

Section 1. Any owner or occupant of land licensed to store, keep and sell explosives in permanent magazines, shall file with the Clerk of the Town, a bond running to the Town, with sureties approved by the treasurer thereof, as the foregoing table indicates:

Amount of explosives	Amount of bond
Up to 50,000 lbs.	\$1.00 per pound
50,000 lbs. to 100,000 lbs.	\$2.00 per pound
100,000 lbs. and over	\$3.00 per pound

Section 2. The amount stored and kept shall be ascertained from the records of the Department of Public Safety; further, the amount stored and kept shall cover a full calendar year, January 1, to December 31st.

Section 3. The Clerk of the Town, after determining the amount stored and kept, shall notify the owner or occupant of land licensed to store, keep and sell explosives, of the amount of the bond.

Section 4. Action on a bond filed under the above sections may be brought by any resident of the Town of Chelmsford to whom loss, damage or injury has resulted by reason of such storing, keeping, selling or transporting and shall be brought in the name of, and for the use and at the cost and expense of, such resident. If claims on any bond are established to an amount greater than the penal sum thereof, such claims shall be paid pro rata to the amount of the penal sum, and executions shall issue accordingly.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will adopt the following by-law: Any owner of land which has been excavated, shall erect barriers or take other suitable measures to protect persons from damages incident thereto. The penalty for violation of this section shall be as follows: for the first offense, Fifty Dollars (\$50.00); for the second offense, One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00); and for each subsequent offense, Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00). The Building Inspector shall enforce this by-law.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following by-law: The proceedings of Town Meetings shall be governed by the rules of practice contained in Robert's Rules of Order (1951 Ed.) except as modified by law or by the by-laws.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to petition the General Court for the enactment of an act to authorize the Town to add the Building Inspector to the list of Officers to be elected annually by the Registered Voters of this Town; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept Woodbine Street, as laid out by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in the Registry of Deeds for Northern Middlesex County; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept Southgate Road, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen, and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; and to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing Southgate Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept Hemlock Drive, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen, and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; and to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds, a certain sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing Hemlock Drive; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept Latch Road, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen, and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; and to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds, a certain sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing Latch Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept part of Rainbow Avenue, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen, and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; and to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds, a certain sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing part of Rainbow Avenue; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept Orchard Lane, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen, and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; and to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds, a certain sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing Orchard Lane; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept Bowl Road, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen, and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; and to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds, a certain sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing Bowl Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to accept Forrest Street, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen, and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; and to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds, a certain sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing Forrest Street; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept Kenwood Street, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen, and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; and to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds, a certain sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing Kenwood Street; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept Aberdeen Road, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen, and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; and to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds, a certain sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing Aberdeen Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to accept Sunrise Avenue, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen, and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; and to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds, a certain sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing Sunrise Avenue; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept Kiberd Drive, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen, and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; and to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds, a certain sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing Kiberd Drive; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept Wildes Road, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen, and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; and to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds, a certain sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing Wildes Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to accept Fairbanks Road, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen, and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; and to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds, a certain sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing Fairbanks Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to accept Colonial Drive, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen, and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; and to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds, a certain sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing Colonial Drive; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to pay for services rendered by the Acting Sanitarian from June 10, 1957 to September 27, 1957; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 41. In the event of an affirmative vote under the above article, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$770.00) for the purpose of paying the Acting Sanitarian for services rendered from June 10, 1957 to September 27, 1957; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to pay for transportation incurred by the Acting Sanitarian from June 10, 1957 to September 27, 1957; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 43. In the event of an affirmative vote under the above article, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Eight Dollars and Forty Cents (\$108.40) for the purpose of paying the Acting Sanitarian for transportation incurred from June 10, 1957 to September 27, 1957; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 44. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money to purchase an Addressograph-Multigraph, or some other equipment for the Town Offices; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 45. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following by-law: "No soil, loam, sand or gravel shall be removed from land not in public use in the Town of Chelmsford, unless such removal is approved by the Board of Appeals, and a permit for the same is granted by said Board of Appeals." This by-law is made under the authority of General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 21, Subsection 17.

