FIRE CHIEF ERNEST G. BYAM

Ernest G. Byam, Chief of the Fire Department, died on January 31, 1965.

Chief Byam was first appointed a call firefighter in October, 1931. He was appointed a permanent fireman September 23, 1954, moving up through the ranks to become Chief on November 10, 1958.

He was widely known and admired not only in Chelmsford but throughout the Middlesex County area and in state fire-fighting circles.

His untimely passing put an end to a career dedicated to the Fire Service, a career in which he earned the respect of his fellow-workers and of the townspeople.

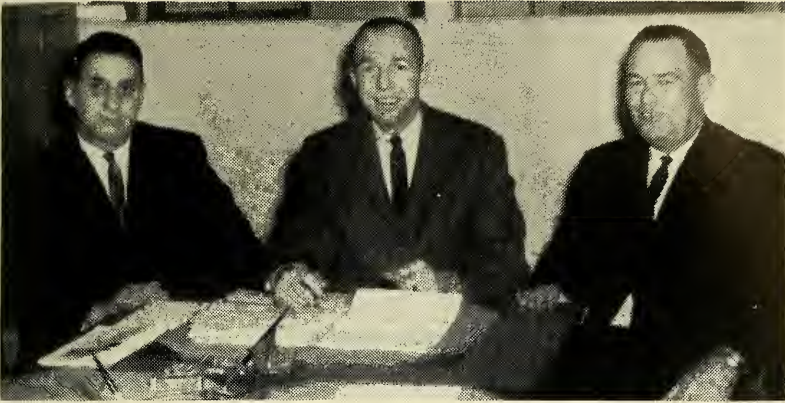

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Town of Chelmsford completed the year 1964, by observing its 309th birthday as a township, with many changes worthy of notation.

Perhaps the most important change being, the streamlining of the functions of the Board of Selectmen, which has been geared to attaining greater efficiency, closer cooperation and working relationships with other town boards, giving more time to matters concerning administrative affairs while not neglecting routine items and public problems.

This aforementioned streamlining, has enabled your Board of Selectmen to practically double the amount of business conducted during the year 1964 over that of the year 1963, without imposing any hardship on the Board of Selectmen.

This has been accomplished by setting up an agenda for the Board of Selectmen's weekly meeting whereby, each item to be discussed is scheduled, and a time allocated to properly survey the question at hand. The public appearing before the Selectmen at their request, do so by appointment only, which assures them of the board's complete attention without interruption and also affords the board ample time to prepare for the answers. This has resulted in greater public satisfaction in their contacts with the Board of Selectmen and has given the board more time to devote to other matters.

During the year 1964, the Board of Selectmen has had some seventy meetings of record which include the regular and special meetings which have been necessary for conducting town affairs. These meetings of your Board of Selectmen average some three hours per meeting.

Over the past year there has been much discussion on various forms of town government. Committees having been appointed to study same, have presented the Selectmen-Town Manager form of government to the Town Meeting in the years 1963 and 1964, only to have their proposal defeated on each occasion.

Again in 1964, for lack of support and information, a proposal to establish the position of Executive Secretary to the Board of Selectmen, was withdrawn with the approval of the Town Meeting.

This action by the Town Meeting must be taken as a mandate by the Board of Selectmen that, for the present at least, it is the wish of the people to continue with the present form of town government and with this in mind all efforts by the Selectmen have been towards efficient and organized control of town affairs, delegation of matters to proper officials who are responsible by the very nature of their respective positions to carry out to the end result all assigned business.

The entire Town of Chelmsford, has been indeed saddened during the year 1964, by the deaths of several devoted Town employees namely, Dr. Winslow E. Merrill, who served the Town of Chelmsford as Animal Inspector from February 1955 to April 1964, Edward T. Brick, who served the Town of Chelmsford as a member of the Board of Registrars from November 1955 to May 1964, Peter F. Fitts, who served the Town of Chelmsford as a member of the Police Department from November 1956 to October 1964, Raymond J. McGlinchey who served the Town of Chelmsford as a member of the Fire Department and as Deputy Chief from April 1945 to November 1964, Surely, though they are no longer with us they will long be remembered for their faithful service to the town.

Many improvements to existing town ways have been undertaken during the year 1964.

An extremely dangerous intersection at Billerica Rd., Turnpike Rd., and Golden Cove Rd., has been all but eliminated by the installation of traffic control warning lights which have resulted in the fact, that there have been no motor vehicle accidents reported at this location during the year 1964.

Work on improvements to Chapter 90 roads has continued with an extension of the rebuilding of Old Westford Road from School St., to Arbutus Ave., making the second section of this road to be completed. Work on the third section will commence in the Spring.

Resurfacing of other Chapter 90 roads in the North, South and Center sections of town have been made under a program geared to maintaining present roads in a condition that will preclude heavy expenditures in future years for their reconditioning.

Installation of street lighting along town ways has been progressing steadily, keeping pace with the new streets being accepted each year. A program is now being studied by the Selectmen with the local public utilities company to provide an up to date lighting system in Vinal Sq., and Central Sq.

The Highway Department has done an outstanding job this year as in the past, in providing public services and in their construction programs, all of which have been accomplished within their budget figures and adding more construction than had been planned as a result of careful planning and expenditures.

During the year 1964, it became necessary to make further renovations in Town Hall to keep abreast of required facilities to conduct town business. In the office of the Town Clerk, in particular, an expansion of this office was made by removing a stairway to the upper hall which resulted in the additional space required.

The exterior of the Town Hall has been painted and a new roof applied to maintain the present building in an appearance characteristic of the town.

The interior of the main entrance was repainted and work on the electrical system was necessary to comply with State laws regarding safety requirements.

Needless to say, there is a need in the future for a new Town Hall building, but for the present with other town government expenditures being what they are, we must make do with what we have by proper upkeep and maintenance of the present building.

It will be necessary during the year 1965, to continue a program designed to prevent deterioration of the Town Hall in the Center as well as, the North Town Hall building.

Never before in the history of the town has the North Town Hall had as much use by the people. We are indeed fortunate to have this building for use by our young people such as, Boy and Girl Scouts, youth organizations, various charitable organizations and others, which makes it a necessity to provide for the required upkeep of this building.

The residential growth of the town has continued at a steady pace irrespective of the revised zoning by-laws. This increase in population in turn increases the need of public services which the Police, Fire and Highway Departments must provide.

For the present it is being provided with little more cost than in recent years; nevertheless, as everything else rises in cost, so must these services.

In 1964, the Town Meeting authorized the construction of a new police station building to replace the present inadequate facility located

in Town Hall. Unfortunately, the results of two separate biddings were such, that insufficient funds had been appropriated to construct the building. It is hoped, that the 1965 Town Meeting will vote the necessary additional funds to get this project underway and as a result, provide greater and more efficient police protection for our townspeople. Our Police Department is certainly to be congratulated for their satisfactory operation under such adverse working conditions.

