Warren Emerson, the original owner of this "cottage house" built in 1875, came from Lowell, where he worked for the Hamilton Corporation, one of the large mills. In 1882 he sold the house and returned to Lowell. The second owner, William F. Carter, was for 44 years a workman in the machine shop of the Lawrence Corporation in Lowell and during the last 20 years of that period was in charge of the motive power. After retirement, the last 16 years of his life were passed at 44 Billerica Road. Four years after his death in 1898, his widow sold the house. Ownership has since been held by several people, but the lot size has remained the same since the house was built.





Lowell Weekly Journal

Sept. 23, 1898 - Died in Chelmsford Wednesday A M. at 8 o'clock, at his home in Billerica street, Mr. William F. Carter, aged 88 years 5 months. Withoperhaps two exceptions Mr. Carter was the oldest person in town. He was a native of Wheelock, Vt. When quite a young man he sought employment in Lowell and for 44 years was a workman in the machine-shop of the Lawrence corporation and during the last 20 years of that period had charge of the motive power. The last 16 years of his life have been passed in Chelmsford. Mr. Carter was twice married. By his first marriage he had two sons, both of whom he outlived. In 1882 he married Miss Angie B. Kendall of Lowell, who survives him and who has most faithfully cared for him in his declining years.....

Lowell Courier-Citizen

May 30, 1909 - Curtis G. Hazen has sold to Henry Graham of Lowell his 50 acre farm on the Boston road and has purchased from Mrs. H.L. Fletcher her residence on Billerica street.

Aug. 14, 1913 - Curtis G. Hazen, of Billerica street, whose illness has been somewhat improved lately, suffered a relapse this week.

April 27. 1914 - The death of Curtis G. Hazen, a resident of Chelmsford for the past 8 years, occurred at his residence in Billerica street Sunday. after an extended illness, aged 71 years. He was a son of Sanford and Sarah A. Hazen, residents of the town for nearly half a century. His birthplace was at West Lebanon, N.H. As a young man he went to Boston and for a number of years found occupation in the street car service, then operated by horses, serving both as driver and as conductor. Later he engaged successfully in the trucking business, retiring about 12 years ago and making Billerica his home. He soon entered active business again but gave it up some eight years ago and returned to Chelmsford, where he purchased and lived for a time at what is known as the Riley Davis house on the Boston road. This he later disposed of and has since made his home in Billerica street. He was a member of an Odd Fellow lodge at Chelsea and also of the A.O.U.W. esides his wife, he is survived by three brothers. Leonard W. of Somerville, Fred A. of Chelmsford, and Wilbur M. of Somerville, and also three sisters, Mrs. Emma L. Salmon of Lowell. Mrs. Frank M. Wiggin of Woburn, and Miss Nellie J. Hazen of Chelmsford.

Oct. 24, 1915 - Mrs. Frances F. Hazen, widow of the late Curtis G. Hazen, was found dead this afternoon in apartments she occupied at Thomas A. Harmon's in Bridge street. Medical examiner J.F. Meigs gave the cause as apoplexy and stated that death had probably occurred some time Saturday evening. Mrs. Hazen was in her customary health on Saturday and attended to her household duties as usual. On Sunday morning her absence was noted but it was then thought that she had gone out. When, after noon she failed to put in an appearance an investigation was made and her body was found dead upon the floor. She leaves two nephews, Dr. Walter Housington of Roxbury and Frank Housington of Felchville, Vt.; also two neices, Miss Alice Wood and Miss Belle Wood of West Lebanon, N.H.