ARTICLE 46. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 9 of the Chelmsford Zoning By-Laws to include:

C—SIDE YARDS, REAR YARD AND SET BACK EXCEPTIONS

1. Minimum side yard, rear yard and set back requirements shall not apply to any lot shown on a final or a definitive sub-division plan, duly approved by the Chelmsford Planning Board and duly recorded with the Registry of Deeds prior to the adoption of this zoning By-Law, but rather, said lots shall be subject to the side yard, set back and rear yard requirements effective on the date of recording with the Registry of Deeds.

2. Minimum side yard, rear yard and set back requirements shall not apply to any lot laid out by recorded deed or conveyance or shown on a duly recorded plan in conformity with the side yard, rear yard and set back requirements, if any, applicable to the construction of such a dwelling or other building on said lot at the time of said laying out or recording and said lot does not adjoin the land of the same ownership available for use in connection therewith, but rather said lots shall be subject to the side yard, set back, and rear yard requirements effective on the date of said laying out, recording or conveyance.

ARTICLE 47. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 10, B 1 of the Chelmsford Zoning By-Laws, by substituting the following:

B. ACCESSORY USES AND ACCESSORY BUILDINGS.

1. A detached accessory building may be located in the rear yard areas and on the same lot as the principal building, provided that not more than twenty-five per cent (25%) of the required area shall be so occupied, and further provided that an accessory building shall not be located nearer than ten (10) feet from the principal building subject to the yard requirements of the district in which it is located. An accessory building attached to its principal building shall be considered an integral part thereof and as such shall be subject to the front, side, and rear yard requirements applicable to the principal building. The provision for a detached garage is set forth as follows:

a. A garage may be located on either side of the principal building, but shall not protrude beyond the front line of the principal building, and shall be subject to the yard requirements of the district in which it is located as set forth in Section 9, C 1 and 2 of this By-Law.

ARTICLE 48. To see if the Town will vote to accept an Emergency Rescue Truck, to be used by the Fire Department, from the Box 7 Associates; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 49. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-five Thousand and 00/100 Dollars (\$75,000.00), or some other sum, for the purpose of constructing a Highway Department Garage at Chelmsford Center, on land now owned by the Town, on Chelmsford Street, adjacent to the High School Athletic Field, under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen; and to determine whether the money shall be provided for by taxation and/or by borrowing under authority of Chapter 44 of the General Laws; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 50. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300), to raise the Memorial Day appropriation from Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700) to One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000); or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 51. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) for the purpose of providing rent, heat and lights for quarters of East Chelmsford American Legion Post No. 366; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 52. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of purchasing three 1958 DeLuxe Tudor Police Cruisers to be used by the Police Department, said purchase to be under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 53. In the event of an affirmative vote under Article 52, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, by good and sufficient Bill of Sale, the three Police Cruisers now being used by the Police Dept.; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 54. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Road Machinery Fund a certain sum of money for the purpose of purchasing a Pickup Truck, under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 55. To see if the Town will vote, in the event of an affirmative vote under Article 54, to authorize the Selectmen to sell, by good and sufficient Bill of Sale, the present Pickup Truck used by the Highway Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 54. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Road Machinery Fund a certain sum of money for the purchase of a Truck for the Highway Department, such purchase to be made under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 55. In the event of an affirmative vote under Article 54, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, by good and sufficient Bill of Sale, the Truck now being used by the Highway Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 56. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of purchasing a front-end loader for the Highway Department, such purchase to be made under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 57. In the event of an affirmative vote under Article 56, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, by good and sufficient Bill of Sale, two front-end loaders now being used by the Highway Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 58. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-two Thousand Dollars (\$22,000) to purchase a Fire Truck for the Fire Department, said purchase to be made under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 59. In the event of an affirmative vote under Article 58, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, by good and sufficient Bill of Sale, an old Fire Truck now being used by the Fire Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 60. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or some other sum, for the purpose of continuing the survey and maps of the Town under the supervision of the Board of Assessors; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 61. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the School Committee to establish and maintain State-wide Vocational Education, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 74 General Laws and Acts amendatory thereto, or dependent thereon; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 62. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 90 construction; or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 63. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, by good and sufficient Bill of Sale, two used hand spreaders of the Highway Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 66. To see if the Town will vote to accept Chapter 147, Section 16 C of General Laws, to be effective as of January 1, 1959.

