

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION see continuation sheet  Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.
This two family residence is typical of many other houses of similar age in Chelmsford. Many of its exterior architectural feature were removed or hidden by new siding probably in the 1930s, when it was restored from its then "dilapidated" condition.
Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.  Otis D. Wright owned the land for both this house at 25-27 Wright Street, and the house next to it at 37-39 Wright Street at the corner of Newfield St Benjamin Fletcher purchased the property numbered 25-27 Wright St. and constructed this residence 1874, but sold it the following year to the North Chelmsford mill owner, George C. Moore. In 1886 Ellen G. Bradley bought the property, and she and her husband, John Bradley, became the first owners to actually live here. In April 1896 Ellen's son George Hodge married Mamie Huntoon in Boston, and the newly weds with their infant son Harold Bradley born in 1897 lived at 25-27 Wright St. with the Bradleys until moving next door to 37-39 Wright St. in 1898. John Bradley was an inventor and in 1900 his "new machine shop" was built in the lot between the two houses. The machine shop is still in existence on the property of 37-9 Wright St. It is not known what he invented there, however. The shop was not moved; its location was on a separate lot between the two houses. During the night of February 3, 1907 John Bradley died of influenza.
Ellen Bradley lived in and retained ownership this house until 1921. However, the Hodge family moved back with her in 25-27 Wright St. In addition to their first child, Harold, George Y. and Mamie Hodge came with Helma Louise, born in 1899, and Millard, born in 1901, when George was working as a milkman. However, he soon became an iron moulder, an occupation he held until shortly before his retirement. As a grown woman, Hilma became a nurse, and her brother Millard joined the US Navy, but Harold remained a student until became a surveyor and married Rena. In 1921 Ellen Bradley died at age 78 years and 8 months and was buried with her husband in the Edson Cemetery in Lowell. The Hodge family remained here until the early 1930s, when they moved back next door to 37-39 Wright St.
This house remained empty for several years and became dilapidated. Neighboring children played in it and called it the "haunted house", although it wasn't, of course. In 1937 Stewart MacKay purchased the property. He restored the house to a livable condition, although he never resided here. He put piazzas on the east side, and shortly before his death they were enclosed and windows installed. The piazzas has since been removed. Stewart MacKay was a professor at Lowell Technological School (now part of U MA Lowell). As a hobby, he made rock maple looms for hospital therapy in the separate workshop located at the rear of the lot between the two houses, which is John Bradley's old machine shop, built in 1900. The Mackay looms were very popular, and he couldn't make enough to keep orders supplied. The finished product were loaded into Mr. MacKay's car and driven down to the railroad station to be shipped. Mr. MacKay and his sister Anna, lived in what later became the MacKay Library on Newfield Street, and for many years Mrs. Essie Young was the housekeeper. Mrs. Young inherited the two houses in 1947.

#### HISTORY

Apparently by 1943 the house had been fixed up sufficiently for Thomas & Helen Gibbons to live living there in one apartment, and Thomas & Ruth Broscombe in the other apartment with his mother, Lucy Broscome. Thomas & Ruth Broscombe were both bookkeepers. Thomas Gibbons was a salesman. In 1949 or 50 Essie Young, the owner, moved in with her granddaughter, Alva, the Gibbons having left. The Youngs stayed here about 7 years. In 1969 Mrs. Young sold the property to to Carl & Donna Stanley, who moved into 27 Wright St., from 21 Diamond St. The Stanleys rented out the other apartment. He was a senior mechanical technician. They had three children born here: Carl Jr., Cynthia, Kim and Erika. In 1999 the property was sold to the present owner. It is still a two family residence.
