John Fletcher of Westford had this house built in 1904 as a wedding present for his daughter Edith and John H. Wilson. The builder probably was Charles E. Parkhurst. John H. Wilson and his brother Moses Carleton Wilson were in business together as farmers; Moses lived across the street from John. The brothers had teams of horses which they let out on work for the town; they were also firemen, and one of the teams pulled the fire wagon. During the 1930s John and Edith moved across the street, and the house left Wilson ownership.

To provide the site for this dwelling, an older house, formerly the home of Amos A. Byam, was moved to 92 Chelmsford St., where it still stands and is known as the "Colonial Building."



### Lowell Neekly Journal

- Sept. 11, 1891 Mr. A.A. Byam was 83 years old Wednesday and spent the day as is his custom, at his former home on Littleton street, now the residence of his son, Geo. A. Byam, esq. Our venerable townsman, though not as active as he was 25 years ago, is still able to pay his daily visit to the post office and preserves a good degree of that cheerfulness of spirit and quickness of repartee which has always characterized him. But few of his townsmen can outrank him in point of age.
- Jan. 19, 1894 Mrs. Mary A. Byam, widow of the late Amos A. Byam of this village, died of paralysis Wednesday evening, 10th, at the home of a married daughter in Hudson, New Hampshire, with whom she had lived for the past year. Another daughter and a son also survive her, the latter George A. Byam, a well known resident of Chelmsford. Mrs. Byam was a woman of marked domestic tastes and strong religious convictions, and for many years a communicant of the Trinitarian Congregational faith. The funeral services were held Friday at Hudson.
- March 16, 1894 John H. Wilson will build a house upon the site now occupied by the dwelling formerly owned by Amos A. Byam.
- March 23, 1894 The "Adams Byam" house has been purchased of Mrs. Wilson by James P. Emerson, who will more it to his land on the Lowell road, near the old turnpike, and remodel it.
- April 13, 1894 John H. Wilson will soon begin preparations for his new house on Lowell stree.
- April 27, 1894 Work has begun upon the foundation of C.D. Clark's new house on Littleton street. Chas. E. Parkhurst is the building contractor; he also has charge of the work on John H. Wilson's house on Lowell stree.
- July 13, 1894 The foundation of John H. Wilson's new house will soon be ready for the carpenters. The work already done indicates a thoroughly built structure.
- Dec. 14, 1894 The marriage of Mr. John H. Wilson of this village and Miss Edith M. Fletcher of Westford took place Wednesday evening at the home of the bride's parent's, Mr. & Mrs. John M. Fletcher.....Mr. & Mrs. Wilson took their departure for their new home in this village, a fine house just completed and handsomely furnished.
