

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

Architecturally the apartment house at 32-34 North Road is unique to other buildings in Chelmsford. The original part of the building is in the middle, with additions to the sides. It may have begun as a private residence but soon became a two and then four apartment house. Between 1918 and 1944 it was owned by Fred Wiggin, an instructor at the Lowell Trade School. Around 1920 he built a house next door, using erecting it as training for his students. It has recently been demolished, in spite of being in a historical district. Mr. Wiggin also used the house at #32-34 North Road for teaching his boys. Each year they would build another section. In 1935 they erected at least one the portions at side of the original house. At some time another ell was built on the other side of the building, increasing the number of apartments to eight.

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

The center section of this building at 32-34 North Road was erected in 1877 by Frank H. Hodges, who was born in Chelmsford in 1850. The "large two story house, was as yet unoccupied" by the middle of that December. Whether or not Mr. Hodges actually lived here is doubtful. The building contained two apartments. One of his sisters, Mary Jane, had married O. Cummings, and following his death in Boston in 1879, she and her family came here to live upstairs at 32-34 North Rd., where she remained until around 1920. Meanwhile Alonzo G. Greene moved into the north end of the house with his wife, Julia A. Hodges, another sister of Frank H. Hodges. A contractor and builder, Mr. Greene had made several trips to San Domingo in the West Indies superintending the building of wharves for the New York & Smyrna Fruit Co. and also the construction of a railroad into the interior. For a number of years he was a member of the Greene & Hagerman firm, which constructed the Talbot mills in North Billerica. In 1864 he had erected the first liberty pole to be raised on the Common in Chelmsford since the Revolutionary War. In 1904 the pole had become worn out and dangerous, so he erected a second one. It was his opinion that that pole, "with proper care and because of improved method of construction, [would] outlast its predecessor by many years." However, it is long gone now. He died suddenly at his home during the afternoon of Oct. 21, 1910, aged 73 years.

HISTORY

The Rodcliffes were another family who resided here since 1900. Augusta Rodcliffe, the widow of Horatio, moved into the south side of the dwelling with her children, Frederick, Gertrude and Annie. Both worked in Lowell, Frederic as a compositor and Gertrude as a teacher. By 1925-26 the building had been increased in size and was known as the North Square Apartments. The Green and Cummings families no longer lived there, the Rodcliffe family was about to leave Chelmsford, and Frank Wiggin had moved in his wife Jessie. Jessie had grown up across the street with her parents, Almon & Susan Holt. Her father was a local building contractor. Frank Wiggin, who was known as Fred, taught at the Lowell Trade School, and he used the building at 32 North Rd. as a teaching model for his students, who built an ell on each side, dormers, and made other changes, eventually increasing its size to the present eight apartments. Over the years the building became affectionately known as the "Wiggenette." The boys from the Lowell Trade School also erected the house next door, now demolished. In 1947 Fred Wiggin died of heart problems, having retired from teaching a few years earlier. His widow, Jessie, died of cancer in 1952.
