



This area originally was wooded, with a small stream flowing on its right (north) side. It is still lightly wooded. The park is covers a small portion of a 38.26 acre lot. To the left (south) of the park but on the same lot is a building built as a police station in 1965. On the right (north) side of the park, still on the same property stands the McCarthy School, built in 1959 as the high school but is currently a middle school.

In addition to various monuments which are part of the park and have inventories included with this document, there are several other small structures. At North Rd. is a sign indicating the Veterans Memorial Park; it was made by Hubert Scoble. On the left side the Soldier and Boy monument, representing soldiers of all wars, stands overlooking North Rd. Three flagpoles flank the entrance to the park. One flagpole is that of the American Legion Post 312; a second is that of the Chelmsford Elks 2310; the third is that of the Chelmsford Emblem Club 541. A walkway leads back toward the "Wall" monuments, in front of which are two wooden benches. The land rises slightly to the left of the "Wall", and on this rise is a receptacle given in appreciation of Edward McGovern. Behind the wall a path meanders past a wooden bench, receptacles, two monuments, a donation box, and a "pad" on which are two more monuments. The path continues across the stream toward the direction of the school. On the other side of the stream is another monument near a raised and cleared area, where one or more monuments may eventually be placed. It was cleared as a garden as a Boy Scout project but is empty at this time.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

Discuss history of use. Evaluate the historical associations of the landscape/park with the community.

The idea of a park commemorating those who had served in the country's armed forces was conceived of by assistant building inspector and Vietnam veteran Milton "Mike" Kinney several years before it actually came to fruition. "A street, a tree, a bridge, a plaque, and about a dozen boulders and monuments testify to the town's recognition of its debt to the past." However, it was felt there should be a central place to honor all veterans from Chelmsford. In 1988 Mr. Kinney, with three others, envisioned a gazebo for band concerts, walking trails, and a monument. Selectmen endorsed the concept of constructing a veterans' park with private funds. A committee was set up to select a location.

By Jan. 1989 the park committee and a bandstand committee hoped to combine forces and build a park with bandstand at the corner of Wilson and Chelmsford Streets, but that that did not work out. By May of the same year the Veterans' Park Committee had decided to place a smaller park in the parking lot of the Little League field on Chelmsford Street. Mico Kaufman of Tewksbury was selected as sculptor. Plans called for a bronze statue of a soldier holding a small child by the hand, standing in front of four bronze plaques, one for W.W. I, one for W.W. II, one for the Korean War, and one for the Vietnam War. A U.S. flag and an MIA flag stand one at each side of the memorial.

However, difficulties and controversies continued to plague the Veterans' Park Committee and by a year later the committee decided to act alone and use only private funds. A wooded parcel on North Road was selected, and on a rainy day in Sept. 1990 about 60 people gathered at 9 A.M. for a ground breaking ceremony. "Chelmsford resident Elwell Weatherhead, a World War I veteran, turned the symbolic dirt, joined by three other veterans, one each representing W.W.I, W.W. II, the Korean Conflict, and the Vietnam War." Mike Kinney remarked that "Chelmsford's always been a patriotic town; I think it was just a matter of the community acknowledging a secured site." He had dreamed of such a memorial for over ten years. Mike Kendrick, another Vietnam veteran and member of the Veterans Park Committee stated that "I think it's a long time coming and something that all veterans need. It's just one step closer to coming home." Following the ceremony volunteers from the Civil Engineer squadron at Hanscom Air Force Base, the policemen's union, and the Merrimack Valley Veterans group cleared trees at the memorial site. On following weekends volunteer crews continued working to clear the one-half acre site. The planned memorial listed the names of Chelmsford residents, living and deceased, who served in the first and second world wars, Korea and Vietnam, emblazoned on granite pillars, ranging in size from five to nine feet.

Additional monuments have been added in later years and names of area veterans added, not just those from Chelmsford.