Fire protection in the town has more than met the great demands placed on this department, through efficient organization, efficiency in operations and excellent upkeep of our present equipment. Here again there is in the planning stage, a new station in the south section of town, due to the heavy growth in that area. We can indeed be proud of our Fire Department.

During the year 1964, the Town of Chelmsford has welcomed many new industrial and commercial buildings along with its residential construction. It is this type of taxable property which enables the town to broaden its tax base. May our future commercial and industrial growth be commensurate with the overall character of the town.

As a result of careful studies made by the Town Insurance Advisory Committee, the insurance program is now conducted by a single broker of record. This in turn has given the town greater protection and coverage than ever before at a substantial decrease in cost. The committee assigned this task has well fulfilled their assignment.

It is anticipated that the newly initiated Selectmen's proposal of quarterly meetings with all other elected and appointive town boards will also greatly lend itself to better informed and efficient town government.

This report by your Board of Selectmen, is made in an effort to inform the townspeople of some aspects of our town government. Other reports by various boards and committees complete the overall picture.

We, therefore, take this opportunity to publicly express our appreciation to all town officials and their departments for the cooperation and assistance they have afforded us during the past year.

To the Townspeople, we hope as their Selectmen, we have served them in a manner befitting the confidence that they have placed in us.

The proposed amendment provides that the credit of the Commonwealth may be given, loaned or pledged only by a two-thirds vote of each branch of the Legislature. In no event shall the credit of the Commonwealth be given or loaned to or for any individual, private association or corporation privately owned or managed.

QUESTION NO. 4. Proposed Amendment to the Constitution

Summary

The proposed amendment authorizes both the Governor and the Executive Council to require opinions of the Justices of the Supreme Judicial Court on questions of law. The present requirement that the Governor and Council agree before a question may be submitted would be annulled.

Summary

The proposed measure provides that henceforth appointments in the executive branch of the government shall not require the advice and consent of the Governor's Council. Exceptions to this provision include appointments to the Youth Service Board, Industrial Accident Board, Commission of the Department of Public Utilities, Parole Board and Appellate Tax Board, which appointments shall continue to require Council action. However, should the Council fail to act upon such appointments within thirty calendar days, then the person involved shall be deemed to have been lawfully appointed. Any appointment in the executive branch by an officer other than the Governor which heretofore

required Council approval shall henceforth require approval by the Governor.

Removals from office shall no longer require the advice and consent of the Council, except in the case of the Youth Service Board, which removals must still receive Council approval. As in the case of appointments still requiring Council approval, such recommended removal from the Youth Service Board must be acted upon by the Council within thirty calendar days; otherwise the proposed removal shall become effective as if approval had been given. In the case of any appointment which heretofore required Council approval the Governor may, within fifteen days of the making of the appointment, remove the person appointed without cause.

The Council shall no longer be required to approve the fixing of any compensation for services rendered in the executive department. And henceforth there need be no approval by the Council of actions or agreements by executive officers, including but not limited to borrowings and loans, investments, leases, licenses, purchases and conveyances, and contracts, and also including the promulgation of rules and regulations.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Governor shall at all times remain free to seek the advice and consent of the Council upon any matter.

Summary

Under the Act, effective as of January 1, 1964, each member of the General Court shall receive seventy-eight hundred dollars for each regular annual session, the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive the same amount as additional compensation, and the floor leaders of each of the major political parties in the Senate and the House, the Chairman of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means and the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of that committee of the House shall each receive thirty-nine hundred dollars as additional compensation, to be paid as provided in the Act. After the same date the annual expense allowance is to be six hundred dollars for each member and the travel allowance is to be eight cents per mile with a stated minimum and an alternative, and a member chosen to fill a vacancy or who resigns during a session is to be entitled to per diem compensation at the rate for each regular annual session and to the allowances for travel and other expenses for the time of his membership.

It is also provided that in addition to the compensation for the 1963 annual session the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House

shall be paid thirty-nine hundred dollars, the floor leaders of each major political party in the Senate and House, the Chairman of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means and Chairman and Vice-Chairman of that committee of the House, shall be paid twenty-nine hundred and twenty-five dollars and each other member shall be paid nineteen hundred and fifty dollars. Each member shall also be entitled to an additional expense allowance of two hundred dollars for the calendar year 1963 and the travel allowance shall be at the rate of eight cents per mile with a stated minimum and an alternative for the balance of the calendar year 1963.

Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Chelmsford for the period from March 24, 1962, the date of the previous audit, to June 11, 1964, and submit the following report thereon:

The financial transactions, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined and checked with the records of the town accountant and the town treasurer.

The books and accounts in the office of the town accountant were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were checked with the treasurer's cash book, while the payments, as entered, were compared with the treasurer's cash book and with the treasury warrants. The appropriations, transfers, and loans authorized, as recorded on the ledgers, were checked with the town clerk's records of town meeting votes.

The ledgers were analyzed, a trial balance was taken off proving the accounts to be in balance, the necessary adjustments resulting from the audit were made and a balance sheet, a copy of which is appended to this

report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town as of June 11, 1964.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were analyzed and compared with the town accountant's records, with the records, in the several departments in which money was collected for the town, and with other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury. The payments, as recorded, were checked with the warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds and with the town accountant's records.

The cash balance on June 11, 1964 was proved by reconciliation of the bank balances with statements furnished by the banks of deposit, by examination of the savings bank books, by verification of the certificates of deposit, and by actual count of the cash in the office.

The payments on account of maturing debt and interest were verified by comparison with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities and coupons on file. The outstanding coupons were listed and reconciled with a statement furnished by the bank of deposit.

The records of payroll deductions on account of Federal and State taxes, the county retirement system, and group insurance premiums were examined and checked in detail. The deductions were footed, the payments to the proper agencies and the refunds to individuals were verified, while the balances, as shown on the individual employees' records, were listed and reconciled with the respective controls in the accountant's ledger.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investments of the several trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer and the trustees were personally examined and listed. The income was proved, and all transactions and balances were verified by comparison with the books of the town accountant.

The records of tax titles and tax possessions held by the town were examined and checked. The amounts added to the tax title account were compared with the collector's records. The reported redemptions were checked with the receipts as recorded on the treasurer's books, and the tax titles and tax possessions on hand were listed, proved, and checked with the records at the Registry of Deeds.

The books and accounts of the town collector were examined and checked. The taxes and excise outstanding according to the previous examination, as well as all subsequent commitments, were verified and checked with the assessors' warrants issued for their collection. The payments to the treasurer were verified, the recorded abatements were compared with the assessors' records of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the controlling accounts in the accountant's ledger.

The commitments of departmental accounts receivable were examined

and checked. The recorded receipts were checked with the payments to the treasurer, the abatements, as entered, were checked with the departmental records of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed, reconciled with the departmental records, and proved with the respective accounts in the town accountant's ledger.

