

SOME FACTS ABOUT CHELMSFORD

*Chelmsford is located in North Middlesex County and was incorporated as a town in 1655.

*Chelmsford has a population estimated at 15,000.

*Chelmsford, both from an industrial development standpoint and as a place to live, has an ideal location, being located on both Route 3 and Route 110 super-highways (the latter under construction); it is a half-hour drive from Boston and Logan airport; 10 minutes away from Route 128 and Bedford airport; five miles from down-town Lowell and in the heart of an area which can provide the professional and experienced men and women capable of staffing nearly any type of modern industry.

*Chelmsford has a modern school system with a 1200-pupil high school just opened, and two new elementary schools opened within the past decade.

*Chelmsford also has modern police and fire departments, providing the best possible protection for its people; it has an efficient highway department which has an enviable record for its highway maintenance and its snow-plowing; and it provides town garbage and rubbish collection.

⁶In addition to its new schools, Chelmsford has two new fire stations equipped with the best of apparatus and equipment and with a complete radio system of its own; its police department has its own two-way radio system and three cruisers in constant operation; and its highway department is housed in a headquarters opened for use within the past six months.

*Chelmsford's homes range from old, historical dwellings to the most ultra-modern. Its buildings are controlled by adequate building laws and by a complete set of zoning laws revised within the past four years to meet the needs of today.

*Chelmsford has 10 churches located in all sections to meet the religious needs of all the people.

Chelmsford ended its 304th year with many changes worthy of note. This Town Report accents these changes and reflects a new look through a streamlining process begun in 1958.

Another change readily visible to the people of the Town is the relocation of homes and highways. In the Centre and Westlands sections the new Route 110 will pass over North Road and Chelmsford Street, resulting in many dislocations of property and changing the face of the land. In the North area, relocation of Main Street and removal of homes shows the advent of the new U. S. Highway 3, the second of two major roads intersecting in the Town. With anticipated zoning changes for industry, a brighter picture, taxwise, should result.

We regretfully accepted the resignation of Judge John H. Valentine as Town Counsel. Judge Valentine served the Town in many ways for more than 30 years.

On June 8, the new High School was dedicated. We are very proud of this latest addition to our educational system. It has immeasurably relaxed the overcrowded conditions in the schools. Very favorable comment has been received from visitors to the new High School who plan new schools in their own communities.

Increased demands on the Board and continued growth of administrative problems of the Town government marked the passing of 1959. In an effort to offer more meeting time to the public and to expedite routine town affairs, the Board increased its meetings to a regular weekly basis. Except for the summer months, meetings are now held every Thursday evening. These meetings, which are always open to the public, constitute only a small measure of the time being devoted to the administration of town affairs. Answering complaints, conducting investigations, reviewing highway problems, meeting with other governing boards, and many other functions are increasing the requirements of the Board.

Although immediate needs do not demand it, eventually the Town as well as the Board will be better served by establishing an Executive Secretary. This position, which would be a full time post, would provide people with an active on-the-job administrator and, at the same time, would provide a more efficient and organized control of town affairs by the Board. This is somewhat comparable to the Town Manager form of government, which has been proposed on occasion, but would not vest the same degree of responsibility in this position, leaving the basic Town government in its present form.

Chelmsford's building boom continued at an unprecedented pace and shows no signs of decreasing. This, of course, creates the usual demands on school expansion. Less noticeable, but just as certain, the growth of our small town to a small city increases demands on other services. While some of the new building is establishing excellent roads and good drainage, even these develop additional highway maintenance needs. Trash collections, highway repairs, snow removal, and related services grow as do the needs for more police and fire protection.

The Highway Department garage was constructed in 1959 and is now in use. This has improved working conditions immeasurably, created much better repair facilities, and should contribute considerably to the longevity of the highway equipment.

Chelmsford's Police and Fire Departments both continue to serve the town well. Both forces have grown but, even now, need further expansion to keep pace with the increased needs. The Police Department has at least four men on duty at all times, using three cruisers to continually patrol the town's highways. The Fire Department is housed primarily in two new stations in Centre and North. New equipment operates out of both of these stations with full time protection of permanent personnel. Excellent radio facilities aid both of these departments.

Currently, fire equipment is also housed in West, South and East. These stations, which are manned by volunteer firefighters, will ultimately create another administrative problem. Volunteer firefighters serve a very important purpose in the town but are becoming less available as the town continues to develop into a city atmosphere. Increased maintenance costs and manning of these stations or a greater concentration of manpower and equipment in the central stations will be the eventual alternatives.

With the increased demands on town services, the Board has also witnessed the growing pains being imposed on present Town Hall facilities. Offices which house the Welfare Department, Planning Board, Industrial Development Commission, Personnel Board, Board of Appeals, Finance Committee, Building Inspector as well as the Selectmen now occupy both sides of the upper Hall. The Board of Assessors is currently working in cramped quarters which are inadequate to such an extent as to seriously hamper their activities. Some expansion is anticipated in the lower Hall to alleviate this situation. The Board also contemplates having the stage in the upper Hall removed and building additional offices in this area.