FIVE-DAY WEEK IN CERTAIN CITIES AND TOWNS

Members of the Police Department of every city or town which accepts this section by vote of the city council, subject to the provisions of the charter, or by vote of the town at an annual town meeting, as the case may be, or, if said council or town fails to accept this section, by vote of the voters thereof as hereinafter provided, shall be excused from duty for two days out of every seven without loss of pay.

ARTICLE 67. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 1, B 7, by adding to the Limited Industrial District (L 1), and the map referred therein, the following described area situated at the northwesterly corner of Precinct 5, to wit: Beginning at a point at the westerly corner of Precinct 5 at the intersection of the easterly line of Littleton Road at the Chelmsford-Westford town line; thence in a northeasterly direction by said easterly sideline of Littleton Road about 4200 feet to a point opposite the northerly sideline of Oak Street at the boundary of existing "Highway Business" zone; thence in a southeasterly direction by said "Highway Business" zone, 250 feet to a corner; thence in a northeasterly direction by said "Highway Business" zone about 1800 feet to the southerly line of Hunt Road; thence on a straight line along the southerly line of Hunt Road in a southeasterly direction, crossing Hunt Road and extending to the northerly boundary of existing "Limited Industrial" zone; thence in a generally southerly direction along the line of said existing "Limited Industrial" zone and easterly from and parallel to Hunt Road to a point northeasterly from the intersection of Garrison Road, Maple Road and Hunt Road; thence in a southwesterly direction across Maple Road and in a straight line about 2900 feet to the Westford town line; thence northwesterly by said town line 3000 feet to the point of beginning; said rezoning parcel as shown on plan entitled "Plan of Amended Zoning, Chelmsford, Mass., January 4, 1958" prepared by Towers Engineering Co., Lynn, Massachusetts.

ARTICLE 68. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the defense of six (6) claims for land damages on the Billerica Road and Turnpike Road, cost of appraisal of said land, real estate experts, and cost of legal services during the defense of these suits; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 69. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Board of Assessors to use the sum of One Hundred Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000), or some other sum, from Free Cash in the Treasury for the reduction of the 1958 Tax Rate; or act in relation thereto.

AND YOU ARE DIRECTED to serve this Warrant by posting attested copies thereof at the Post Offices in the Center of the Town, South Chelmsford, North Chelmsford, and West Chelmsford, and at the School House in East Chelmsford and the Westlands School House, seven days at least before the time appointed for holding the meeting aforesaid.

HEREOF FAIL NOT and make return of the Warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of holding this meeting aforesaid.

SCHOOL COMMITTEE REPORT

The School Committee held twenty-one regular meetings and seven special meetings during 1957. In addition, the members have undertaken numerous special assignments in connection with School Committee work as well as serving on the High School Building Committee which has held eighteen meetings during the year.

Over the years, the School Committee has striven to provide and maintain efficient educational school facilities; provide and maintain an excellent teaching and administrative staff; and develop, improve and enrich the school program.

School improvement is not achieved overnight. It is a long term, continuous, planned program carried on with patience and persistence year after year. Those communities having citizens interested enough in the welfare of their children and their community to make an objective appraisal of their schools and to give their schools adequate financial support will see their community improve as well as their school system. It is the fundamental policy of the School Committee to carry out the needs and desires of the people in the administration of our school system and to welcome the active interest of all the citizens of the Town.

The following is a summary of the educational accomplishments of 1957:

- Development of a Remedial Reading Program.
- Extension of Guidance Services for Grades 7 and 8.
- Revision of the Testing Program.
- Expansion of the Driver Education Program.
- A new Report Card for Grades 1 and 2.
- Investigation of the need for Special Classes.
- Investigation of Teaching Methods.

