

9. Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

The first owner of the house, Deacon Benjamin Dudley, married a South Chelmsford girl, Betsy Proctor Byam, in 1824, but he & his family lived in Weston until 1836, when he bought the land on which the house was built. He was a cordwainer & immediately built his shop jusy north of the house site, but the house wasn't erected until sometime after the death of his wife in 1837. The next spring he married Martha H. Parkhurst; perhaps the house was built at that time. Little is known about his later life, except that for 2 years (1855-57) he owned the store still standing at the southwest corner of Acton & Maple Rds. Otis, a son of Benjamin & is first wife, was a blacksmith & married Martha Ann B_vam ; Martha's father was Ezekiel Byam, manufacturer of the 1st Lucifer matches in America (#54)

Benjamin remained in the house until his death in 1879, and in 1890 his heirs sold it to Henry H. Emerson, retaining land south of the house near Heart Pond, where they had 2 camps & tennis courts, which were among the 1st in town.

The Emersons lived in the house for 31 years, and Henry became the postmaster at the So. Chelmsford office, where his son, John, when old enough, was the assistant postmaster. In 1921 Henry's widow sold to Arthur W. House, a teamster and later a commercial merchant. The House family remained there for 41 years.



320 Acton Road "Emerson Store" Harriet Emerson lived at 330 Acton Road with her parents, Henry and Louisa (Chamberlain)Emerson . She was 17 years old at the time of the diary. John was her brother. At about the age of 30 she married Arnold Perham, and they had two children, Harold and Louise. Harriet died in 1919 of influenza, tired from successfully nursing her family through the same disease. This information was given by Stella Perham, wife of Harold Perham and the 1976 owner of the diary.

- Feb. 10, 1899 Went to the waiting room this afternoon to take a car for Chelmsford at 2:05. It did not arrive until about 2:35 and we got out to Chelmsford at 3:45.
- Apr. 16, 1899 Cleaned my long closet today
- Apr. 16, 1899 Cleaned the spare room today and worked on my shirtwaist in afternoon.
- Apr. 29, 1899 Cleaned John's closet today.
- June 2, 1899 They let us out this morning at 10:15 to see the circus procession. It did not come until 11:15 and as the cars were late, I did not get home until nearly 1 o'clock.
- une 26, 1899 I put up the muslin curtains in the spare room this afternoon. They look very pretty.
- July 25, 1899 I swept the sitting room and began to finish the closet.
- July 26, 1899 I have been working on the sitting room closet nearly all day and I am very glad to say that I have finished it.
- Aug. 2, 1899 About 4 this afternnon I went up to Grace Mansfield's for we are on a committee for food for our trip (to Salisbury Beach).
- Sun. Aug. 13, 1899 Went to S. S. today. There was a baptism at the pond after S. S. today and old () Bickford and Mrs. Howard Sweetser were baptised.

I went up to Lowell with Papa this morning. He went in to sell eggs.

- Sept.21, 1899 Mamma has been down to the store nearly all day. I got dinner. (Comment by S. Perham: Store was in So. Chelmsford on the same side of the st. & a few doors **n**orth of the house Oct. 5, 1899 I am sitting out on the piazza. I can not probably do this many time more this fall. I am almost sorry the summer has gone so soon with all its pleasures.
- Oct. 20, 1899 Eighteen today and what a happy day it has been.....I have been working on my scrapbook this aftermoon.
- Oct. 23, 1899 Mamma and I took up the dining-room carpet and cleaned the room today. Mr. Greeley came and tuned my piano. It sounds much better.