The degree of improvising of the Hall facilities is nearly exhausted. There is certainly no immediate need for further corrective action but proper planning clearly indicates that the Town will some day be faced with the problem of building a Town Office building. The Board is constantly alert to the need to hold the tax structure at the lowest possible level, and, therefore, is reluctant to even admit the ultimate need for better office facilities. Nevertheless, it is obvious that the early purchase of the private property between the present Hall and Center Fire Station should be seriously considered since our present available space would be inadequate for the construction of a new office building.


A need for engineering advice and controls from an outside and impartial service is immediately evident. Increased building has placed an increased burden on existing roads. Streets which were once wide enough for casual travel are now mere paths for the heavy traffic flow. Thus, there is a need for engineering advice and services on the Highway Department. As a quiet country town, Chelmsford could afford the luxury of draining surface water down streets to lower levels and releasing the water at these points. Now street drainage is a subject of discussion, study, or complaint at nearly every meeting. Subdivisions should be under the alert control of a sound engineering office. Again the Board is unwilling to immediately establish a full time Town Engineer but suggests a compromise of hiring an outside engineering firm on a consulting basis.

On several occasions, homeowners have expressed dissatisfaction over conditions that they did not know existed upon purchase of their particular property. As a means of protection to such purchasers, to the Board, and to the construction companies themselves, we are urging the adoption of an occupancy permit as a means of control. This would merely mean a coordination of the Health Inspector, Building Inspector, Plumbing Inspector, and Wire Inspector activities on a check-off form which would assure maximum clearance before new houses could be occupied. Such a procedure would not impose any hardship on most of the new housing in town and should not be confused with an attempt to restrict or reduce building; it would merely insure the meeting of all regulations before getting a final stamp of approval.

Chelmsford is a good town. It has new schools and a good school system. Police, Fire, and Highway Departments work well together in everyone's interests. Each of these departments has excellent equipment. Industrial developments have not materialized to any great degree and little can be anticipated during the mammoth highway construction program currently underway in Chelmsford. In the meantime, every effort is being made to provide the best possible service and continue to retain a controllable tax rate.

During the past decade we have seen Chelmsford grow from a comfortable village to a thriving town nearly reaching city potentials. This, of necessity, has gradually reduced the theory of government by friendly gesture and verbal assurance to one of increased regulations and impartial decisions. This Board, like its predecessors, has enjoyed its ability to administer some town affairs on a friendly personal basis. As we continue to grow, however, the governing of town affairs must become more devoid of this feature as the administration of a business of this magnitude demands the critical and impartial attention of the governing authorities.

The Board has enjoyed serving you in 1959. We hope that our efforts have met with your approval. We thank you for your patience and indulgence during the past year.



It was with regret that the Board of Selectmen accepted the resignation of Judge John H. Valentine as town counsel late in December.

The resignation brought to an end, temporarily at least, a period of much more than a score of years in public life in the interests, either in whole or in part, of Chelmsford.

It was in 1935 that John H. Valentine took office as a representative in the General Court from the 11th district, and he continued to serve in the House until 1948, when he became an associate justice in the Lowell District court.

He served as town counsel for many years and also as town moderator from 1951 to 1954 and has played an important role in the political and civic life of the community for the greater part of his life.



CHELMSFORD INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION

The Industrial Commission of the Town of Chelmsford is dedicated to the purpose of securing clean and desirable light industry for our Town's employment and economic needs. Although such industry might not immediately reduce taxes, it would certainly tend to stabilize them over the future.

Resignations and changes on the Commissions have now been filled. The full board meets regularly to consider Chelmsford's needs and its many selling features. The vast highway program now underway, the proximity to Lowell's labor market, ready access to industrialized Route 128, modern educational systems, churches, modern police and fire protection, and sound town government all contribute to the desirability of locating in Chelmsford.

Many contacts have been made with firms expressing some desire to relocate in a suburban area. One new firm is being located on the site of the old railroad station in North. Another plans to build a new factory on Billerica Road in early spring.

A public relations program has been undertaken. Members of the Commission are addressing various service clubs, women's organizations and civic gatherings in an effort to acquaint local people with the problems in this undertaking. The selling of Chelmsford is not confined to a few, specifically appointed for this purpose, but actually every resident is a potential salesman.

Representatives of two of the largest land developing and industrial management concerns in New England have been contacted. They showed polite but restrained interest.

Available sites appeared to be overpriced for their. interests. Highway construction work is not yet sufficiently advanced to enhance big developments in their opinion. It appeared that vast holdings along Route 128, which they still held, served as a deterrent in their immediate planning for Chelmsford.

While this may serve as a temporary note of pessimism, the Commission feels strongly that upon completion of the local highway network, Routes 110 and 3, as well as the Lowell Connector, a more favorable picture should be presented. The advent of the large restaurant and motel in the hub of this traffic area seems to support this thinking.

Inquiries about some available sites have occasionally placed the Commission in a difficult position. Certain parcels of land seemingly undergo appreciable changes in value immediately upon interrogation by a prosepctive purchaser. Negotiations are, of course, a necessity in any such purchase but realistic prices must be established and a degree of consistency maintained if clients are to retain any great degree of enthusiasm.