Further verification of the outstanding accounts was made by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

A great deal of detailed checking was found necessary in order to reconcile the treasurer's and collector's accounts, as well as the assessors' records of abatements, thus adding materially to the time consumed in making the audit.

It is recommended that a determined effort be made to obtain a complete settlement of the delinquent tax and excise accounts which date back to 1957.

The records of departmental cash collections by the town clerk, the board of selectmen, the sealer of weights and measures, and the inspectors of buildings and wiring, as well as by the police, fire, health, highway, public welfare, school, library, and cemetery departments, and by all other departments in which money was collected for the town, were examined and checked. The payments to the town treasurer were verified, and the cash on hand in the several departments was proved by actual count.

The surety bonds filed by the several town officials for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, excise, tax title, tax possession, and departmental accounts, as well as schedules showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment funds.

For the cooperation extended by all the town officials during the progress of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and myself, to express appreciation.

Police answered 3,802 calls, served 737 summonses for out of town Police Departments, recovered 44 stolen cars, found 160 business places unlocked, made 283 arrests. The four cruisers patrolled 283,038 miles in 1964.

The year 1964 was a busy year for your Police Department as you can see by the preceding statistics.

As the town grows, a greater demand is placed on your Police Department for various services; in particular the number of homes to be checked when residents are on vacation. This is a very important phase of police work and I urge all residents to notify the Police Department when they are leaving on vacation, so that we may better serve you.

We expected to be in the new Police Station in the early fall of 1964 but due to the submitted bids being higher than the amount of money voted at the Special Town Meeting, construction cannot start until additional money is voted at the Annual Town Meeting in March of 1965. If the funds needed are voted we should be in the new station in the early fall of 1965.

The Auxiliary Police Band, under the able direction of Sergeant Basil Larkin, plans to continue the Band Concerts again this year as they have the past several years, which I feel brings a great deal of pleasure to young and old alike.

At the present time we have thirty Auxiliary Police Officers, completely uniformed and well trained in all phases of police work which they would be called upon to perform in case of an emergency. Sgt. Larkin is in charge of this fine group of dedicated citizens.

I wish to express my thanks to the Board of Selectmen and all other town officials and employees and also to the general public for the excellent cooperation given to the Police Department during the past year.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Ernest G. Byam, Chief

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

The Town of Chelmsford continues to build at a rapid rate, and this in turn causes an increase in requests for assistance from the Fire Department. We responded to 716 calls during 1964, and of this number, 56 were building fires, 237 were for brush fires, and there were 58 calls for the resuscitators.

Building fire losses were low this year, and proves that Chelmsford people take pride in their homes, and try to keep them safe from fire.

Our thirteen year old pick-up truck was replaced with a new one and is much better suited to our needs. It is fitted up to be used as a fire alarm service truck, and also can be used to great advantage on brush and grass fires.

The fire-fighters on their regular tour of duty did a considerable amount of repair and all of the maintenance work on all five stations as well as on the fire apparatus.

During this year we in the Fire Department and the townspeople suffered a great loss in the passing of our Deputy Chief, Raymond J. McGlinchey. The fact that his life was dedicated to the fire service will always be a tribute to his memory.

This year went into the record books as one of the driest in history, and the woodlands were extremely dangerous. Fires burned for days underground, and we had to keep a continual watch on all burned areas to be sure they did not get out of control from these underground fires.

Nursing Homes, schools and public buildings are continually inspected, and recommendations for safety are made to officials in charge.

Because of the necessity for lines of higher voltage, the electric utility company is continually putting in taller poles and this keeps us busy changing our fire alarm wires over to the new poles. We placed 5 new fire alarm boxes in service this year, and all boxes were painted and tested to be sure they were in working order.

For 1965 the department recommends that land be purchased for a new station, and a committee be appointed to draw up plans to be voted on at the Annual Town Meeting in 1966.

In order to keep our equipment up to standard we should trade in the station wagon in 1965 while the turn in value is at its peak, and in 1966 we should replace two old 500 G.P.M. Pumpers, which are obsolete, with one 1000 G.P.M. new Pumping Engine.

WIRE INSPECTOR

Harold Tucke, Jr.

The following is a report of the Wire Inspection Department for the year 1964.

There were 619 applications for inspection issued: 15 of these were for the electrical installations in commercial and industrial buildings, 325 were for the wiring of new homes or the rewiring of old homes, 4 were for apartment buildings and 1 for the new Junior High School. The remaining 274 were issued for minor installations such as, oil burners, hot water tanks, range, washer and dryer outlets, service changes, etc.

DEPUTY CHIEF RAYMOND J. McGLINCHEY

Raymond J. McGlinchey, Deputy Chief of the Fire Department, died on November 8, 1964, in the performance of his duty.

Deputy Chief McGlinchey served his country in the United States Marines in World War II, and when he was discharged from the Service in 1945 he was appointed as a regular firefighter. He rose in rank until in 1963 he was appointed Deputy Fire Chief.

His untimely passing put an end to a career dedicated to the fire service, a career which won him the respect of his fellow-workers and of the townspeople.

Fourteen new streets or 2.77 miles of road were accepted in 1964.

Considerable time was spent on drainage projects this year and include the following:

Main Street: 349 feet 12" plain concrete pipe, 40 feet 12" R.C. pipe, 5 catch basins installed.

Barry Drive: 200 feet 12" plain concrete pipe, 40 feet 12" R.C. pipe.

Davis Road: 624 feet 12" pipe, 1 manhole and 4 catch basins installed.

Wilson Street: 184 feet 12" R.C. pipe.

Pine Hill Road: 425 feet 12" pipe, 2 catch basins installed, 20 feet 10" metal culvert pipe.

Abbott Lane: 180 feet 10" pipe replaced with 180 feet of 12" pipe.

Wildwood Street: 48 feet 10" plain concrete pipe, 92 feet 12" plain concrete pipe.

Mill Road: 470 feet 12" R.C. pipe, 5 catch basins installed.

Hunt Road: 170 feet 12" R.C. pipe, 1 catch basin installed.

The Chapter 90 Construction project consisted of the continuation of the reconstruction of Old Westford Road. Two hundred feet of 18" R.C. pipe, 1300 feet of 15" R.C. pipe, 1125 feet 12" R.C. pipe and 12 catch basins and 12 manholes were installed. A new metal culvert pipe was installed across Old Westford Road. The road was excavated, 12" of gravel was placed with a surface treatment on approximately 2300 feet. In the latter part of the year, a two course bituminous concrete surface was constructed with 1¼" of top being placed over 1¾" base course. Bituminous concrete berms were installed on grades of 3% and over to control the water flow. Fine grading of the shoulders, seeding, and clean-up will be completed in the spring.

The Chapter 90 maintenance project included hot topping approximately 2500' on Acton Road.

