

This residence at 57 Littleton Road is typical of many other homes built in Chelmsford during the same general period. Although siding installed probably after 1983, which the current owners hope to remove, covers some of these features, ornamental brackets do remain. Fancy shingles, which were under gables (front, front stoop, right side gable over bow window) are either covered or were removed when the siding was put on.

In the spring of 1890 John Ludwig of Lowell purchased the land for \$400. Soon after May 16th of the same year the erection of the house was begun by A.W. Holt, a local builder. By the middle of October of that year Mr., and Mrs. Ludwig were "pleasantly located in their new house" and received a visit one evening by 40 of their Lowell friends. John Ludwig was a machinist by trade. Six years later they sold their residence to William H. Hall, who was then a patternmaker. He had been living with his parents at 35 Middlesex Street in North Chelmsford. On June 3, 1896 William married Hortense Parkhurst in a "very fashionable wedding celebrated in the Unitarian Church," where he served as superintendent of the Sunday School for 35 years. They raised three daughters, Dorothy, born in 1898, and twins Margaret and Katherine, born in 1903. In 1898 his occupation was listed as a daughtsman. Around 1920 he became the purchasing agent for the Saco-Lowell Company in Lowell. He was retired when he suffered a fatal heart attack in 1929 at age of 58 years, but his widow remained in the house. Dorothy became a teacher in Boston and Pittsburg before returning home to live with her mother and commute to teach in North Attleboro. Before her marriage Katherine also taught school and lived with her widowed mother. Hortense and Dorothy died in 1946. The house became a two family home and rented out to James and Ruth Johnston. James was a plumber by occupation, but the couple also ran Johnston's Bake Shop in their home. In 1950 the house was sold by Margaret and Katherine, both of whom had been married, to Robert and Winifred McConeghy of Milford, MA. The McConeghys ran a nursery on the second floor and lived on the first floor and in part of the second. The house was sold in 1963 to a personnel worker and wife and in 1967 to an engineer and his wife. Robert & Dorothy Carrison purchased it in 1969. A mechanic, Robert became an "Exxon director", but was soon listed as a self employed mechanic. He and Dorothy raised at least four children, but they divorced in 1989. Dorothy retained 57 Littleton Rd. and stayed there with some of her children. Following her death in 2001, her son Henry continued to reside there until 2004, when a proposed buyer applied for and was denied permission to convert the building to a two family dwelling. 

HALL --- PARKHURST Fashionable Wedding in Chelmsford

Describe Englands b Sept to 1898 described around until includes Hall

A very fashionable wedding was celebrated in the Unitarian Church, Chelmsford Centre, last evening at 6:30 in the presence of an audience composed of relatives and friends of the bride and groom. The contracting parties were Mr. William H. Hall, only son of Mr. and Mrs. John Hall of North Chelmsford and superintendent of the Unitarian Sunday school in the Central Village, and Miss Hortense Parkhurst, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. K. Parkhurst of the Centre.

The church had been very elaborately decorated by the young people of the Unitarian Church Guild and a more beautiful floral display was never seen in the history of weddings solemnized in the the edifice. The bridal party stood under a large bell made of daisies. The tongue of the bell was composed of buttercups and the cord which held the floral piece in position was covered with daisies. The choir loft on the right was completely hidden with ferns, daisies and potted plants in the centre of which was a pillow with the initials "P. H." made entirely of daisies. The desk and pulpit platform were also banked with ferns, rubber plants and foliage while a table on the left was completely covered with snow balls and ferns. Angled and paragraphs bed

Seven pews were reserved for the relatives of the contracting parties, and they were designated by bouquets of daisies tied with white satin ribbon. The bridal party entered the church through the main aisle. Mr. Edward Everett Adams of Lowell presided at the organ and played the music from Lohengrin with the bridal march and saw size

Masters Charles Parkhurst and Fred Parkhurst, nephews of the bride, acted as The latter led the party, bearing upon a bed of pansies the bridal ring. The bridesmaid was Miss Hattie Hall, a sister of groom, and the best man was Mr. Harry Hall of Boston, a cousin of the groom. Miss Grace Parkhurst was maid of honor.