The Commission's budget of \$500 seemed insufficient to warrant its expenditures with any hopes of accomplishment. Consequently, most of it has been returned to the Excess and Deficiency account.

A consultant firm was asked to set a price on their services for the professional development of the town's industrial possibilities. Their proposed fee of more than \$13,000 closed this approach to our problem.

The Commission does feel that a new and professional brochure selling Chelmsford might be beneficial to our interests. Erection of a few Industrial Site signs might also bring results. We are, therefore, requesting \$3500 to be used as prudently as possible in advertising our town's many features.

In closing this report the Commission wishes to reaffirm its feeling of Chelmsford's excellent land sites and improving transportation facilities as a boon to future industrial growth. We ask, again, the cooperation and salesmanship of the town residents in promoting our industrial growth in an effort to stabilize our present tax structure.

It is required that the Town Clerk keep a record of each notice of a definitive plan of land which is presented to her by the developer. After plans have been approved by the Planning Board, a copy of same is filed with the Town Clerk.

The Appeal Board must notify the Town Clerk of all hearings proposed and also notify her of the disposition of said appeals. Both items are on permanent record in the Town Clerk's office.

She is responsible for the conduct of all elections and the tally of the vote.

She issues marriage, hunting, fishing and dog licenses as well as birth, marriage and death certificates. For all of these licenses, the Clerk collects a fee. The fees are turned over to the Town Treasury once a month.

The Town Clerk issues registrations of Gasoline Storage Licenses.

She also acts as Clerk of the Board of Registrars and Clerk for the Cemetery Commissioners. All Cemetery Records are in the custody of the Town Clerk who issues new deeds and bills lot owners for the Annual Care each year.

The Town Clerk's office is open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and Thursday evening from 7 p.m. to 8 p.m. for your convenience.

The Board of Registrars holds six sessions for registration of voters, one in each precinct preceding every election. All sessions in all precincts, except Precinct I, Chelmsford Center, are held from 7:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. The final day of registration, the session is always held at the Town Hall, Chelmsford Center, from 12 noon until 10 p.m. Naturalized citizens must bring their final papers in order to become registered voters.

To vote in all elections, a person must be:

A citizen of the United States
 21 years of age or more

3. A resident of Massachusetts for at least 1 year on Election Day

4. A resident of Chelmsford for at least 6 months on Election Day

5. A registered voter has qualified by the Board of Registrars and on their official list.

Registration is permanent. Once registered as a Chelmsford voter a citizen may vote in all elections as long as he continues to maintain a residence in Chelmsford. If a voter changes his name, either by marriage or by court action, or moves to another precinct, he must register again.

A Board of Registrars, under state law, has charge of the registration of voters. They prepare the annual Register of Voters divided according to Precincts and listing the voters by street address and with political party designations. This registration list is used at the polls at elections.

The 3 Registrars are appointed for a 3-year term by the Selectmen on a bi-partisan basis. The Town Clerk is an ex-officio member of the Board.

It shall keep an index of all open areas within the city or town, as the case may be, with the plan of obtaining information pertinent to proper utilization of such open areas, including lands owned by the commonwealth or lands owned by a city or town. It shall keep an index of all open marshlands, swamps and all other wet lands in a like manner, and may recommend to the city council or selectmen and, subject to the approval of the city council or selectmen, to the department of natural resources and to the state reclamation board a program for the better promotion, development or utilization of all such areas. It shall keep accurate records of it meetings and actions and shall file an annual report which shall be printed in the case of towns in the annual town report. The commission may appoint such clerks and other employees as it may from time to time require. The commission shall consist of not less than three nor more than seven members. In cities the members shall be appointed by the mayor, subject to the provisions of the city charter, except that in cities having or operating under a Plan D or Plan E form of city charter, said appointments shall be by the city manager, subject to the provisions of the charter; and in towns they shall be appointed by the selectmen, excepting towns having a manager form of government, in which towns appointments shall be made by the town manager, subject to the approval of the selectmen. When a commission is first established, the term of the members shall be for one, two or three years, and so arranged that the terms of approximately one third of the members will expire each year, and their successors shall be appointed for terms of three years each. Any member of a commission so appointed may, after a public hearing, if requested, be removed for cause by the appointing authority. A vacancy occurring otherwise than by expiration of a term shall in a city be filled for the unexpired term in the same manner as an original appointment, and in a town in the manner provided in section eleven of chapter forty-one. Said com-mission may receive gifts of funds, lands, buildings and other proof the city council in a city, or the selectmen in towns. Such gifts shall be held in the name of the city or town, but may be managed by the commission for the purposes set forth in this section.

- 5. Relative location of windows in the front elevation with respect to each other and with respect to any door, chimney, porch or attached garage in the same elevation; or, relative location of windows in each of both side elevations with

respect to any door, chimney, porch or attached garage the same elevation;

6. Relative location of attached garage or porch, if any, to each other in the front elevation, and the remainder of the building or structure; or the height of the ridge or roof beams, in the case of a flat roof, of any portion of the building or structure located outside the limits of the main roof measured from the elevation of the first floor to the roof ridge or roof beams, in the case of a flat roof, or width of any portion of the building or structure located outside the limits of the main roof if it has a gable in the front eleva-tion, otherwise, length of said roof ridge or flat roof in the front elevation.