The town received \$23,048.72 again this year from the State which is known as Chapter 822 funds. This money was spent to resurface sections of Acton Road, Groton Road and Billerica Road.

A traffic problem was alleviated by the installation of a traffic light or flashing beacon at the intersection of Golden Cove Road and Billerica Road.

The bridge on Mill Road was widened from an 18' original width to a 30' width eliminating a dangerous bottleneck at the bridge.

A storage shed was built at the town yard on Richardson Road to store salt which is used during the winter months.

New equipment purchased in 1964 include two sand spreaders, one waste collection truck, 1 pickup truck, and one portable drill and pavement breaker.

The usual oiling of streets, brush cutting, installing of street signs, sanding, snow plowing and snow removal, drainage, and general maintenance was performed throughout the year.

I wish to thank the townspeople for their kind consideration and cooperation and the Police Department for notifying the department of dangerous conditions on the roads during the winter months.

The Conservation Commission met monthly for the past year with some of the members attending regional and State level meetings in order to keep abreast of the new developments and changes taking place. CEMETERY COMMISSION

The Cemetery commissioners wish to report the following progress in the Cemetery Department for 1964.

In the Pine Ridge Cemetery which is the most active of the six town cemeteries much was accomplished in the way of filling in a large area, making a new section, adding a long section to the drainage system with two catch basins. The main entrance road was hot-topped and added much beauty to the cemetery. Another long section of wrought iron fencing was installed. This being another gift to the town from Mr. George Barris. A substantial gift of shrubbery from Mrs. Winslow Merrill beautified a large triangular section in the cemetery. Other shrubbery was also set out.

In the Fairview Cemetery a large expansion was started. Roads were oiled and an extension was made to the watering system.

In the West Cemetery, another extension was started with much grading, drainage work and fencing planned for 1965.

In all other cemeteries, general maintenance was carried on. Dead elm trees removed, fences repaired and top-dressing of areas was accomplished.

The new truck and equipment purchased last year proved very beneficial to the Cemetery Department.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

In 1964 the Planning Board had approximately 118 plans submitted outlining approximately 445 building lots. Of these, 220 lots came under the Subdivision Rules and Regulations requiring public hearings and approval by our Fire, Highway, and Health Departments. The balance were divisions, lot line changes, and boundary clarifications of land on existing accepted streets.

The growth pressure of the Greater Boston Area is felt in Chelmsford and, as the surrounding towns upgrade their zoning, Chelmsford again becomes the most desirable of the Greater Lowell communities for building.

The Planning Board can best serve Chelmsford in these changing times by keeping our Zoning By-Laws and Subdivision Rules completely up to date and within the scope of its authority, assuring their enforcement. It must be understood, however, that the Planning Board, under State Statutes, only has authority up to the actual subdivision. Thereafter, compliance and performance is beyond its limit.

The much stricter Subdivision Rules and Regulations adopted by the Planning Board in January 1961 have been operational for some time now with the procedure standardized and followed by all applicants and subdividers. These give no advantage to either the small or large builder.

The Planning Board attempts to keep the Zoning By-Laws up to date consistent with the best interests of Chelmsford and conforming to State Law. In 1963, the town supported the Planning Board in its complete revision of the Zoning By-Laws which became effective on June 17 of that year.

In 1964, many residents appeared before the Planning Board to report and describe alleged zoning infractions. While sympathetic with these, the Planning Board again emphasizes its authority and power for compliance or enforcement ceases with the signing of the plan authorizing the subdivision. It only has the right to grant subdivisions and, providing these are submitted according to the rules and regulations and meet all the zoning requirements, approval cannot be withheld.

TREE DEPARTMENT

Two consecutive years of drought has had very serious effect on our shade trees. The extended dry spell and ban of water use forced us to abandon the planting of young trees, instead we applied liquid wax to trees previously planted which showed evidence of dehydration.

The bulk of tree removal was accomplished through contract and awarded to the lower bidder.

The coming year finds us faced with serious damage; due to the severe ice storm which struck this area the latter part of this year.

A careful watch was kept to see that all complied with the town tree planting ordinance. As tree warden I have requested that all building bonds be held until such time as trees are planted as the law prescribes and inspections are made.

Considerable time was spent this year with local utility companies, due to the growth of the town and increase in power needed. This work involves a survey of all the trees by the utility company, the abutters are notified and the hearing is held, before any work is replaced by the utility company at no cost to the town. This work is supervised and carried out by the tree warden personally.

MOTH DEPARTMENT

Spraying was carried out in the usual procedure. The chemical used was of a low toxicity and approved by State and Federal authorities. Caution was used to comply with the standards set forth, for the safety of wild life, fish, water sheds, etc. We endeavored to accomplish the best results with the least possible amount of chemical necessary.

Poison Ivy control was very effective this year due to dry weather. The usual work of eradicating this weed was applied to bus stops, play areas, and other areas frequented by children. The need of an increase in this service is emphasized by the growth of the town and the request received by the town's people.

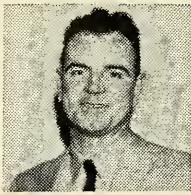
DUTCH ELM

COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

During the past year the incident rate of childhood diseases remained proportional with previous years except for measles which showed a substantial increase in cases over last year. There were no cases of poliomyelitis which indicates that the vaccination clinics were effective. There were five tuberculosis patients hospitalized at the Middlesex County Sanatorium, these were readmissions and new cases. Last year's expenditures from the Quarantine and Contagious Diseases account indicates that the 1965 appropriation be increased by \$1,000.00 to meet increased cost of hospitalization. Material has been obtained by this Board for a TB case finding clinic which will be implemented during 1965 for all the school population. The method the testing program will be based on, the Heaf principle of multiple puncture, sterneedle, is an improved device for painless, rapid and economical intradermal tuberculin testing.

GENERAL ENVIRONMENTAL SANITATION

A total of 318 sub-surface sewage permits were issued during the past year. Inspection of sub-surface sewage systems continue to be the major time consuming factor. Nuisance complaints are increasing, most of these are resolved. Routine inspections of eating and drinking establishments, markets, milk plants, piggeries, trailer camps, day care centers for children, mobile catering services and swimming beaches were conducted. The Board is pleased to report that the general sanitation of our food establishments remains commendable, and our two public beaches remained functional throughout the swimming season.

The report on Sewage and Sewage Disposal facilities was accepted by the Board of Health on July 14, 1964. Copies of the report are available for public use at the following places: Center Library, North Chelmsford Library and the Board of Health Office at the Town Hall. The report proposes a regional sewage works plan to include the construction of large intercepting sewers along the north and south banks of the Merrimack River and the construction of a large pumping station and sewage treatment plant in Tewksbury, just east of the Lowell City line, of adequate capacity to collect and treat sewage from the Town of Chelmsford, the City of Lowell and the Town of Dracut. The report further states that the annual cost for construction and operation of the regional works is estimated to be about 20 per cent less expensive than the municipal sewage works.

