





The design of the monument is similar to many others in Chelmsford, including cemetery monuments. However, it is made of Chelmsford granite, which does make it unusual. It is also taller than many other local monuments.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

Explain the history of the object, and how it relates to the development of the community

Construction of the Middlesex Canal began in 1793 and the first boats ran in 1803, using water from the Concord River. The canal ran between Boston and the Merrimack River at what is now Lowell but then known as East Chelmsford. It predated the Erie Canal, whose builders came to this canal for ideas on erecting their canal. In 1808 U.S. Secretary of the Treasury Albert Gallatin declared the Middlesex Canal "The greatest work of the kind which has been completed in the United States." The Middlesex Canal opened up New Hampshire and Vermont to the markets, and it was a big cause for Boston to become a big harbor instead of Newburyport. The arrival of trains put it out of business, and the last boat sailed in 1853.

Located on the south bank, or towpath, of the Middlesex Canal, this monument was one of several erected by the Middlesex Canal Commission in each of the canal towns. Each plaque is similar, except for the local map. The Chelmsford commissioners preferred to use local granite from the LeMasurier Granite Quarry which cut the granite to specifications. Gary Kinney, owner of the property where it was to be placed, prepared the hole and cleared out trees and brush in and beside the canal prism. After the Chelmsford Highway Department transported the monument to the site, Mr. Lemasurier placed the plaque on the monument. Although plans for the monument were begun as early as 1987, the monument was dedicated at a brief ceremony held at 2 o'clock on May 4, 1991. Following introductory remarks by local Commissioners Jane Drury and Robert Kuehn, statements were made by Atty. Arthur Eno, a founder and first President of the Middlesex Canal Commission, and State representative Carol C. Cleven.



At this location canal boats pulled by horses carried freight and passengers between Boston and the Merrmack River at Lowell before the days of the railroads. The canal ran from Charlestown through what are now Somerville, Medford, Winchester, Woburn, Wilmington, Billerica, and Chelmsford to Lowell.