Buildings or structures shall be deemed to be like each other in any dimension with respect to which the difference between them is not more than two feet. 



Police answered 2,715 calls in 1959. Summons served for out of Town Police Departments 197. Stolen cars recovered 21. Business places found unlocked 102. Number of arrests 121. The three cruisers patrolled 201,869 miles in 1959.

The year 1959 has been a very busy year for your Police Department as you can see by the preceding statistics.

A greater and greater demand is being placed on the Police Department for various services. In addition to answering calls and investigations and accidents the list of property to be checked while residents are on vacation is mounting each year. This is a very important phase of police work and I urge all residents to notify the Police Department when they are leaving on vacation, so that we may better serve you.


During the past year both Routes 3 and Route 110 construction got underway. This presented many traffic problems, as construction was carried on in several of our busy streets. Many police officers were needed to handle traffic while this construction was going on and it became necessary to use some of our Auxiliary Police Officers on various traffic details to assist the regular officers. There were times when as many as twenty-four police officers were on traffic details in a given day. This traffic problem will continue into 1960 as route 110 continues toward the Concord River. Route 3 should be completed in the fall of 1960 and when completed will ease a very serious traffic problem in Vinal Square, that has taxed the department to the utmost in the last few years.

I am asking for an additional Sergeant this year to take care of the other Sergeants days off. This will not add any personnel to the department, just promote a Patrolman to the rank of Sergeant, so that we will have a superior officer in charge of each shift at all times.

The Auxiliary Police Band under the able direction of Sgt. Basil J. Larkin conducted many concerts during the past year and they were greatly enjoyed by young and old. It is planned to continue these fine concerts in 1960 for your enjoyment.

At the present time we have thirty Auxiliary Police Officers completely uniformed and well trained in all phases of the type of police work which they would be called upon to perform in case of an emergency. Sgt. Basil J. Larkin is in charge of this fine group.

At this time I wish to express my thanks to the Board of Selectmen and all other Town Officials and employees, and also to the general public for the excellent co-operation given to the Police Department during the past year.





FIRE DEPARTMENT Ernest G. Byam, Chief

An increase in the demands on the Fire Department was maintained again this past year. We responded to a total of 415 calls which is a great jump over preceding years, and for the most part is the result of the rapid growth of the Town.

A new 4-wheel drive brush truck was delivered to the Town, making it possible to move one of our other brush trucks to the North Station. This will save our pumper from answering brush fire calls, and keep it in readiness for building fires.

A considerable amount of repair work has been done on all five stations during 1959, most of which has been done by the regular firefighters while on their regular tour of duty.

There were 85 permits for Oil and L.P. Gas installations or alterations, and 15 permits for blasting issued. Periodic inspections were made in schools and convalescent homes to eliminate fire hazards.

One new circuit was added to the fire alarm system to enable us to include the new High School on a separate circuit rather than to overload any of the present circuits. Two fire alarm boxes were also added to this circuit.

Maintenance work on the fire alarm system consisted mainly of general and emergency repairs and pole changeovers. Most of the emergency repairs were made necessary by the new road construction which is going on in Chelmsford.

The department believes that in order to maintain a high level of fire protection the following recommendations should be carried out.

- 1. Adopt a plan whereby an amount, shall be appropriated each year, and placed in a fund, for the future replacement of fire apparatus.
- 2. Replace the Studebaker pickup truck.
- 3. Purchase a 75' aerial ladder truck.

The following amounts of explosives of all classes stored in the Town of Chelmsford are: Magazine No. 1, 48,450 lbs.; Magazine No. 2, 40,150 lbs.; Magazine No. 3, 5,800 lbs.

In 1959 the cost of Welfare was \$309,565.00 compared to \$288,390.97 in 1958. The Town was reimbursed from federal, state and other sources in the amount of \$215,082.99. The direct cost to the town was \$94,482.01 which was \$28,153.54 more than in 1958. This rise in cost is mostly from Nursing homes increase and the higher cost of medical care and drugs.

In the fields of Old Age Assistance, Aid to Dependent Children and Disability Assistance the cost of relief is shared by the town, state and federal government according to specific formulae, the fourth category is general relief which covers others in need. The latter expense is borne almost entirely by the town.

Waste collections, when first started in May 1953 under the supervision of the Health Department, were on a semi-monthly basis, and in 1954 were on weekly pickups. In April 1956, waste collections were transferred to the Highway Department with the regular highway men and equipment assisting. In 1957, a new 20 yard rubbish truck was purchased; the old truck being used as a spare. This year we have used both trucks; one being used every day of the week; the other starting with 3 days per week, and later being used 5 days per week. Next year a new rubbish truck will be needed with 3 extra men required to work 3 days per week in order to keep up with the rapid growth of the town.

Since 1950, 117 new streets have been accepted bringing the total road mileage to approximately 135 miles. More is required of the Highway Department each year with the acceptance of these new streets. Snow plowing routes have increased greatly. Where one plow could have kept a particular route open, it now requires two trucks to plow the same route. In spite of these additions, the Highway Department personnel for highway work since 1950 has been increased by only six men.