The reports of the school personnel, especially that of the Superintendent, will summarize these activities.

Paramount in importance in the improvement of our school system is the acquisition and retention of competent teachers with the hope of establishing a more permanent faculty. Consequently, a new minimum salary of \$3,600.00 per year has been established with the hope of improving this policy.

The last of the old, unused school buildings, the East School was reopened this past September. Our janitorial staff is to be commended for the excellent restoration of the building. These men are doing outstanding maintenance work on all buildings in addition to their regular janitorial duties. This has resulted in considerable financial savings in repairs for the Town.

At the date of this report, December 31, it is still too soon to estimate the date of completion of the New High School. Should it not be completed as scheduled, double sessions will be inevitable next September as we will be short seven classrooms.

The administration of a school system involves many difficult problems and less-than-popular decisions. The making of the 1958 school budget has been especially difficult in view of rising costs, more pupils and more personnel. Additional State Aid must be forthcoming to assist the real estate taxpayer in continuing to carry this heavy burden.

In closing, we draw your attention to the entire school department report as it concerns you vitally. We wish to thank those members of the school staff whose devotion and dedication have been instrumental in keeping our school system at a high level, the parents and other townspeople who have been patient with the numerous temporary measures which have been necessary during this period of trial, and all others who, in any way, have contributed to the welfare of the school department.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

1957, like the previous year, was one of growth and change. As predicted, the school population has continued to increase. Next year the school population is expected to increase even more.

Providing for this growth has presented the need for changes in policies, procedures and organization itself in order to adjust to the many forces that finally determine direction and ultimately provide a basis for evaluation.

Today, as drastic changes take place, education cannot stand still. We must move forward and meet the new challenges of our times by improving our educational program and methods.

THE FACULTY

The professional staff now numbers 107. To keep pace with the constantly growing enrollment, it is anticipated it will be 115 next year.

Since practically all communities are facing the same problem, the competition in procuring good teachers becomes increasingly great. Our goal is to secure the best qualified teachers and to retain them as long as possible. Of course, it is recognized that with approximately 69% of our teachers being women, there will continue to be a certain percentage of replacements each year for obvious reasons.

There is a strong feeling in Chelmsford that the very best teachers possible should be hired and retained. We can accomplish this by doing the following: Establishing a salary schedule with minimum and maximum salaries high enough to attract the best of the newcomers to the profession; guaranteeing all teachers a maximum salary but provide rapid movement to that goal for the superior teacher by a merit program, and providing ways of competing with industry for men essential to the teaching staff.

As one can see, the most obvious answers to securing superior teachers involve money.

Chelmsford has accepted a great responsibility in the training of teachers. This school year student teachers from Boston University and Lowell Teachers College will work on the elementary and senior high levels. Practice teaching is service both to the teacher in training and to the school system in which this training program operates.

CURRICULUM

During the past school year, much work has been done on curriculum review. As a result, many recommendations have been received

for the improvement of our program of studies. In many instances, the proposed changes have already been incorporated. Our teachers and principals are continuing to work on the curriculum. Teaching methods, techniques and procedures are being studied as well as subject matter.

Perhaps the greatest accomplishment in our elementary curriculum has been the establishment of a remedial and corrective reading program under the direction of Miss Margaret A. Cates. This new service has been very welcome both to the members of the staff and to parents who are involved in any way. The results of this program will soon be obvious to all concerned.

The work of the teachers and parents of the first and second graders has culminated in a new report card. Preliminary work is now under way on a report card for grades three through six.

The guidance program has been expanded to include group guidance at the 7th and 8th grade levels. The testing program of the entire school system is now correlated with the guidance program. Intelligence tests are to be given in grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11. Achievement tests are to be given in grades 2, 4, 6, 8, and 10. Our goal is to interpret the results of these tests in such a way that every parent will be able to interpret the academic progress of his child in relation to the academic capabilities of the child. Thus, through closer cooperation of the home and the school, should come greater accomplishment and understanding on the part of the child.

