The dates that this house and the house at 11 North Road (#38) were built are not known. The "double cottage house" at 1-3 North Road is specifically mentioned in a mortgage deed of 1848 (Book 16, page 421), and the house at 11 North Road is mentioned in a deed of 1846 (Book 16, page 101). Earlier deeds for these properties (1840 sale of both properties, and an 1836 \$1000 mortgage on 11 North Road) mention only "buildings" and a blacksmith shop, the latter being at the rear of 1-3 North Road.

In 1811 and 1813 Stephen Pierce, 3rd (later Jr.) bought the land for the two properties from William B. Fletcher and the estate of Samuel Pitts for a total of \$353.81. No buildings were mentioned. Assessors' records seem to indicate that one of the two houses and the black-Smith shop were standing by 1824 and that the second house was built after 1836. Construction of the two houses suggests that 1-3 North Road is the older; however, 11 North Road contains cornerposts, arched chimney base, and wide floor boards (removed ca 1925).

In 1840 the 1-3 North Road property sold for \$260, in 1848 for \$900, and in 1864 for \$900, which suggests that the house was built between 1840 and 1848 by Joseph Reed. If so, the house at 11 North Road would be the older one, perhaps built following the second marriage of Stephen Pierce in 1831.


Historical Significance:

Stephen Pierce was a blacksmith and built his shop at the rear of 1-3 North Road sometime between 1813 and 1824. This shop was replaced about 1922 or 23 by the present two story shop. Stephen married first Abigail Bateman in 1814, who died after bearing four children. He married second in 1831 Mary Corey, and they had at least five' children. In 1840 he sold 1-3 North Road property to Joseph Reed, who kept the old tavern at the site of 2 Chelmsford Street (#205) and owned the store then standing between 1-3 North Road and the tavern.' It is doubtful that Joseph actually lived in the house. Warren Flint, a machinist, was the next owner. In 1867 Mary Elizabeth Richardson bought the house, and it remained in the Richardson/Davis family until 1973, and descendants of this family are still living there. Mary Elizabeth, daughter of Elijah Richardson who owned the house at 11 North Road, lived in the house for many years. During much of the 20thcentury half of the house has been rented.

This house is unusual in Chelmsford because of its architecture. Early deeds call it a "double cottage"; two complete houses, mirror images of each other, share a common room in the middle of the rear end. There have been very few alterations since it was built.

Alterations - few

- 1. Probably by Albert H. Davis or Almon Holt, a friend and local builder: Bay window & open porch - south side Front porch - enclosed, front of house Kitchen floors - wide boards replaced with marrow hardwood floors
- 2. First floor room between kitchens divided into 2 rooms. Done within the early memory of H.J. Davis (b. 1909) & his sister, M. Brow (b. 1913). They are grandchildren of Albert H. Davis.
- 3. Privy (north side) removed; last used 1944.