Drainage has been one of our greatest problems over the past years. New Developments have been built on land where surface water would ordinarily drain off. New drainage had to be installed and drained into proper outlets. One of our large projects this year was on Pine Hill Road. This road was widened from a 14' width to a 30' width. Seven Hundred ten feet of drainage pipe was installed, 8 catch basins built and was resurfaced with a bituminous treated gravel surface. Another large project was on Locke Road. This road was widened to approximately 27 feet, and drainage consisting of 1720 feet of 12'' pipe and 6 catch basins were installed. Many other smaller similiar conditions were corrected.

Our Chapter 90 Construction project was on Concord Road. This road was excavated, widened and graded to a width of 30 feet for a distance of 3000 feet. Drainage was installed consisting of a trunk line of 1740 feet of pipe and 18 catch basins, and was resurfaced with a bituminous treated gravel surface. Permission was granted by the state engineers to use this type of surface, making it possible to go a longer distance. We anticipate using the 1960 funds to resurface the total length with a Type I mix.

After many years of discussion, a new highway garage was built this year on town-owned land located on Richardson Road, North Chelmsford. This garage was needed badly to house the expensive equipment, much of which had to be kept outside due to the lack of space in the old sheds. This garage is able to house all the present equipment and supplies with additional space provided for future purchase of additional equipment. New sidewalks were built on Acton Road, Middlesex Street and

Main Street.

The usual work of oiling, patching, brush cutting and maintenance was performed during the year. I would like to thank the townspeople for their kind consideration

and co-operation and the Police Department for notifying the department of dangerous conditions on the roads during the winter months.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and The Citizens of the Town of Chelmsford

The Planning Board during 1959 approved 14 sub-divisions for housing developments numbering some 762 house lots - in each case requiring the developer to post bond covering drainage, bounds and preparation of new streets for oiling.

The Board has been asked on many occasions during the year why it has not withheld approval of sub-divisions in order to regulate the construction of new houses in town and ease the burden on the schools, the water district, and other town services.

In order that this may be clearly understood, the board reiterates in this report the statements made in reply to these questions during the year: The entire procedure for the handling of sub-division petitions is established by state law, and if the petitioner meets the requirements set up by statute, the Planning Board cannot refuse its approval.

The Board also conducted hearings during 1959 on several petitions for changes in zoning and reported its action to the town meeting. Several more zoning change proposals were received late in the year and were advertised for hearings early in 1960.

A sub-committee to consider the possibility of off-street parking areas in the business sections of the towns was named and will submit its report in 1960.

Early in the year, Mr. Harold Clayton resigned as a member of the Board upon his election to the School Committee, and at a joint election meeting of the Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board, Mr. A. Louis Bennett was named to serve in his place.

The Board, at this time and as a result of its experiences through the years in the handling of sub-divisions, recommends that the town estab-lish the position of "town engineer", the appointee to work under the direction of the Board of Selectmen and to serve as engineer to all departments requiring such service. Such a town official, in our opinion, would save the town much more than the sum paid him as a salary.

The Park Commissioners organized for the year 1959 and appointed A. Louis Bennett Chairman. Other members are Ralph E. House and David P. Ramsay. Harold Erikson was again appointed superintendent for the year.

In the Spring, the parks were raked clean of the Winter accumulation of debris. Loam, fertilizer and grass seed were spread where needed and many flowers and plants were set out. The usual mowing and watering of the lawns was carried out during the Summer.

In accordance with the plan to replace one of the major pieces of equipment each year, a new power sweeper was purchased. Also acquired during the year was a tank type sprayer. This will be used to spray a type of weed-killer.

Four new American flags have been ordered to replace the 48 star flags. These will be raised in Chelmsford Center, No. Chelmsford, East Chelmsford and the Westlands on appropriate occasions.

The Cemetery Commissioners hereby submit the following report for the year 1959.

The past year saw many improvements made in the cemeteries.

In the Riverside Cemetery a new entrance was built, a new road was built and oiled. Two large sections were regraded to facilitate the mowing of grass. Over two hundred large protruding corner posts were removed to beautify sections and remove hazards that they created. Four large diseased elm trees were removed. In the Pine Ridge Cemetery, which is expanding very rapidly, a new chain link and wrought iron fence was installed. A new baby section was developed and is to be called "The Garden of Angels". A large section at the entrance known as "Featured Section" was regraded, seeded and laid out with flagstone walks. The lots being in a circular arrangement with a large center arrangement of shrubs, flower beds and benches to be installed later. This circular lot pattern enabled us to gain forty three lots over the previous arrangement.

In the West Cemetery a large oak tree had to be removed as a precautionary measure. A regrading program is planned for this cemetery this coming year.

In the Fore Fathers Cemetery many historical stones were repaired. A new heating system was installed in the Hearse House. The Middlesex Canal Toll House was removed from the lawn at the town hall and placed next to the Hearse House to be used as an office for the cemetery department.