Mr. Thomas Green, Guidance Director, has been placed on a year-round basis. His time during the summer will be spent analyzing the results of these tests. These analyses will be used as a guide in helping the high school students select their courses. This method should insure better achievement for all students.

Another development this year was the expansion of the Driver Education in the high school. In September a survey of the pupils who were of licensing age and who wanted driver training revealed about three times as many as we have been teaching in recent years. A large increase in this number was due to the increase in insurance premiums for drivers under age twenty-five who have not had an approved driver education course. It is safe to assume that this additional premium rate will force all high schools in Massachusetts to assume the responsibility of teaching driver education to all youth. In order to take care of this situation, the instructor, who had been teaching after school, was placed on full-time in addition to after school hours. If necessary, he will instruct during the summer months so long as this backlog continues.

The elementary physical education program under Mr. Frank Hill is achieving most satisfactory results. His program is built on sound

educational practices and gives due consideration to the needs, aptitudes and capacities of the pupils.

MAINTENANCE

A conservative estimate of the replacement value of the present school buildings in Chelmsford is \$4,500,000.00, excluding the cost of the new high school now under construction. This is a sizable investment and should require a program of excellent maintenance and preservation. At the present time, each building is staffed with janitors whose prime function is the general cleaning of the facilities. During the school year, time permits very little repair work. For the past year, we have had a combination janitor and maintenanceman. His skill and craftsmanship has saved the Town much money in costly repairs. We should have at least one full-time maintenanceman and adequate equipment. In addition, we should have a head janitor to check the buildings daily, supervise personnel and organize the work.

CONCLUSION

Your attention is called to the reports of our Supervisors which should provide a better knowledge of some of the work carried on in our public schools as well as to the charts and tables appended to this report.

The endeavors of the various Parent-Teacher Associations, the Booster Club, the Town Departments, the Town Officials and the Civic Organizations have been extremely helpful.

I am grateful to these people, to the School Committee and to the entire School Personnel for their loyal support and cooperation.

AGE OF ADMISSION TO SCHOOL

For admission to the first grade in September, a child must have reached the age of five years and six months by September 10 of the year he is to enter. No entrance tests for children under the age requirement will be given. Vaccination and Birth Certificates are required.

EDUCATIONAL AND EMPLOYMENT CERTIFICATES

Every person from 14 to 16 years of age must have an employment certificate or permit, and those between 16 and 18 years of age must have an educational certificate before starting work. These certificates and permits may be obtained from the offices of the Superintendent of Schools and the Principal of the High School. When one makes application for a certificate (or "working card"), he must apply in person and bring his Birth Certificate or proof of last grade attended.

NO SCHOOL SIGNALS

When school is called off because of severe weather conditions, the following system will be used:

FOR ALL GRADES

The "NO SCHOOL" whistle which is 3—3—3 will blow at 7:00 A.M.

FOR ELEMENTARY GRADES

Grades 1 - 7

This will include all students who either walk to school or are transported on the elementary scheduled buses.

The "NO SCHOOL" whistle which is 3—3—3 will blow at 7:25 A.M.

Radio Stations WLLH and WCAP of Lowell, and WBZ of Boston, will carry announcements on their regular No School Broadcasts.

It will be the policy of the School Department to close school only in case of extreme weather conditions, otherwise, to hold regular sessions. Therefore, when school is in session on stormy days, parents are urged to exercise their personal judgment as to the wisdom of sending their children to school.

HIGH SCHOOL

MR. JOHN T. CONRAD

The practices and policies of our schools have never been static. From earliest times to the present, American schools have answered changing needs of new conditions with reconstructed methods, procedures, organization and over-all policy.