MOSQUITO CONTROL PROGRAM

An early mosquito control program could not be instituted last season because of administrative difficulties. A late lavacide aerial spray was carried out with a mixture of .2 lbs. DDT in $\frac{1}{2}$ gallon of kerosene per acre. Because of an exceptional dry season only one adulticide aerial spray was carried out in lieu of two. Material used was .5 lbs. malathion in .5 gallon of kerosene per acre. Local spot fogging was carried out in areas where aerial spraying could not be done.

SCHOOL NURSE REPORT

The school nurses play an important part in all phases of the school health program. Their duties are many and varied and they work closely with administration and personnel for a healthful and safe school year.

Three Sabin polio clinics were held during January, March and April.

Diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough clinics were held in March, April and May. All classroom children in grades 1 and 6, with parental consent, were inoculated. Small pox vaccination clinics were held in May.

In October, flu serum was given by Dr. Blechman to all town employees who desired this protection.

Physical examinations were conducted by the three school doctors.

The vision and hearing program was carried out by the technicians. The nurses do the follow-up work contacting parents regarding failures.

Classroom discussions and individual health lectures were given. Home visits and parent conferences were held whenever necessary.

The ever-growing school population now necessitates an increase in staff so that the established health program may continue successfully.

The cooperation of all concerned with the above program has been greatly appreciated.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST COMMITTEE

To the Board of Selectmen:

During 1964 your committee cleaned up most of the six acres on the southern boundary of the Thanksgiving Ground Forest that were burned in October 1963. This necessitated removing and burning almost all pines less than forty feet in height. We widened the trail that runs from the southwest to the southeast corner of the forest so that fire trucks can get through to Russell Mill Pond at the Carlisle line.

In the northern part of the forest we continued the reduction of too large and too numerous stands of dense young pines so as to create vistas and open spaces along the trails, and we all but completed the thinning out and cleaning up of the stand of large pines at the end of Janet Road.

In what we feel should be called the Mill Road Forest — the eighty-six acres just south of Mill Road — the D & B Construction Company, whose heads have been extremely cooperative, completed a very fine playground with an excellent cover of grass on it. This, together with a large playground parking lot, fronts on newly-opened Noble Road and is on land abutting on the forest. This playground was given to the town by the developers. At the extreme western end of Noble Road, just inside the forest, D and B have constructed a smaller parking lot for us.

By way of providing emergency access to the Mill Road Forest, your committee has begun cutting out two old woods roads, which will, of course, also serve as hiking trails.

The Thanksgiving Ground Forest is being used more and more and some people are already enjoying the Mill Road Forest. Your committee feels that the town would do well to acquire, as soon as possible, a good deal more forest land. Town forests will be very heavily used in the future and new land may be difficult to acquire.

PROGRAM:

The 1964 recreation program included for the first time seven new activities thus presenting a full years' program to the citizens. New activities were adult softball, adult par 3 golf and instruction, inclusion of special children in the playground and swimming program, adult basketball, girls figure skating, boys hockey and a tennis tournament. Activities in process at this writing include teen-age dances and outdoor skating areas.

SPRING AND SUMMER:

The boys baseball league (ages 9-12) opened the program fielding six teams. All games were played at a new field acquired by the commission on Jordan Road. Varney playground housed the junior baseball league which grew to six teams (ages 13-15) with 120 boys participating in a twelve week baseball schedule. The commission again sponsored a fifteen man team (ages 16-19) in the greater Lowell baseball league. A new adult men's softball league had six team entries, each team playing ten games at the McFarlin school field. This league promises to be an active program next season. The commission also contributed equipment to the farm system in the Little League program.

Four playgrounds were again in continuous operation from July to September averaging two hundred children participating per day. Each playground; East school, Westlands school, Janet Road and Varney playground, had two qualified supervisors instructing in both active and passive recreation. Several supervised field trips were again made to various points in the area.

A complete swimming program sanctioned by the American National Red Cross and instructed by a Certified Water Safety Instructor was enjoyed by four hundred participants. Classes for school children began at 9 A.M. continuing to 2 P.M., adults were given evening instructions at Crystal Lake.

Special children were integrated into the playground and swimming programs under the guidance of specially qualified instructors in an extremely successful program.

Adult golf instructions and a par 3 night league were conducted

at the Thunderbird golf course for the first time with thirty participating. The boys golf tournament was again held with sixty participants at the Thunderbird for both open and novice classes.

FALL:

A boys and girls tennis tournament was sponsored with seventy participants.

The Junior Football league (ages 12-15) fielded four teams each playing seven games at the McFarlin school playground.

WINTER:

The men's basketball league started in January with eighty adults participating at the high school gym.

Instruction in girls figure skating was started in mid January and continued to March.

A hockey clinic attracted over two hundred boys (ages 6-15) to receive instructions in the fundamentals of skating and hockey.

During 1964 considerable work has been accomplished at the Varney Playground and Edward's Beach. One new tennis court was constructed and was ready for the summer playground season. The two courts were used continually all summer long and finished with a tennis tournament under the supervision of Robert Ware of the Recreation Commission. This was a very successful program. We hope to resurface the old court next year.

Again this year the Recreation Commission used the playground and beach for their eight weeks program. The program was held daily from 9-12 and 1-3 and a baseball league played their games every evening. These programs were well planned and our congratulations to the supervisors and team manager for a job well done. We look forward to working with them next year.

The old bleachers that have been used at the playground for many years were torn down. We do not believe they need to be replaced at this time. If we find that the spectators at the ball games think we should have bleachers, we will try to replace them for the 1966 season. Our thanks to Mr. Greenwood and the employees of the highway department for removing the old bleachers and other help during the year.

Much new equipment and tools were purchased for both Varney Playground and Edward's Beach. Tables have been constructed for use at the beach and for the Recreation program for next year. These tables were constructed from the lumber salvaged from the old bleachers.

Beginning this year "1965" Edward's Beach will be restricted for the use of Chelmsford residents only. Between the Recreation Commission waterfront program and Edward's Beach Commission, the beach should be supervised daily from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. for a fine waterfront program.

The High School Junior Varsity Baseball team used the ballfield for their home games. We will have the diamond ready for them again in April if they wish to use it.

Early in the year we were saddened by the death of H. Franklin Gill who was elected to the commission in 1963. Although he had only been on the commission for a year, he had proved to be a capable business man and we all miss him as a member of the Varney Playground Commission and as a neighbor.

The commission also lost the services of John Dixon, who had been chairman for many years. Mr. Dixon resigned after 15 years of service. Our thanks to John for his advice and assistance during the past year. Elected to replace Mr. Gill and Mr. Dixon were Frank Delmore and George Swallow, III.

