

9. Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

This residence was built on land purchased from Deacon David Perham, one of Chelmsford's early "housing developers." By December of 1884 the house was in the process of construction, probably by its owner, Charles C. Ward, who was a carpenter and house builder.

Following his death, his son William C. Ward occupied the house, and Charl widow moved to Woburn shortly before her own death in 1914. William was an inspector at the custom's house in Boston, a member of the Lowell Musicians' Association, director of the Unitarian church choir, and a leader of the Chelmsford band. After his death on Dec. 2, 1914 of a pneumonia-induced heart attack, the apartment was rented by Frank W. Smith, a leather worker in Lowell; the Smith's soon built and lived in a house on Billerica Rd. before purchasing 15 Westford St. (#237) in 1921. The house at 1-3 Westford Street was sold out of the Ward family in 1939.



Mrs. Margaret Mills, telephone conversation, March 23, 1977:

- Rear of house was a barn when Mrs. Mills was a teenager (b. ca 1905) Was an apartment when daughter Elizabeth Ward married a Richardson and lived there.
  - Mrs. Ward was left alone after younger daughter Eleanor married (Elizabeth already married). She rented the front of the house o and she (William's widow) and Helena Lyons moved into the rear apartment.
- Sarah Ward had a bedroom upstairs facing the Baptist Church.

Mrs. Mills was a young girl, when one day a bad thunderstorm occurred. Just as her father (Edward Robbins) & Uncle Herbert came home, there was a terrific clap of thunder. An apple tree in back of the Wards' house was stripped of its leaves; the fire department came to the house. Lightning had completely splintered Sarah' bureau mirror, imbedding glass in the wall. She had left the room during the storm and gone downstairs for supper.

- Mr. & Mrs. Smith and daughter Clara lived in the Ward house for a while, then built and moved in house on Billerica St. (corner of Perham St. then moved back to quieter Westford St. (#15-17).
- Evalyn Russell said 3/23/1977 that Russell Lumber supplied the lumber for the house that Frank Smith Built on Billerica St.

Dec. 2, 1914 - The village was deeply stirred this morning by news of the death, at an early hour, of William C. Ward at his home in Westford street. Since passing the crisis of an attack of pneumonia, his friends had been cheered by encouraging reports of his condition. At midnight he spoke to the nurse of feeling better than at any time since his illmess began, but at 4 o'clock a sudden attack of heart failure brought the end without warning. Mr. Ward was born in Lowell 43 years ago, the second son of Charles C. and Sarah Ward, coming to Chelmsford at an early age, where his life and interests were centred. For the past 12 years he had served as an inspector at the customs house in Boston, where his integrity and strict attention to business won for him the high regard of his associates. He was a musician of more than ordinary ability and gave unstintedly of his time and talent as director for a number of years of the Unitarian church choir. All recompense for this work, at his own request, reverted to the use of the society. He was always ready to contribute a part of all the social activities of the society and his interest and counsel will be greatly missed. He was a member of the Lowell Musicians Association and was for several years leader of the Chelmsford band. He was firm and loyal in his friendships, thoughtful and sympathetic, ready at all times to perform a service for another with complete self-effacement. In his home life, he was especially devoted and never happier than when doing something that would bring an added pleasure to the family circle. The deepest sympathy is exptended them in their bereavement. Besides his wife, he is survived by two daughters, Elizabeth and Eleanor; his mother, Mrs. S (torn) Ward of Woburn, and two brothers. Fred and Harry. Duneral services are to be held at the Unitarian church on Saturdav afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Dec. 29, 1914 - The death of Mrs. Sarah J. Ward, widow of Charles C. Ward, occurred on Monday evening at her home in Woburn, after an illness of several weeks. The death of her eldest son, William C. Ward, early in the present month, was a severe blow to her, and although able to attend the funeral, she was taken ill immediately afterward and failed steadily. For many years her home was in Chelmsford, where she was a member of the Central Baptist church and also of the order of King's Daughters, taking an active interest in the work of both as long as she was able. She is survived by two sons, Fred and Harry, and two granddaughters, Elizabeth and Eleanor Ward of Chelmsford.