We at Chelmsford High School are trying, as we always have, to keep abreast of the times. Many of our teachers, realizing the exceedingly complex character of the teacher's professional task, are taking special university courses at the graduate level to increase their knowledge in their own specific fields, as well as their information of modern educational trends and methods. All our teachers are reporting periodically after school hours to review and examine textbooks, supplementary readers, and auxiliary aids, in order that we may secure the very finest of available materials. They are also preparing a syllabus for each course, so that the school may have well-defined courses of study and an assurance that the work required in sequential subjects is not overlapping.

Since we believe that the problems of living, growing up, and planning one's future have become so involved that most young people need individual attention in school at one time or another, we are expanding our guidance service. This service starts with orientation in the 8th and 9th grades and includes discussions of the following topics: the purpose of school; the characteristics of an effective student; good study habits and the way to scholastic success; getting along with people; the high school curricula; the guidance services offered by the school; the testing program and the interpretation of its results; the choice of a college and the entrance requirements of colleges and other post-secondary schools; the choice of a vocation. Our counseling service gives to each student significant information on his scholastic and mental achievement; it includes the giving of aptitude, special ability, and interest tests, and the recording of the results so the student can make the wisest possible choice of his high school course, his post-secondary school, and his vocation.

Our school is a member of a group of high schools which engage well-qualified consultants to address students on matters pertaining to their fields of interest. We also make arrangements to have our students visit institutions of higher learning whenever these institutions open their doors to prospective freshmen.

Chelmsford High School is approved by the State Department of Education and is a member of the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. It is now making plans for its evalua-

tion in accordance with the "Evaluative Criteria for Secondary Schools". An account of graduates, as accurate as possible, is kept by the guidance counselor. The following is a record of the graduates of the classes from 1953-1956 who went on to post-secondary schools and colleges. The statistics herein reveal that our graduates with the grades of 85% or better, which are required for college certification, have achieved a success that compares favorably with that of the graduates of other schools. These boys and girls have demonstrated their ability to do college work in a way that is highly creditable to our school.

BOYS' PHYSICAL EDUCATION

EUGENE G. MACOMBER

Physical education is an integral part of the total educational system and although more emphasis is placed on things physical, the mental and social development of the personality are also stressed. It is vital that good citizenship as well as skills and appreciations be attained through physical education.

Skills in a wide variety of activities are needed, not only because they provide the individual a medium of self-expression, but also because they offer him an opportunity to participate in activities going on about him. It is important for the good of the individual's relations with his fellows that he be able to engage with credit to himself in the play life of the community. The individual who cannot display at least adequate skill in the play life of the community loses social status with resulting psychological handicaps, often quite serious.

The program at Highland, Quessy, and East consists of the following activities: calisthenics: military drill; and fundamentals in football, basketball, and baseball. These are supplemented by movies, followed by question and answer periods. This phase of the program has been successful and will be continued. The sport film library at Chelmsford is well stocked and provides many enjoyable film sessions and critiques. Flexibility of schedule at these schools is a necessity.

The High School and Center School offer better facilities, and the activities there can be varied and extensive as time allows. The addition of military drill and marching has proved to be a useful agent in obtaining and maintaining discipline. The rest of the program consists of calisthenics, skill drills, organized activities, and control games in all sports. Fundamentals in football, basketball, baseball, and volley ball are taught, and health lectures are given periodically throughout the school year.

GIRLS' PHYSICAL EDUCATION

CAROL J. MURPHY

The program of physical education for girls this past year has been set up to include the following objectives: the improving and maintaining of good health; the developing of proper social attitudes; the improving of bodily co-ordination, and the developing of carry-over values for enjoyment and recreation in post school years.

Due to limited facilities in grades 6 and 7, the program was designed for body development through exercise and gymnastics, development of rhythmic movement through dance, development of ball handling skills through games and relays and development of enjoyment through play.

In grades 8 through 12 the girls further skills in team sports, dance, bodily development and co-ordination. Through co-educational activities in grade 8 social awareness and ease was fostered

The importance of physical education should not be underestimated as an integral part of the total person. Education should provide a person with self direction, self reliance, freedom from mental conflict, health, poise in social contacts, sympathy toward others, and appreciation of the finer things of life.