Our thanks to the Board of Selectmen, the Finance Board, the Town Accountant's office and Dr. Rivard for their helpful advice and assistance during the past year.

When the late Doctor Varney donated the land for the present Varney Playground, an association was formed to help in the development of the playground.

During the years of the playground formation the association raised money by various events to help financially in its completion. When the town of Chelmsford accepted the playground there was a small sum of money in the association treasury. During the past thirty years this sum with its accumulated interest grew to \$469.32.

The only remaining officers of the association are Royal Shawcross and John W. Dixon. They voted to donate the money in the treasury toward the construction of a new chain link fence enclosure for the new tennis court at the playground.

The work has been completed and we are proud to say it is an excellent improvement and will be appreciated by the tennis players.

We hope the town will vote sufficient funds at the Town Meeting to do a similar job for the adjoining tennis court.

We wish to thank Mr. Shawcross and Mr. Dixon for their continued interest in the Varney Playground.

During the year 1964, a considerable reduction in the number of inquiries for industrial land sites were received. The inquiries that were directed to the commission never developed beyond the information stage. An inquiry was made by the City of Lowell regarding a site for a new medical school. Information was furnished in this matter. With the reduction of industrial zoned land and with the proximity of residential areas to the land that is zoned for industrial, inquiries are more for commercial enterprises rather than industry.

It is anticipated that more activity in this area for industrial sites will be made during calendar 1965 and 1966 due to the relocation of industries being vacated from the NASA laboratory site in Cambridge.

Some ninety (90) industries will be looking for new sites when the question of their vacating is fully resolved.

We hope to attract some of these industries to our industrially zoned land in the Route 3 area.

The Board of Registrars holds six sessions for registration of voters, one in each precinct preceeding every election. All sessions in all precincts, except Precinct 1, Chelmsford Center, are held from 7:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. The final day of registration, the session is always held at the Town Hall, Chelmsford Center, from 12 noon until 10 p.m. Naturalized citizens must bring their final papers in order to become registered voters.

To vote in all elections, a person must be:

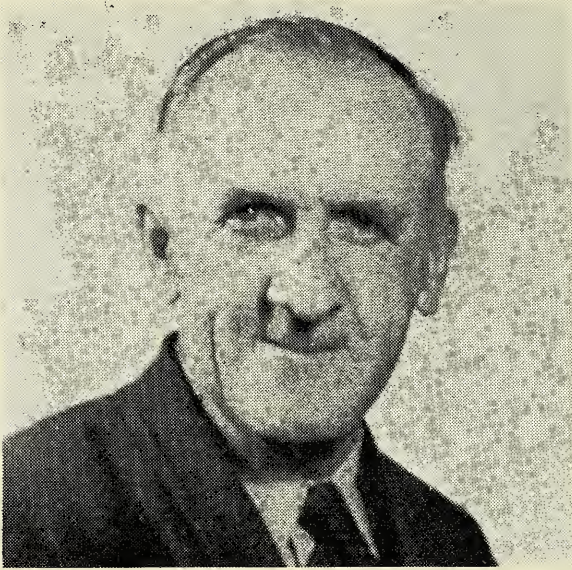
1. A citizen of the United States
2. 21 years of age or more
3. A resident of Massachusetts for at least 1 year on Election Day
4. A resident of Chelmsford for at least 6 months on Election Day
5. A registered voter, qualified before the Board of Registrars and signed the official list.

Registration is permanent. Once registered as a Chelmsford voter a citizen may vote in all elections as long as he continues to maintain a residence in Chelmsford except if a voter changes his name, either by marriage or by court action, or moves to another precinct, he must register again.

A Board of Registrars, under state law, has charge of the registration of voters. They prepare the annual Register of Voters divided according to Precincts and listing the voters by street address and with political party designations. This Register of Voters is used at the polls at elections.

The 3 Registrars are appointed for a 3-year term by the Selectmen on a bi-partisan basis. The Town Clerk is an ex-officio member of the Board.

During 1964, your Elementary School Needs Committee, which serves also as your school building committee, initiated construction of a junior high school on Graniteville Road, and is hopeful that this structure will be ready for occupancy in September, 1965.

The building is a solidly constructed concrete structure planned to provide all of the necessary classrooms and special rooms, gymnasium and cafeteria required for such a school.

In accordance with our announced plans of a year ago, the committee now has planned an auxiliary room to be built between the McFarlin and old junior high school on Billerica Road, and to be connected by enclosed walkways to both buildings. This structure will provide the required cafeteria space for the pupils using the two buildings as an elementary school. This is in accordance with the plans of the School Committee which is to convert these buildings for elementary school use when the new junior high school opens. The proposed building has been held to minimum detail in order to keep costs as low as possible and yet serve its purpose economically and efficiently. Our proposal for this addition will be included in the town warrant of March 1, 1965.

Continuing studies of school needs in this fast-growing town have caused the committee to revamp its schedule of school building needs. Two years ago we estimated that the town's school population would reach 8,000 in 1980. This also was the estimate of the master planner who worked for the planning board. Today we know that the 8,000 figure will be reached probably not later than 1970. This means that another twenty-four room elementary school must be started almost immediately, and the committee had planned to submit several land purchase proposals to the town at the March 1965 town meeting for action by the voters. However, it is impossible to get a state health test and approval of any land prior to April, 1965. As soon as the state report on land sites is received, your committee will ask for a special town meeting for the purpose of requesting funds for the purchase of land and preliminary plans for proposed elementary school.

At this time, it might be well to inform all of the townspeople that even with this additional twenty-four room elementary school there is no end in sight yet to school needs and will not be until the growth of the town stabilizes.

From the number of new houses being constructed each year and sub-divisions being approved, one of which at least may allow for several score two-family houses, we cannot foretell when the in-migration will end. Chelmsford still has a great deal of undeveloped land and, with modern machinery and methods, land which a few years ago was considered unsuitable for dwellings now can be made acceptable within the necessary financial limitations which enter into all subdivision programs.

We are trying to plan all school building on conservative population estimates in order to avoid "over-building". This sometimes results in temporary inconvenience in some of the school divisions, but it prevents wasteful expenditure.

In closing, we wish to extend our thanks to the school officials and to the people of the town for their endless cooperation in our activities.

