

The house on 278 Mill Road is a very typical home of the early  $20^{th}$  century. It is a 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  story house with side gables. The roof has asphalt shingles. The exterior is covered with clapboard and the windows are 2 over 2's. Attached on the back of the house is a shed. The foundation is of field stone. The last home owner built a deck on the right side with a sliding glass door. The eaves are wide and have brackets and moldings boards.


According to deeds, Herbert C. Sweetser, partner in the Sweetser and Day Mill, in Chelmsford Centre, purchased 24 acres of wood land called Rocky Hill Sprout on the Road to Russell's Mill, for one dollar and other considerations, from his family in 1909. The sale was part of an inheritance settlement from the estate of Charles Sweetser. By 1908 Herbert Sweetser had sold 2 acres of that land to John O'Hara and in July of 1908, Herbert Sweetser filed with the town a plan to develop five lots along Road to Russell's Mill (Mill Road) and the Road from Billerica (Rte. 129), the land in Elizabeth Drive on Mill Road to Lothar Fuch's property on Mill Road. In 1909, on lot #2, Herbert Sweetser built a farmhouse with an attached shed and a hen house to be occupied by Charles Loucraft. In 1910 Charles Loucraft, a local carpenter, bought the house with 2 acres of land. The 1910 census lists Charles Loucraft as a carpenter who builds houses living in the house with his wife Sarah and 2 children and a brother Frank. Sometime between 1912 and 1920, Charles Loucraft died, Sarah and family moved to Lowell and the house was purchased by his brother Frank Loucraft. Frank Loucraft sold the house in May 1915 to Guiseppi Pierro. Guiseppi Pierro lived in the house was sold in 1954 to James McCusker and Donald McInnis and was surveyed for a subdivision. The house changed hands several more times before finally passing to the hands of M.T.C Construction of Woburn, MA. On June 13, 2006, the Historical commission granted permission to demolish the house for an office building.






