GIVE A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF HISTORIC IMPORTANCE OF SITE (Refer and elaborate on theme circled on front of form)

This house was probably built by Joseph Spaulding before and after his service in the Revolutionary War, and remained in the Spaulding family for several generations before being sold in 1922.

Joseph Spaulding served at Concord and also at Bunker Hill, where he probably fired the first shot ahead of Time and also may have Killed Major Pitcairn. He is reported to have said, "I fired ahead of Time, and Putnam tushed up and struck at me for violating orders. I suppose I deserved it, but I was anxious to get another good shot at Gage's men ever sinc our affair at Concord. The blow from 'Old Put' hit me on the head, Made a hole in my hat, and left this scar."

Chelmsford "Newsweekly" (1955)

"The house now oned by Ben Drew of Westford at 55 Spaulding Road, and occupied by Chas. Batts, was probably built by Joseph Spaulding before and after his service in the Revolution. It was later occupied by George 0., whose son Clarence is the present Robert's father.

Robert C. Spaulding, member of the Chelmsford Fire Department. represents the Spaulding family of this town which, with its several branches, included many prominent descendants of Edward, first ofhis name to Sttle here. Robert is the 11 generation from Edward and the sixth from Joseph Spaulding who fired the first shot at Bunker Hill and who is also said to have killed Major Pitcairn. Joseph's watch, made in London in 1707, is today Robert's prized possession. Joseph's father was John. whose father was the original Edward. Descendants of Joseph were, in sucessive generations, Lt. John, Lt. Robert, Joseph, Alpheus, George A, George O., Clarence, Robert C."

"There is a house at the south corner of Summer St. and Boston Road which Mabel Emerson's parents, the Fendersons, built. It was often called the Farrington House for people who lived there later. As a child I was never allowed in the woods behind this house near First St., behind Royal Dutton's (32 Boston Rd.), because of clay pigeon shooting there. That's the only Gun Club I know of."
