

9. Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

Bet ween 1832 and 1849 the local iron foundry was under the management of Capt. Lincoln Drake, who came here from Easton and took over the business after the death of his brother-in-law, Gen. Shepherd Leach, also from Easton. This house was one of several built by Capt. Drake, probably for the use of his workers. Early in 1843 he sold it to Zephaniah Goward, an iron-founder. Mr. Goward and his young wife, Martha, sold it two years later to Horace W. Woodward, a machinist who later became a grocer. He was one of the original subscribers to the North Chelmsford Library Fund. The library was organized in 1872. The Woodwards remained at 10 Cottage Row 37 years, almost until the end of his life. The house is very similar in design to other "cottages" on the street built about the same time as residences for workers in the North Chelmsford mills.