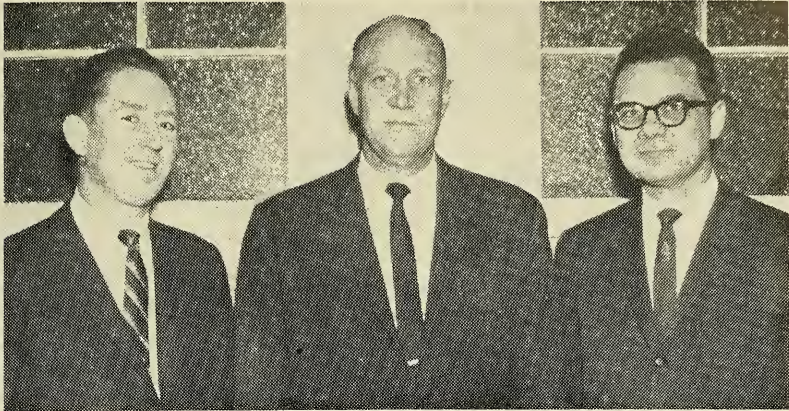

In submitting this report on the Chelmsford Public Schools for the school year 1964, the School Committee and the Administration realize fully the power of education. The excellent educational opportunities which exist for the young people in Chelmsford have come because of enthusiastic school personnel and an appreciation on the part of the citizens of this community that education is an integral and indispensable part of the fabric of life in our nation. While some individuals and groups, perhaps, have done more than others, the total community effort has sustained a public school system that continues to be recognized as outstanding in this area.

STUDENT ENROLLMENT AND SCHOOL PLANT

Looking back over the past years and predicting ahead a few years, one can only conclude that the Chelmsford Public School System is no longer a small school system. The growth of the system has been most rapid over the past few years. A straight line projection indicates that the present rate of growth will continue over the next few years.

The following chart indicates the past and predicts the future growth of the Chelmsford Public Schools.

The class of 1955 had 74 graduates; the class of 1965 currently numbers 326; the class of 1975 (the present 2nd grade) numbers 714.

Continuing studies of school needs have caused the Elementary School Needs and Building Committee to revise its schedule of school building needs. It is now apparent that the imigration of students into the school system indicates that several schools and/or additions to schools will be needed by 1970.

The opening of the new Junior High School next September will allow the present Junior High School and the adjacent McFarlin School to be converted for elementary school use. However, for September, 1967 an additional twenty-three classrooms must be obtained if double sessions are to be avoided again.

Attention is called to the report of the Elementary School Needs and Building Committee, published in this Annual Report of the Town, and its specific recommendations which the School Committee recommends that the citizens of the town follow; namely:

1. In accordance with the plans of the School Committee that the town vote to construct an auxiliary room with enclosed passages between the present Junior High School and McFarlin School buildings to serve as a cafeteria and all-purpose room for these buildings when they are converted for elementary use.
2. That the town vote, as soon as the State Board of Health's approval is received, at a Special Town Meeting, funds for the purchase of land and preliminary plans for an elementary school.

In addition to these specific recommendations, the Elementary School Needs Committee informs all citizens of the town that, after thorough study of the present school buildings, pupil and town population projections, and curriculum, there is no end in sight yet to school building needs and that there will not be until the growth of the town stabilizes.

PERSONNEL

The number of teachers in our system continues to increase in response to the growing pupil enrollment. This past September, teachers and Administrators numbered two hundred forty-five. It is estimated that an additional thirty-eight teachers will be added to the staff when the fall term opens.

Without doubt, quality teaching is the core of the educational program. Regardless of all other factors, our schools will be good only because of excellence in teaching. A good curriculum is worthless without superior teachers to bring it to life in the classrooms. The school system has been fortunate to date in recruiting well qualified teachers. The willingness of the town to provide adequate funds for a competitive salary scale has made this recruitment possible. It is apparent that revisions of salary policies, including fringe benefits, will be a matter of concern for some time to come.

CURRICULUM

In this report, it is impossible to summarize the many interesting and significant things going on in the Chelmsford Public Schools; however, there are aspects to curriculum revision and development that deserve attention.

Coordinators and Department Heads:—

The School System has gained a respected position for providing pupils with a broad, sound and well-balanced education. Part of this accomplishment is due to the complex problem of identifying needed improvements, keeping abreast of advances in all subject fields, preparing new materials, thoroughly orienting teachers before introducing new methods and planning for the gradual introduction of advanced materials so that pupils and teachers are not confused and frustrated. To achieve these goals, coordinators and department heads have been introduced into the system over the past few years. As we look to the future, this system should be extended gradually so that the ultimate aim would be subject-matter coordinators covering all grades from one through twelve and organizing subject-matter content at each grade level so that it has greater meaning in terms of fundamental goals.

In-Service Teacher Workshops: —

The in-service training program initiated three years ago is being continued in certain subject areas. This action was justified for two reasons: (1) changes that have occurred in basic subject content, and (2) curricular changes that require extended knowledge on the part of teachers.

Dr. Pearl Nelson of Boston University is completing a course for elementary teachers in which the new approaches to science are emphasized. In addition to exploratory work, teachers have been given ample opportunity to develop activities, experiences, and materials for use in their own classrooms. The final outcome of the workshop will be a new science curriculum and guide for the elementary grades.

Miss Margaret A. Cates, Elementary Coordinator, is presenting a Modern Mathematics course for elementary teachers who were not in the system when Dr. J. F. Fitzgerald of Boston University presented a course for elementary teachers entitled, "Improving the Elementary School Mathematics Program".

The Junior and Senior High School teachers have had several workshop sessions in the newer teaching methods and materials. The teaching potentials of overhead projections, the making of original transparencies, study and evaluation of teacher-made tests, instructional aids and the whole area of the so-called new techniques such as machine teaching, programmed learning and large group instruction are being studied carefully.

The Junior High School teachers have been reevaluating the curriculum offerings with the administrators to determine the constructive changes to be made in the expanded facilities provided by the new Junior High School.

During the summer of 1964, committees of elementary teachers worked on science and language arts projects under the direction of the principals and coordinators.

In-service courses are an important investment in education that will benefit the children of Chelmsford.

Educational Television:—

Since its initial appearance, television has been continually increasing in its contribution to the enrichment of the curriculum.

As the third year of using closed circuit television, as a teaching medium, begins, the administrative staff and teachers have been evaluating the progress made by utilizing this aid and making plans for its extensive use in the future. The unavoidable increase in class size over the past several years has placed a burden on each classroom teacher in his efforts to provide the best education possible for the children in his classes. Through the admirable efforts of the classroom teachers and the use of closed circuit television, the problem of class size is diminishing.

During the past year, approximately forty lessons were telecast each week to the schools. The lessons include art, music, phonics, physical education, speech therapy, social studies, science, guidance and testing. In addition to the lessons telecast, a resources library of video tapes has been started. This library consists of lessons in special areas made by residents of Chelmsford. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration cooperated by sending several teams of specialists to Chelmsford to make twelve tapes for the science curriculum. The Chelmsford Citizens Advisory Committee has been extremely valuable by resurveying the community for people with special knowledge who are willing to come into the schools and make a video tape in a curriculum area.

The use of television video tape has become a vital part of the cur-

riculum because of its flexibility. Its use permits preparation, storage, and previewing of lesson material well in advance of classroom presentation. Video tape also permits the preparation of lessons during the summer and vacation periods when teachers do not have the pressure of the classroom.