In the Hart Pond and Fairview Cemeteries an intense fertilizing program carried on for the past few years has started to produce a much better turf. A tree planting program is planned for Fairview Cemetery this coming year.

During the past year twenty cemetery lots were sold.

Due to an exceptionally wet summer, more grass was cut than in any previous year.

Four thousand dollars was returned to the town general fund from the cemetery perpetual care interest fund.

Due to the expansion in Chelmsford, and the number of inquiries coming in constantly in regards to cemetery lots, it is expected that this department will also enlarge rapidly from now on and it is the wish of the commissioners to have sections properly planned for any future need.

Home building reached an unprecedented peak in 1959, with permits issued for the construction of 482 dwellings having a value of \$8,676,000. Other permits, for stores, a church, the highway garage and alterations, brought the total number to 592 with an over-all total value of \$9,203,289.

The reports of the School Nurse, Plumbing Inspector, Animal Disposal Officer and Slaughter Inspector are contained elsewhere in the Annual Town Report.

Flu Vaccine was made available to all Town Employees by this Department.

DISEASES

The Communicable Disease picture for the year 1959 showed little change over the previous year, involving the minor communicable diseases such as chicken pox, measles and mumps. No record of any serious complications from any reported diseases were noted. For the fourth straight year no case of poliomyelitis was reported.

During the past year we have had eight cases of Tuberculosis. One of these individuals is under the care of a private physician. At this time there is only one presently hospitalized at the Middlesex County Sanatorium in Waltham.

GENERAL ENVIRONMENTAL SANITATION

This past twelve months a total of 833 Permits for sub-surface sewage were issued by this Department. These applications include improvements on present systems, individual building, subdivisions and industrial sites. At this time there are over 300 Permits still out-standing and probably will not be completed until better weather. The work entailed included initial Lot Inspections, follow-up and final approval Inspections. There have been problems in some of these installations, primarily due to land conditions and land drainage. The members of the Board of Health have spent considerable time in trying to eliminate these conditions, and by changing and improving the methods of installation.

With the constant growth in population there was an increase in the varied types of nuisance complaints. These were investigated by the Health Agent who facilitated their abatement through advice or regulatory means. Normal routine inspections of Milk Pasteurization Plants, Restaurants, Markets, Candy Manufacturers, Bake Shops and Bathing Beaches were made. Further associated with the normal functions of the Agent is the routine collection of milk and water samples, also the bacterial swab testing of eating and drinking utensils at all Eating Establishments.

There has been considerable discussion as to the merits of Mosquito Control. The Board feels that there should be some method of control, but at this time they would rather not make a definite decision.

The Garbage Contract expired December 31, 1959. There has been a change in that the Town has been divided and there are two individual contractors at a considerably higher figure.

There is information available in detail for any interested citizen in the Board of Health Office.

TREE DEPARTMENT

To the Citizens of the Town:

In addition to the usual tree work this year, new problems were presented to this department owing to the construction of route 110. Providing clearance for houses being moved to new locations was done with a minimum amount of alterations to town trees.

This years quota of new trees was used to complete street planting of the Buxton Drive area. An additional twelve trees were donated and planted by the Kiwanis Club. Other trees were planted by our Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and Cub Scouts in observance of Arbor Day.

MOSQUITO CONTROL

To the Citizens of the Town:

In complying with the majority, our method of application this year was confined to fogging along with ground application to low lands, catch basins, etc.

Our appropriation allowed fogging two nights each week through June, July and August. No dormant application was applied as this expenditure was not recommended. This gave the larva ample time to mature before any control was applied.

Existing conditions throughout the town such as construction of new homes and roads, re-location of brooks and creeks that are ideal breeding places for mosquitoes, and the abundance of rain made better control practically impossible.

Spraying this year consisted of three sprays at various intervals, one dormant and two adult sprays for the foliage. MacKay Library - Miss Bertha Whitworth, librarian; Miss Sharon Welch, clerk.

The libraries have just completed a very busy year with every indication of continued growth. The ever increasing population is making the inevitable demands on library services. To help meet these demands the library hours have recently been increased. Adams Library is now open from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Saturdays. MacKay has added Fridays to its weekly schedule.

Book deposits of from 20 to 50 books are supplied to seven different grade school teachers. Librarians are always willing to assist the readers with the selection of books or reference materials. Requests for this service are constantly increasing.

Much time and thought is devoted to book purchase in an effort to maintain a balance in subject matter as well as to select the new and popular books. We are grateful to the many friends of the libraries who have been generous with gifts of new or slightly used books. These are screened, catalogued and circulated as promptly as possible.

Deposit boxes have been installed outside each library for the convenience of the public. The regional bookmobile makes monthly stops at the Junior High and Westland schools. 4848 pieces of literature have been circulated in the town this past year through this medium. On May 31st Mrs. Lester Ball retired from the Adams Library staff where she had served as librarian for eleven years. The many patrons and co-workers to whom she had endeared herself, sincerely miss her and wish her many years of happy retirement.

Mr. Raymond Kroll has been in charge of exhibits in the reading room display case. These exhibits have been varied and interesting and have reflected the time and effort expended by Mr. Kroll and the exhibitors. Many will regret to learn that this year will be the last of these exhibits, at least for a while. The case is being placed in storage to make room for more book shelves for junior and senior high school readers.

The Chelmsford garden club members have continued to supply the libraries with arrangements during the fall and winter months. This service is genuinely appreciated by all who frequent the libraries.

It may be that the general public is not aware of the availability of George Memorial Hall for programs of an educational nature. This is an attractive room with a piano and seats about 75 people. There is a modern kitchen in the basement which may be used in conjunction with the hall.

tions pertaining to Chelmsford Civil Defense.

Regular meetings have been held each week throughout the year by the director and staff. The staff has attended many of the sector and area meetings held by the state for special instruction in various programs coordinated by the state and towns.

The auxiliary police met throughout the year, and have completed training in advanced first aid, proper use of firearms, and practice of same, police regulations and rescue work. Their training has been handled by Sergeant Basil Larkin of the Chelmsford Police, under the direct supervision of Chief Ralph Hulslander. We have had many occasions to utilize our auxiliary during the year in emergency work. They have responded to fire calls, drownings, persons lost and reported for traffic duty when needed.

The classes in advance first aid have been conducted by school nurse, Mrs. Helen Jewett, R.N. Eighty women have given their time to take advantage of this training. The course consisted of 76 hours of training covering 16 weeks. The results of this course have been evident by the continued interest in the program, and the eighty women have completed the course and received a certificate from the State Civil Defense as trained first aid technicians.

The radio hams are well organized and directed by Mr. Mel DeJarger and Mr. Robert Wallace. Regular drills have been conducted throughout the year. The radio communication set-up in Chelmsford is comparable to any other community in Massachusetts. Our control center is well equipped, and can be staffed in a very short period of time should the occasion arise. Many new hams have been trained by this group and received their licenses to operate radio equipment under their own call letters.

We have prepared a budget for 1960, and realizing the need for economy, have only asked for those funds that were essential to maintain our present equipment in good order.

We wish to thank all the town officials who have so willingly co-operated with us during the year. We want to especially thank those dedicated people who have given their time and efforts to work with us in our several programs.

We invite any persons in town to participate in our efforts in the coming year.





SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The format of this report has changed in keeping with the revision of the Annual Town Report. The statistical data, charts and tables, usually reported are on file at the Office of the Superintendent of Schools.

The Chelmsford School Committee's educational policies have developed a school system organization which permits, encourages, and advances individual ideas, creativity, and responsibility on the part of all — administrators, teachers, pupils and parents.

The Chelmsford School System has progressed with the everchanging times under efficient and able leadership to the point where it is considered by many to be the best system in the Greater Lowell area. As the number to be educated in our town continues to grow, so too must the educational program expand if each child is to achieve the finest development of which he is capable.

Curriculum study committees, at all levels, are continuing their work of planning, evaulating, and revising so that the curriculum will be flexible and adjustable to changing conditions in order that our students may be academically, physically, socially and morally prepared to progress.

Today, more than ever before, parents are interested in what is being taught. They are beginning to look at the curriculum and are interested in content as well as method. They desire research, experimentation in class size, and flexibility in planning. Above all, they desire that their children have more and better education than they had.

As the year 1959 ends, let us review some interesting data on our School System.

The growth of our school population is so rapid that our school building is hardly keeping up with it. The increase in our school enrollment from October 1, 1958 to October 1, 1959 was 236. It is estimated that the enrollment from October 1, 1959 to October 1, 1960 will be increased by a minimum of 300 and a possible maximum of over 400 pupils if the present up-surge in building continues — roughly the enrollment of a new school!

Two, if not all of the three presently abandoned four-room school buildings, will be reactivated next fall. Also, it must be expected that changes within established school areas may also necessitate rezoning. When changes are required, every attempt is made to effect them with a minimum of hardship.

The new high school opened this fall has eased the pressure on the secondary level but we still face the need for additional elementary and junior high classrooms.

With increased enrollment, additional personnel, both teaching and non-teaching must be added.

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CHELMSFORD SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL

The new High School, opened in September reflects the careful planning and work of the Building Committee over the past four years. The classrooms are refreshingly different in utility and color. The aids for instruction, the Library, Language Arts Room, the Shops, Gymnasium and Auditorium already have made deep and lasting impressions on both students and teachers.

The work of the faculty over the past several years has resulted in an enriched curriculum by the addition of courses in Industrial Arts, Household Arts, Art, Arts and Crafts, German, Speech, Group Guidance, an accelerated reading program and creative writing classes. The first year of French has been introduced into the ninth grade curriculum.

New facilities have made it possible to revise the Science and Mathematics courses, and the Activity Program was increased to include a Debating Club, a Radio Club, a Glee Club for Boys and a Dramatic Club for Freshmen and Sophomores.

This year, for the first time, Department Heads were appointed in several subject areas to assume specific responsibilities for the organization, development, and improvement of the curriculum; for making recommendations for new books and auxiliary aids; for keeping each subject syllabus revised and up-to-date; and for attending conferences in their various fields of interest so that they might be better qualified to meet their changing and growing educational obligations.

