	It was Early in his career as a building contractor when in 1875 Almon W. Holt built this house. Although his mortgage was foreclosed i 1877 and he lost this property, he later became one of Chelmsford's mosuccessful contractors.	.n ost
	Jesse H. Parker purchased it in 1886, and ownership remained in his family until 1946. Jesse was a moulder and a widower with 2 sons in 1880 when he married Philena Moxley. Philena was an embroidery stamper with her own successful shop in Lowell, which he had built at the age of 17 after obtaining a bank mortgage. She gained a wide reputation for her designs, and many of her stamps and patterns are now displayed by the Wenham Historical Association. (Only one of her rug stamps survives; she sacrificed the rest to the furnace during a coal strike). In 1892 the Parker family moved back to Lowell, and the house and barn were rented. John Byfield lived here in 1894, the year after his machine shop burned down (site of Chelmsford Ginger Ale Co. #209). In 1903 the Parkers returned to 49 Billerica Rd. Following Jesse's death in 1909, Philena took in boarders; in 1936 she sold the house to a





The thunder shower Sat. evening made a forcible demonstration of its power in this village....Mr. Parker's house was considerably damaged, quite a section of the ridge pole and its surroundings were torn up, a chimney removed, a considerable portion of one side of the house taken out, besides minor damages to the interior of the building.

Upon the Billerica road two houses have been built - a two story dwelling by A.W. Holt, and a cottage by Warren Emerson, formerly of Lowell.

Notes from Antiques Magazine, Aug. 1972:

- 1868 Philena Moxley listed in Lowell as an embroidery stamper
- 1877 Philena Moxley opened a second shop in Salem, which was managed by her sister Melona. Melona had an unstable personality, and Philena closed the shop in 1878.

Philena Moxley married Jesse Parker, a widower with two sons, and in 1889 she closed her shop (in Lowell) and moved with her embroidery stamps, husband and stepsons and two small daughters to Chelmsford. Sometime later she sacrificed the large rug stamps to the furnace during a coal strike; consequently, only one of these has survived. When Philena Parker moved late in life to her daughter's in Wenham, the stamps moved with her, for she set great store by them until her death in 1937 at the age of 94.

Lowell Weekly Journal

April 29, 1892 - Mr. Jesse Parker & family remove to Lowell this week, and will let a part or all of their house on Billerica street. This is a fine opportunity to secure a very desireably house, barn and garden but a short walk from the railroad station.

June 2, 1893 - The thunder shower Saturday evening made a forcible demonstration of its power in this village. The house of Timothy Adams, on the north side of Billerica street, and that of J.H. Parker, occupied by F.E. Metcalf, on the opposite side of the street, were struck by the electric bolt. Mr. Parker's house was considerably damaged, quite a section of the ridge pole and its surroundings were torn up, a chimney removed, a considerable portion of one side of the house taken out, besides minor damages to the interior of the building. Two young children received quite a shock, from which they did not recover for over an hour.

May 4, 1894 - John Byfield will soon occupy the house of Jesse Parker on Billerica street.

Lowell Courier-Citizen

October 22, 1913 - Mrs. W.S. Parker and daughter Ethel, have taken rooms for the winter at Mrs. J.H. Parker's in Billerica street. Her son, Leon H. Parker with his family, will occupy the farm on Boston road.

October 21, 1915 - Mrs. W.S. Parker removed this week from the Billerica street, to the recently completed Armstrong cottage on Littleton road.

April 14, 1910 - Mrs. Godfrey and her daughter Eva Godfrey, who have been living at the home of Mrs. J.H. Parker in Billerica street, have taken rooms in the Aiken house on Westford street.

Moxley Exhibit Loaned To Adams Library

CMFD-Philena Moxley is the subject of the new exhibit at the Adams Library. The Lowell Museum, in celebration of Philena and National Needlework Week, has created an exhibit of Philena's dry goods and embroidery shop. The Museum has loaned us a portion of the display for our patrons. Philena was a very unusual lady. She went to work at sixteen and became an "embroidery stamper". At seventeen, she obtained a bank mortgage and built herself a house and shop on the corner of Gorham and Central Streets in Lowell. She gained a wide reputation for her designs and her work. In 1880, she married Jesse Parker of Chelmsford and continued to run the business as the "Misses Moxley" until 1888. After her husband died, she moved to Wenham to live with her daughter and died there at the age of 94. Her stamps, pricked patterns and such. were left to the Wenham Historical Association, which has generously loaned these items to the Lowell Museum for this exhibit. The library display is in the Fine Arts & Music Room for the month of October and the Lowell Museum's exhibit is now through December 31st.

Chelmsford Newsweekly Thursday, October 19, 1978

Note by J.B.Drury: Following the death of her husband in 1909, she lived at 49 Billerica Rd. until about 1923, where she took in boarders.