School Libraries:—

The school library is a very important part of our educational program. The advanced programs which we are encouraging in our schools require abundant resource materials. Continued additions to all of our school libraries will be needed to bring them to a proper operational level.

The circulation of books in the High School Library has increased greatly over that of last year. Classroom teachers are taking full advantage of library resources in their preparation of topics to be studied by their classes.

The administration is taking full advantage of matching funds under the National Education Defense Act for the purchasing of resource materials in the areas of science, guidance, mathematics and foreign languages.

OF GENERAL INTEREST

High School:—

General Science and Biology teachers have taught several units by the team-teaching method, taking advantage of the facilities of the lecture hall which can accommodate 104 students. Other subject area teachers have used this facility for more specific topics requiring one or two days instruction in large groups.

During the past year, Honors Courses have been evaluated and have been found to be accomplishing their major objective. The teachers of these courses are providing students that have exceptional ability a greater depth of learning in their high school preparation.

The policy of requiring students to take five major subjects has been enthusiastically accepted by students and faculty. This has allowed every student to expand his scholastic program for each of the four years. Homework assignments are continually being reviewed so that students, regardless of their academic level will have realistic amounts of home study every school night.

New Junior High School:—

For both the faculty and the student body, the opening of the Junior High School next September should be a thrilling experience. The architect and contractor are taking great care to preserve the natural beauty of the setting by saving a maximum of the fine trees on the site. The classrooms will be most attractive and the equipment and facilities of the best.

The achievement of the pupils in curriculum and extra-curricular activities should be of a high order. The new industrial arts and home

economics programs will now make possible a more comprehensive curriculum for all pupils—those who are college bound and those who are not.

Adult Education:—

Courses in adult education continued to be popular and are here to stay. Approximately four hundred fifty students enrolled in seventeen courses. Among the courses offered, Typewriting, Sewing and Furniture Refinishing seem to be the most popular. If there is an interest in starting a new course, arrangements may be made by contacting the Director of Adult Education.

Guidance:—

The year of 1964 has seen the largest school enrollment in the history of the town. More students than ever before have gone on to college. Throughout the system, there has been growth and change. A basic philosophy that recognizes the importance of each individual is demonstrated in the careful guidance given to individual students concerning their choice of programs, in the many conferences held with both parents and pupils by the guidance counselors, and in the recommendations of the different kinds of colleges to both parents and pupils.

On the elementary school level, the program under the Adjustment Counselor is functioning smoothly. Children who are under-achieving or are having social, emotional or behavior problems are referred by the classroom teacher, through the elementary principal, to the Adjustment Counselor. In every instance, parental approval and cooperation are sought.

Chelmsford pupils consistently score above the national median scores on standardized tests administered to all pupils. The High School students have consistently placed high on College Board Examinations and on National Merit Scholarship Examinations.

Big Business:—

The School Lunch Program has shown considerable growth during the school year. Cafeteria receipts totaled \$136,718.09 with an additional \$58,055.83 reimbursed from State and Federal Funds through June, 1964. The hot lunch participation has increased in all schools, but a marked growth was observed in the High School. Even with ever increasing costs for food supplies and labor, the program is still self-supporting.

Physical Education:—

The Physical Education Department has been working to organize its staff and offerings into a coordinated unit within the Chelmsford School System. The results of this effort are better teaching, more systematic and thorough coverage of the subject matter, and more efficient purchase and use of supplies. There is marked improvement in the results of this year's physical fitness tests over those of last year.

Health Education has been added to the physical education program of the Junior High School. Boys and girls meet with their respective physical education teachers once a week to study, discuss and learn about a total health program. This instruction comes at an appropriate time in their personal growth and development.

The High School athletic program has been expanded to include inter-scholastic ice hockey and wrestling. Chelmsford is a member of the Merrimack Valley Hockey League and has a full schedule of sixteen games. Wrestling meets have been scheduled this year for the first time. These additional sports allow us to present a more comprehensive athletic program.

It has been the goal of the School Committee and the administration to make possible a broad intramural program. In September of 1963, such a program was started. There has been wide participation; a real need is being served.

Citizens Advisory Committee:—

The Citizens Advisory Committee has continued its excellent work by providing research service for the School Committee. Some of the questions currently being studied by the group are: The Ungraded Classroom, School Dropouts, Cost of Kindergartens, Time to Teach and, in addition to these, a sub-committee is up-dating the Community Resources File for use by the schools.

Federal Funds:—

Again this year, Chelmsford has taken full advantage of available Federal Funds. To a large degree, these Federal Funds have made possible the great improvement in the educational standards of the Chelmsford School System. One of the criteria for a good educational system is the utilization of resource materials and audio-visual aids in its instructional program. Their purchase has been accomplished through the use of these funds without any direct effect on the tax rate. Without this aid, it would have been most difficult to have attained our present high educational standards. Financial assistance was received for the improvement of guidance, science, mathematics and modern Foreign Language instruction.

Regional Vocational High School:—

The Regional School District Planning Board, consisting of the Towns of Chelmsford, Groton, Littleton and Westford, is presently formulating plans for a Regional Vocational Technical High School for the four communities. A vocational technical school is a necessity if pupils are to achieve marketable skills immediately upon graduation from High School. The proposed regional school and its program will be especially tailored to the vocational aims of its students and will correspond to the ambitions of parents and students in the four communities. The School Committee recommends that the citizens of the town follow the

specific recommendations of the Regional Vocational Planning Board when they are presented to the town at a Special Town Meeting in the spring.

IN MEMORIAM

Myrtle Greene Needham, 4th grade teacher at the Center Elementary School, passed away suddenly on October 23, 1964. Her untimely death put an end to a long career dedicated to the teaching of the children of Chelmsford, a career in which she earned the respect and affection of all—children, fellow workers, parents.

Edward T. Brick, retired custodian, passed away on May 23, 1964. Mr. Brick will be long remembered by his fellow workers, parents and pupils for his many years of dedicated service to the Town of Chelmsford.

IN CONCLUSION

The four facets of a good school system are plant, personnel, curriculum, and community interest and support. We have a system in which we may take justifiable pride. Particular mention should be made of the unselfish, devoted staff which has helped greatly to define the character of our educational program. We would emphasize also that the achievements of our system are dependent upon and have been made possible by the participation and support of the citizens of our town.

We are grateful to all who have assisted us in any way—all Town Boards and Committees, the Police, Fire and Highway Departments, the Parent-Teacher Associations, the School Building Committee, the Citizens Committee, and all interested citizens.

BUDGET ANALYSIS

This year's proposed budget again reflects the growth in the school population as well as improved teaching services. The impact of the current building in the Town of Chelmsford is reflected in the provision, among others, for an additional thirty-eight teachers.

A summary of income and expenditures of the Chelmsford Public Schools for the year, 1964, and the budget recommended for 1965 follows:
