Bruce Freeman Rail Trail Kistoric Sites

As the Bruce Freeman Rail Frail makes its way thru Chelmsford, it passes some of the Fown's most interesting historic sites. Fake some extra time and visit these sites:

- Chelmsford Center: Chelmsford Center Historical District: take a self guided walking tour of the District.
 Forefather's Cemetery: one of our state's oldest cemeteries.
 The Mill Kouse: walk into the center to visit the Mill Kouse.
- 2. Lime Quarry: As you ride towards Westford, the path travels along a wetland that provided the water power for the mill in Chelmsford center. Across the street on Rte. 110 is the Lime Quarry where lime was harvested and burned to make "quick lime" an important component of cement. The property has lovely walking paths and is open to the public.
- 3. **Barret Byam Kouse**, home of the Chelmsford Kistorical Society. If you leave the bike trail and follow Kigh Street to Locust Road to Byam Road to the Chelmsford Kistorical Society. (.3 mi) The Society has programs on a regular basis. Check their website for events.
- 4. Robin Kill Road: travel over Robin Kill towards the Iown's Lewis Farm also known as the Spaulding Farm. Bike a short distance from the trail and you will come upon the site of the Byam Match Factory where the first Lucifer matches were created and produced. Travel a little farther and you will be in the quaint village of South Chelmsford.
- 5. Maple Road: Return to the bike trail using Maple Road. The First Baptist Church has the Town's oldest continuously running Sunday School. Red Wing Conservation Area is a lovely piece of Town owned conservation. While taking time to enjoy the open space, take time to admire Red Wing Farm, a newly restored, and privately owned homestead that is on the National Register of Kistoric Places. Garrison Kouse: One of the oldest homes on Chelmsford used to house the militia, is just a short ride off the Trail. This property is open to the public for various occasions. Check their website for a list of coming events. (.7 mi)
- 6. Hart Pond: Continue on the trail towards Westford and stop at Pond Street. Hart pond received its name from the original owner of the lake, Thomas Hart. As you stand on the beach, notice the group of cottages on the left. These cottages originally built by the Nickles family, 1900-1912. The Nickle cranberry bogs were located on the Chelmsford / Westford Line.