MUSIC

OLIVE LITTLEHALE

Educators are increasingly becoming aware that the schools must prepare their students not only for work but for the added hours of leisure. Music has a prominent influence and it is the duty of the schools to help children to experience greater pleasure in music. Under-developed taste accounts for the restricted musical standards of most of our people, and adequate school music is the surest means of correcting this. To hear all the music on radio, television, and juke boxes, one would believe us to be a musical nation, but quantity does not indicate quality; this we must develop through our children.

Children's musical experiences and learnings should help to extend and better their human relationships and widen their cultural horizons.

Music is many-sided. It can give the children pleasure; it serves as an emotional release; it can give satisfaction through creative action; a feeling of success and achievement, a sense of belonging to a group, so necessary for their social growth. To obtain these ends, it is necessary that the children grow in understanding and competence in music. The program in the elementary grades is planned with the view of giving all children an active and growing part of the entire music program. Any program is only as good as the personnel involved. Only through the joint efforts of supervisor and teachers can this be accomplished. I wish to extend my thanks to the many teachers and principals who have co-operated with me.

The instrumental program is continuing to grow, more interest and greater progress becoming apparent from year to year. It is my earnest desire to further extend the instrumental program in the near future.

The listening program needs more planning. We, as a nation, are becoming listeners more than actual participants. This is one phase of music education which I feel deserves more interest. Only through the teaching and development of intelligent listeners can we overcome the bad taste that abounds in the air today.

During the school year of 1956-1957, three student teachers from Boston University School of Music did their practice teaching at the North and Center Schools. In September of 1957 one student from the University started his practice teaching at Westlands and Center Schools.

Operettas were given by the Glee Clubs. These give the talented children a chance to express themselves. Festivals were held at the various schools. These differ from the operettas in that every child, regardless of his or her musical ability, is able to take part in a school production.

Music is no more a subject apart from the general educational program, but an integral part of the overall pattern. May it continue to be so.

MUSIC

PAUL E. BORDELEAU

The Instrumental Music Curriculum has been extended downward through Grade 5. In April a Solo and Ensemble Festival was held at the Center School for the instrumental students of Grades 5 through 8. A total of 98 students, divided into three bands, took part.

In addition to playing at all the school's football games, both away and at home, the Chelmsford High School Band participated in the following parades:

- The annual Lowell High School Field Day
- The Memorial Day Exercises in Chelmsford
- The United Fund Drives in Lowell and Wilmington
- The Santa Claus Festival in Lowell
- The Northeastern Massachusetts Music Festival in Concord.

The Band plays for many of the High School activities including the annual Spring Concert and Graduation.

The Junior High School Band participated in the April Solo and Ensemble Festival as well as in the Memorial Day Exercises. It performed also at the Chelmsford-Dracut football game and at the High School Auditorium for the Christmas Assembly.

The Twirlers, who received new uniforms this year, are to be commended for their outstanding performances at all of the football games.

The High School Glee Club has participated in the Parent-Teacher program, the Talent Show, the Band Concert and in a special Christmas Assembly. It has plans for a busy school year.

The ever popular Dance Band played for the Talent Show and for the dance after the Annual Band Concert.

Thomas Patton was selected to represent Chelmsford at the All-State Concert held in Northampton last March. He performed with the chorus.

ART

J. RICHARD PENNEY

LEE S. DALY

Art a 'part', not 'apart', is the theme for our art program which concerns itself with the development, continued growth, and enrichment of personality. It stresses the work of the individual and his capacity of growth through initiative and independence of thought; participation in creative activities; development of the ability to plan, assume responsibility, and carry his undertaking through a successful completion.

If we realize how integral various qualities of art are to our experiences, we can easily see that art is a necessary 'part' of education.

Many times a day each one of us has to be concerned with problems of choice of selection, for we make art judgments whenever we select an object because of its appearance or its usefulness. In some daily experiences art qualities may seem unimportant to us, yet, in a thousand unconscious ways we express our likes and dislikes for artistic qualities of color, line, shape or texture, and each one of us has the impulse, the unconscious or conscious desire to make familiar things about him more attractive.

