In 1874 the Estate sold it for \$300 to the Proprietors of the North Chelmsford Meeting House, in trust for the Second Congregational Society of Chelmsford. The parsonage was to be used only "for the benefit of the preaching of the gospel by the Orthodox Congregational denomination." 





# Chelmsford doctor faces drug charges

CHELMSFORD - State and local police today arrested a prominent Lowell-area medical doctor on drug-related charges.

Dr. Dewey G. Archambault, with offices at 45 Princeton St. in North Chelmsford, was picked up around noon today as a result of an extensive investigation conducted by Massachusetts State Police and Chelmsford officers.

Archambault was arrested at his Chelmsford office. The doctor is the son of the late former Lowell Mayor Dewey G. Archambault, who served in the 1930s and was Lowell's last so-called strong mayor.

Chelmsford Police Chief Raymond McKeon confirmed at noon today that the arrest had been made.

He said Archambault is being charged with "several counts" of "illegally dispensing controlled substances."

McKeon lauded the combined efforts of the state police unit and Lowell police, who assisted in the investigation.

He said the probe of Archambault

goes back to last May.

McKeon said, "This arrest is the result of a lengthy state police, Chelmsford police and Lowell police cooperative effort. It is part of this department's continuing policy to serve notice on anyone regardless of social or economic status that all available resources will be employed to impact the illegal dispensing of controlled substances in this community."

# Soldier admits abduction hoax

SCHWAEBISCH-GMUEND, West Germany (AP) – A U.S. Army soldier has admitted that his purported kidnapping by anti-nuclear activists last weekend was an elaborate hoax, West German police said today.

Herbert Sarchro, spokesman at Stuttgart police headquarters, said Spec. 4 Liam Fowler, 21, of Port Orange, Fla., told authorities he had acted alone.
