

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

The 1.5-story Cape type house has a foundation covered with parging, walls clad in replacement vinyl siding with vinyl trim, and a steeply pitched, asphalt-shingled, side gable roof. An external brick chimney is located on the northeast wall. Windows throughout the building are replacement, six-over-six, double-hung windows with false muntins. The primary (southeast) façade is four bays wide with single windows in the west bay and the two east bays. The remaining bay includes the main entry that has a fluted surround. The southwest wall is three bays deep. Single windows are located in the only bay of the half story and in the south bays of the first story. The north bay features the secondary entry that is accessed via wood steps and deck. An almost full-width shed roof dormer is located along the rear of the house.

The building is an altered example of a Cape type residence that retains historic integrity of location, setting, design, feeling, and association.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

Plan Book 57/97 shows that in 1926 this lot was divided from that to the east at 231 Main Street. The map shows the footprint of 231 Main, but the map does not show a building on this lot yet. In 1933 then owners George and Ellen King sold this parcel to Henrietta Phillips. The deed does not mention a building on the site, but the house likely existed by this date. Henrietta Phillips (ca. 1865-1940) is listed in the 1937 city directory as the widow of James living on Main Street. Prior to this Henrietta and James lived on Robin Hill Road where James was a truck farmer. Also living with them were one daughter and four children between the ages of 10 and 17, who were listed as "state children." In 1939 Phillips sold the property via a conservator to Ervin and Ruth Monsen. The 1940 census lists the Monsens living on Main Street with Ervin (born ca. 1904) as an insurance agent, Ruth (born ca. 1904) at home, and three children between the ages of three and six. The Monsens remained at this address until 1958 when they sold it to Ruth E and Allen C Davidson. After this date the property was sold four additional times.