The focal point of a sound philosophy of art education, therefore, is to help or at least to endeavor to encourage your sons and daughters to develop sound art judgments, rather than merely to draw a pretty picture in class.

The child-artist will have neither the professional artistic skill nor the adult point of view, thus, children's work should be judged accordingly. The object of art education is not to master skills, but to use skills to satisfy the expression of thoughts or feelings.

Thus, art in education has a very positive function. It aids children to grow and develop aesthetically and it offers all children the opportunity to learn to live creatively, and so to become mature, expressive persons.

In expressing this philosophy we try to show the children that art is not just painting, but that artistic ideas are expressed in many different ways. Therefore, the children are encouraged to work with clay, crayons, papier maché, paper charcoal, paints, etc. Some projects are printing, murals, Puppets, masks and Plaster of Paris sculptures. By showing films and slides, we hope to stimulate an appreciation of the basic elements of art.

More time was allotted for the art classes this year. We hope that this trend will continue.

The aim of the child's art education will give him a fund of art experiences, an interest in art and a sensitivity to its lasting values.

SCHOOL NURSES' REPORT

HELEN M. JEWETT, R.N.

JESSIE M. GROVES, R.N.

The heavy increase in school enrollment the past year, has made it necessary for the Board of Health to appoint a second School Nurse.

The schools have been divided so that each Nurse has approximately 1400 pupils. The schools are visited each day with more time being spent in the elementary schools.

The School Health Program does not vary too much from year to year. The pupils are weighed and measured annually. The Massachusetts Vision and Hearing Tests are given annually. Parents are notified of any hearing or seeing difficulties, and recommendations are made to see either an Eye or Ear Specialist.

The School Physicians do annual physical examinations of pupils in Grades, 1, 4, 7, and 11. Parents are notified if any defects are found. Recommendations and appointments are made for those pupils who wish to attend any of the Greater Lowell Clinics.

The last Polio Clinic for all third shots was held in June. Immunization Clinics for Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Tetanus, and vaccinations were held in March, April and May at different schools for pre-school children as well as Grades 1 and 6.

The Lions Club has secured glasses for several needy children, and they were greatly appreciated.

The School Nurses assisted Dr. Blechman in giving "Flu Shots" to all town personnel.

Both Nurses took a 13 week course in advanced "First Aid and Disaster Nursing" this past fall.

SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

MARION B. MOORE

During the past year, 197,485 hot meals were served to students in the seven schools, and 410,372 bottles of milk were purchased from local dairies for the School Lunch Program. This increase in number was due particularly to the added interest on the part of the students themselves. One more school, namely East School, was added to the Program this fall bringing the total number of schools to seven.

The State and Federal Governments require that a certain meal pattern be met—thus each luncheon includes 2 oz. protein, $\frac{3}{4}$ cup vegetable or fruit (or combination of both) bread and butter and $\frac{1}{2}$ pint of whole milk. In turn the Government reimburses the town .09 (nine cents) for each meal served and .04 (four cents) toward the purchase of each bottle of milk served to students, (other than the milk served as part of the hot lunch). This year Chelmsford has received \$26,737.95 which covers the labor cost of the twenty permanent employees, including a manager for each of the three kitchens and a dietitian who supervises the complete program. With this income from the State and Federal Governments the School Lunch Program has been a self supporting program. This subsidy has covered the upkeep of the present equipment.

In addition this year the School Lunch Program has been able to purchase, from its funds, several pieces of equipment for the school kitchens—two large baking ovens and a steam pressure cooker. Thus more adequate baking facilities enable us to include more of the "home cooked" type of food such as hot biscuits, roasted meats and some baked desserts. With this added interest, it is hoped that even more students will take advantage of our School Lunch Program.

Much credit is due to the School Committee members who in cooperation with the Superintendent of Schools sponsor the School Lunch Program.

We wish to extend our gratitude to the School Committee, Superintendent of Schools, Principals, Teachers, Parents and Students for their cooperation and interest which made our Program the success it is.
