

The residence at 61 High Street is a 2½ story building with a ridge roof with front gable and is T shaped. A one story rear ell with dormer is attached to a large barn with cupola on top. Attached to the rear of the barn are more sheds. See continuation sheets for pictures taken in August 2006 and for outlines and measurements of the building at various dates. Cornerboards are on the main house and rear ell and are topped with brackets. A tall, narrow brick chimney is located at the junction of the main roof and that of the "T", and is just right of the main roof ridge.

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

During late fall or early winter of 1892 Peter J. Brennan began erecting the house at 61 High St. on land he and his wife, Mary, had purchased the previous year. Ownership of the land was subject to an 1849 well right of Sewall Parkhurst. It was believed that the house was being built for sale by Peter Brennan, but in May 1892 Peter & Mary Brennan moved into their new house. However, tax records of May 1893 state that the house was still unfinished although the perhaps then unattached barn was. The Brennans did not reside there long, because in 1894 they sold it, and by 1898/99 they were residing in North Chelmsford. Although not listed as a contractor, very likely Peter, if not the builder, at least worked on this house, as he was a carpenter who had a business of house finishing and the manufacture of screens & windows.

In April 1896 Melvin Walker & his wife Abby moved here from Westford; he was a farmer. They resided here until 1919, when. Charles Forsythe and his wife Carrie became the new owners. Charles was the superintendent of streets, but in 1920 they sold to Irad or Isaac Hall. However, they continued to live here until 1925/26, when they moved to California., and the Halls moved in. Mr. Hall is said to have been a meat inspector or wholesale meat man. Zeno & Charlotte Jarvis moved here from Lowell, having become owners of the property in 1930. Charlotte died about 1940, but Zeno spent some of his retirement years here, until 1930 when he sold the house to George & Barbara Parkhurst and moved back to Lowell.

History

George Parkhurst descended from the old Parkhurst family of early Chelmsford. Barbara was descended from the Hildreth family of early Chelmsford/Westford. Both were greatly interested in the history of these two towns. He was a chemical engineer and she was a bacteriologist. They raised their family here before moving in 1966 to Overlook Drive, also in Chelmsford.

61 High St. was purchased in 1966 by Louis & Claire Kelly, who moved here with their children Joan, Martin and John. Son Russell was born after that. Louis was a baker by trade, as was Martin when he became old enough. About 1980 the parents were apparently divorced, and by 1985 Claire had remarried, to Vernon F. Williams, a sales executive. They sold the dwelling in 1989 to Robert Waskiewicz, a financial planner, who resided here for 5 years, when the present residents purchased the property.