The new Library has become an important part of the curriculum. Through the combined efforts of the School Committee, the PTA, the Chelmsford Kiwanis Club, and interested citizens, the Library can serve adequately each pupil in accordance with his purpose and interest.

CHELMSFORD JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

The Junior High School is an innovation in the educational system of the Town of Chelmsford. It is a transition school aimed at bridging the gap between the elementary schools and the high school with a bond of academic and social activities unified in one building. The use of the former high school for grades seven and eight has provided the staff with the facilities necessary for the establishment of a modern junior high program.

Consideration is now being given to changes necessary or desirable in the curriculum for grades seven and eight to provide for an accelerated group capable of doing advanced work in certain areas leading toward advanced placement on the college level.

For the first time, an orientation night for parents was scheduled during American Education Week. It is felt that programs of this type make for better communication between parents and teachers.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

The major purpose of elementary education is to insure opportunities for all children to develop those fundamental understandings, skills, habits, attitudes, and appreciations necessary for living in a democratic society.

We believe that each child can make a definite and important contribution to society. Our first responsibility, therefore, is to search out his interests, needs, and abilities. It is our further responsibility to provide the environment that will challenge and stimulate every pupil.

The basic skill, more necessary than any other for success in all fields, is reading. Consequently, close guidance is given in this subject by the teacher, principal, and reading teacher. We group our children within the classrooms according to their reading needs.

The reading supervisors assist teachers in all grades by doing group and individual testing; analyzing reading difficulties from a remedial and preventive standpoint, and working with the teacher to make it possible for each child to be successful in this basic area. As much work as possible is done with children who need specific help.

The experiment in team learning started last year is being continued. This experiment is being conducted in conjunction with the development of a flexible curriculum so that each child will have the opportunity for maximum achievement.

This year for the first time, parent-teacher conferences will be introduced. The individual conference is an excellent means by which the teacher may report satisfactorily on all phases of child growth — academic, social, emotional and physical. The report of a child's progress is limited within the small space of a report card in many instances. The parent-teacher conference, however, allows for a much more meaningful discussion and interpretation of a child's growth.

By using Federal Funds available under Public Law 85-864, where local funds are matched on a dollar for dollar basis, additional material and equipment have been purchased and made available for the continuous improvement of our instructional program in the areas of Science and Mathematics.

The Parent-Teacher Associations, instrumental in starting School Libraries, are continuing their Library Programs. This service, augmented by appropriations through the School Department, will lead, it is hoped, to good school library facilities.

HERE AND THERE

Guidance

Each individual is unique. Children differ in native ability, in interest patterns, in emotional maturity, in educational achievement, in physical development, and in career and educational goals. The unique characteristics of each student must be known, or if not known, should be identified, so that cooperative planning may take place in meeting his needs for present instruction and future educational and vocational training and placement.

One of our primary concerns at present is that of guiding each student into that curriculum which will best help him develop his own in-

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terests and achieve his own personal goals, and at the same time prepare him to meet his obligations as a citizen of a great democracy. The guidance counselors give mental, aptitude, achievement, and interest tests, so that our young people can understand more fully their own capabilities and potentialities. Parents are urged to consult guidance counselors and teachers in a concerted effort to determine as nearly as possible the educational needs of every student. Only after real deliberation and the most careful use of all available data can the choice of a course of study be wisely made, and the choice must be wisely made if the school is to help the student attain his full intellectual development. Art

The art program has been expanded by the hiring of an additiona! teacher. The work of the art classes is planned so that it becomes effective through successive stages. Considerable attention is given to motivation, since the student's interest is necessary before any significant expression can be brought forth.

Music

Music instruction is given in both voice and instrumental areas.

Vocal music in the elementary grades consists of singing, rhythmic activities, listening, ear training and the understanding of written music; on the secondary level it consists of singing, listening, and music appreciation.

Instrumental music is encouraged at all grade levels. Group playing starts in the elementary schools and culminates with the senior high school band.

Physical Education

For the first time, we have two full-time physical education teachers at the Senior High School; thus making it possible for all boys and girls to have the opportunity to take physical education. The new gymnasium with its fine equipment has caused the program to be accepted with considerable enthusiasm.

In the Junior High School, an effective physical education program has been organized and a broad intramural program introduced. Cafeteria

The interest in the School Lunch Program continues unabated. This year we have served 225,674 meals and 491,496 bottles of milk to the students. The price of 25c for a hot lunch and 3c per bottle of milk remains unchanged. The Federal Government through the State Government, subsidizes the program to the extent of 9c for each pupil lunch and 4c for each bottle of milk. In spite of the ever-increasing costs for food, supplies and labor, the program is completely self-supporting. Health

The School Health Program continues the same as over the past years except for the increased case load per nurse due to the school population growth.

Physical examinations are done every year in Grades 1, 4, 7 and 1! by the two school physicians.

The Vision and Hearing Tests are done yearly, and all failures are reported to the parents by the two school nurses.

Maintenance

The establishment of the Maintenance Department two years ago is paying large dividends to the Town. This year the department saved the citizens many thousands of dollars when it undertook the renovation of the old high school building, not to mention the numerous repair projects throughout the system.
